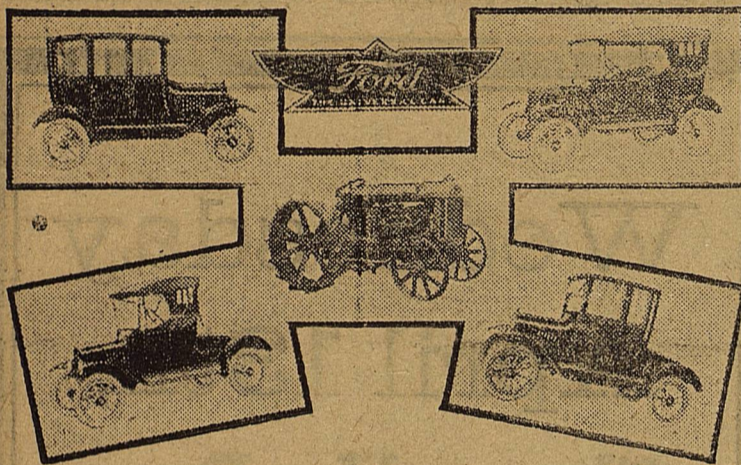

### H. O'HARROW SELLS 250 HEAD OF YEARLINGS.

Mr. H. O'Harrow, who ranches northeast of Eldorado 20 miles sold 250 head of yearlings steers and heifers, to Clay D. Adkins of Christoval Texas, at \$25.00 per head.

### BIG CATTLE MOVEMENT FROM WEST TEXAS.

The shipment from Monument and San Angelo Friday and Saturday of forty-nine cars of cattle, carrying 1,889 animals, marked the opening of what T. C. Rutledge, inspector for the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, expects to be the heaviest cattle movement from West Texas since before the drouth, if not in 10 years.

Nine hundred cars have been ordered for use on the Orient railroad between Alpine and San Angelo—a stretch of 270 miles—while the Santa Fe will employ 150 cars in transferring herds from points between Sterling City and Paint Rock. These 1,050 cars will carry about 31,500 animals.

Ive Johnson of Ardmore, Okla. on Friday consigned 34 car loads of aged steers, 697 head, from Monument to Scullin, Okla.

James Callen of Menard, shipped ten cars of 3 year old steers from San Angelo to Blackland, Okla.

Marvin M. Douglas of San Angelo, shipped 5 cars of aged steers, from San Angelo to Scullin, Okla.—San Angelo Standard.

### WEST TEXAS PROTESTING VETO OF A & M.

Spur, April, 2.—The West Texas Chamber of Commerce through its president, Clifford B. Jones today declared that Governor Neff's action in, vetoing the West Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College measure does not reflect the sentiment of Texas. The formal statement by Mr. Jones declared that the failure of the democratic state convention to endorse such a college did not reflect the sentiment of almost all of Texas and particular West Texas, on a subject which is not political.

He declared that it was almost inconceivable that the Governor would veto the bill and kill the privileges under which the youth of West Texas is entitled by every expectancy of heritage and justice.

### MEETING CALLED TO DIVIDE TEXAS.

On account of the veto of the West Texas A. & M. College by Governor Neff, a meeting was called at Sweetwater Wednesday for a conference on "divide the state" movement, according to M. C. Monroe, president of the Sweetwater Young Men's Business League, who said he expected a representative gathering.

Leaders of the movement declared they favored the stopping of the state tax payment and demanding action on the division immediately. R. M. Chittwood, representative from the 113th district, declared that the Neff Veto of the A. & M. bill was a "full notice to the people of the West that they were living under a state government which denies them the chance to realize their hopes and aspirations."

### CLAUD HUDSPETH FOR GOVERNOR.

The Ozona "Kicker" Stockman, has virtually announced Claud B. Hudspeth for governor, Neff, Hudspeth and Blanton are groomed for the dash, with the lady several thousand in the lead to start with.

There is one thing you must admit about our County Road work is, that it is furnishing employment for Schleicher County men, we heartily commend our Commission for the manner in which they are handling the job.

### REPORT FROM STATE

#### HEALTH OFFICER.

Austin, Texas, April 2.—The report of the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Board of Health shows that 44 sets of twins were born in Texas during the month of February, 1921, according to Dr. Manton M. Carrick, State Health Officer.

A total of 3,104 deaths were reported; the largest number being among babies under one year of age, the next largest number was between the ages of 20 and 30.

Tuberculosis still leads in the toll of deaths with pneumonia second.
