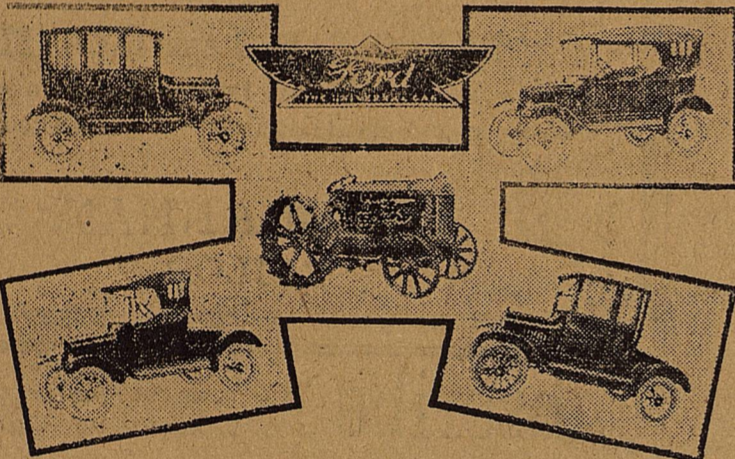

GEO. H. BROWN OF RICHLAND SPRINGS PARDONED.

Geo. H. Brown, of Richland Springs, Texas, who was convicted of killing his wife in 1911, in Brown County, and received a life sentence. He was pardoned by Governor, and here is a tribute from the Editor of the San Saba News, in regard to the man pardoned.

"Our confidence in him has never wavered. He has always lived a straight, honorable life. In prison he was an exemplary prisoner. He had been there only a few months until he was made a trusty and during his dismal days of imprisonment he never betrayed a trust. He was on the square and was allowed many liberties, as prison liberties go. As a friend and citizen a truer, straighter was never known. The grand old state of Texas has no better man and citizen today and when Will Hobby stands at the bar of judgment and the Book is opened there will be in living letters across one page: 'He pardoned George Brown, a good citizen, an honest man, a true friend, a christian gentleman, a ransomed soul'."

Dear Sir:

Relative to House Bill No. 156, copy of which is being sent you by the Secretary of State, the Attorney General holds that said bill can not become effective until ninety days after adjournment of the Legislature, for the reason that it failed to receive the two-thirds majority vote necessary to make it become effective at once.

Ninety days after adjournment will, in all probability, be the middle of June, therefore, no change in the law will take place prior to that time, and you are advised to collect the ten per cent penalty which applies on the first of February, as if no law had been passed.

