

The time is approaching for the School Board to order an election to yote a tax for the ment securities the future, the District has been 6. enlarged and this necessarilly calls for the election, and in the present district we have more than one school to provide for, that is, when the new law becomes effective in June.

The School Board will submit the tax after the law becomes effective, Just how much the tax will be is left up to the judgement of the Board of trustees, and in their judgement hangs the destiny of the schools of the district

If the limit of \$1.00 is voted, as it should be, it will be in the power of the Board to fix the rate anywhere between 1 and 100 cents, as the needs may develope, but if a 40, 50 or any specified rate is voted, that must be collected regardless of whether it is more or less than what is needed, therefore we say that the limit should be voted and place the fixing of the rate in the hands of the board. This would avoid any future elecetion for tax, only for building purposes, and it would have to be provided for within the \$1,00 limit.

Don's understand us to be in favor of a \$1.00 tax because that amount is not needed, nor do we believe a 60 cent tax is needed, and for this reason we contend the matter should be placed entirely with the School Board.

## The Story of Our States

By JONATHAN BRACE IX.—NEW HAMPSHIRE



SHIRE falls the honor of casting the vote which definitely formed the

United States. The Constitution was to formally take effect when nine states had ratified it and on June 11, 1788, New Hampshire rounded out the necessary quota of the states. This beat Virginia for the deciding vote by only four days.

The beginnings of New Hampshire lead back to Captain Mason, who had been governor of Portsmouth in Hampshire, England. Thus was the name of the colony derived and also that of its first city, Portsmouth. As a reward for Mason's faithfulness to King Charles he was allotted a large territory north of the Merrimac river. The first settlements were started in 1623 in Rye and Dover. Shortly after, a theological dispute arose in Boston, led by Mrs. Anne Hutchinson, which resulted in her being banished. Some of her followers went north and founded Exeter, not far from the towns of Portsmouth and Dover. Shortly after the town of Hampton was settled by Massachusetts people. As Captain Mason died soon after this, these four towns in 1641 joined themselves to Massachusetts. In 1679, however, King Charles II separated them again and formed the royal province of New Hampshire.

The present area of New Hampshire is 9,341 square miles. From the rugged aspect of its White mountains has come the name Granite state, by which it is often popularly called. The population of New Hampshire warrants an electoral vote of four for president. (© by McClure Newspaper Syndicate.)

vive the privations and difficultles that encompassed it during those first years. There in 1607 was made the first permanent English colony in America. The charter given by King James I to what was known as the London\_company, under whose auspices Jamestown and the later Virginia settlements were founded designated that this colony should extend 200 miles north and 200 miles south of Old Point Comfort and stretch west ward to the sea. Under the reign of Charles II it was considered such an important colony that it was called the fourth dominion of his empire, that is, England Scotland, Ireland and Virginia From this Virginia was often called the Old Dominion. The name Virginia itself means the virgin land and was so called after Queen Elizabeth, the "Virgin Queen." The early government of Virginia is of great interest. At first communism was tried, under which system the land and all property was owned in common and all profits were divided equally. This proved a disastrous failure. In 1619 the first real representative government in the colonies was established, called the house of burgesses, which continued in force under varying fortunes until Virginia joined the Union and became the tenth state in 1788. Much might be written of the character of the early Virginian settlers and their great influence on American life. From Virginia has sprung two other states, Kentucky and West Virginia. Even so, the state's present area is 42,627 square miles. Politically the Old Dominion state is entitled to twelve presidential electors. This is about the average of the southern states. 

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30.

Relating to the amending of Ar. ticle 17. Section 58. of the Con\_ stitution of the State of Texas; abolishing, the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and manage. ment of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as fol.

Section 58. The Legislature missioners' Court Monday and shall have power and authority Tuesday, he report sa good rain to provide by law for the mana. gement and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end A fresh Jersey milch cow for shall have power and authority to place the prison system under the supervision, management and control of such officer as the Legislature may from time to

Sec. 2 The above constitutional amendment shall be sub... mitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a gener. al election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which election all voters fav. oring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words; "For the amendment of of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, a bolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "Against the Amendment of Article 17, Sec. tion 58, of the Constitution, a bolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Sec. 3. The Governor of thi State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Sec. 4. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriat. ed to pay the expenses of such

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, pro. viding that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible un. der the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereun. der; levying a tax of seven (\$,07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property in this State for the payment of such amendment, and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legisla ture of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Section 51 of Arti cle 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as fol.

Section 51; The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of indi. viduals, municipal or other cor... porations whatsoever, provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, who came to Texas prior to Jan. uary 1, 1910, and to their widows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fied resi. dents of this State since Janua. ry 1, 1910, and who were mar. ried to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under special laws of the State of Texas during the war between the states served in or.. ganization for the protection of the frontier against Indian rai. ders or Mexican marauders and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas who were in active service during the war between the states and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent cir. cumstances and who were mar. ried to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the pre. ceding lines of this Section shall not apply to women born since the year 1861, and all soldiers and sailors and widows of sol. diers and sailors eligible under the above conditions shall be entitled to be placed upon the pension rolls and participate in the distribution of the pension fund of this State under any existing law of laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the estab. lishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sail. ors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be pro... vided by law, provided the Leg. islature may provide for hus... band and wife to remain togeth. er in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constituton of Texas a State ad valorem tax on property of seven (\$.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the pay ... ment of pensions for services in

Article 3 of the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate sold... iers, sailors and their widows who have been a resident of this State since January 1, 1910.' Every person sub. ject to none of the foregoing dis\_ qualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elec\_ tor; provided, that electors liv. ing in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided futher. that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any elaction in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next pre. ceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplac... ed said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. A Joint Resolution of the Leg. islature of the State of Texas a. mending Sections of the Constitution of the State of Texas as follows; Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4, re. lating to the compensation of executive officers; and Section 24, Article 3, relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature; of said State.

Be it resulved by the Legisla cure of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4, and Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be so amended as to pereafter read as follows:

Section 5. He shall, at stated imes, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary not to exceed Eight Thousand (\$8,000,00) Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occu. pation of the Governor's Man. sion, fixtures and furniture. Section 21. There shall be a Sec.

All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section, or in office, shall be paid, when received, into the
