"Two men are dead as a result of a train accident yesterday morning when Santa Fe passenger train No. 2, esstbound ng three passengers, at th Bluewater. N. M, crossing. The dead are Elenry Ward Carpenter
and W. C. Jolly. Ira Carpenter a brother of the dead man, jump ed from the car and escaped in
The three occupants of the Ford were brought into Albu-
querque on No. 2 and Carpenter querque on No. 2, and Carpenter died as the train pulled into Al-
buquerque and Mr. Jolly, who was taken immediately to the was taken immediately to the
Santa Fe hospital, died at $7: 30$ last night.
The accident was witnessed by Mrs. D. B. Whitesides, of Bluewater, who said that there were some cars standing on the track and that probably the
men could not see the train. The rossing was a private one; the main road being in bad condition, the driver of the car had avoided