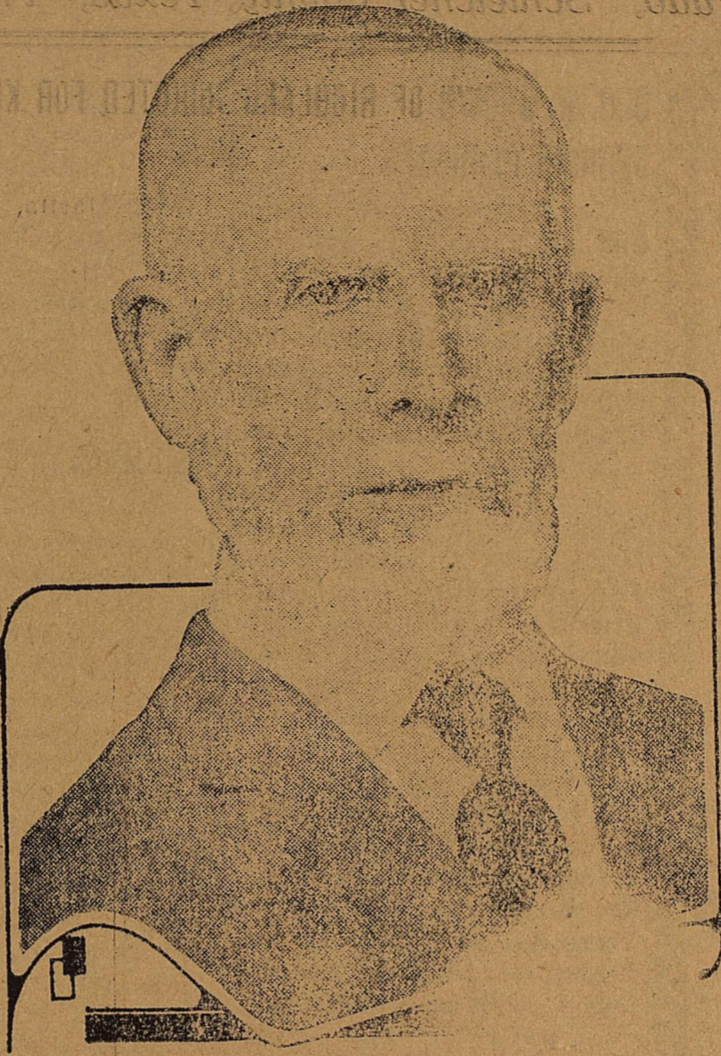

Clean up time has come again and we must be about our duty or Spring will be here and find us unprepared for the conditions that always accompany warm weather.

Eldorado is fast becoming a town of civic pride and ambition. She now has a number of women's clubs, religious and literary—all of which are co-operating for the good of her citizens both morally and physically.

The Parent-Teachers-Association formally handle the annual clean up as best they could with the help of a committee of the citizens, all of which is so good so far. However, a more far reaching and permanent plan is now under way which will lighten the burden and enable us to work on an official basis.

The Women's Clubs' co-operate together and with the board of Commissioners have brought about the election of an official board of health, who together with the county supervisor, inspects and perform all official duties connected with this work. As these plans mature you will know more of them through these columns. For the time being a committee of citizens have in hand the work of financing and hauling for the campaign. This committee has a man employed and now on the field ready to haul our garbage and we must do our part by raking and piling our trash in an easily accessible place for him to load, and aid in every way.

We are fortunate in securing this much needed help just at this time.

The officers through the committees have ordered that this work shall begin on Feb. 18, and be completed Feb. 25. On Feb. 26, our places of residence will be inspected by a committee representing the new board of health and if we have not complied with the requirements we will be personally interviewed by them relative to the condition of our places. Let us not be "weighed in the balance and found wanting." If we fail in this work, civic pride alone has not been sacrificed but personal pride as well. May it not be said of any citizen of Eldorado that they had to be urged to clean up their premises. Now is the time don't delay!

The town has been divided into 5 districts bounded by the two main intersecting streets running N. S. E. & W., and the 5th lying south of the Sonora road known as the Keele addition. A captain and two lieutenants have been appointed to see that the work goes on in each district according to the rules governing the work—time allotted, etc.

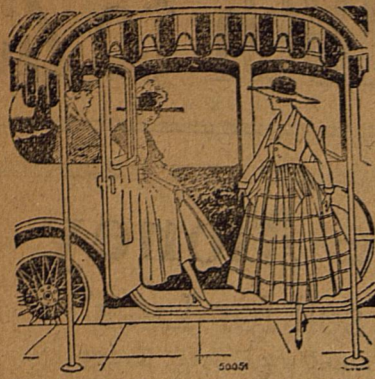

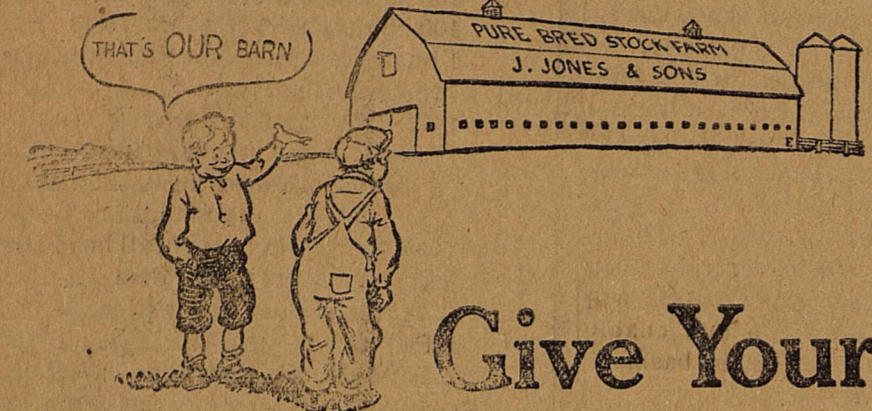
