Vehicle Theft Down

The number of vehicles stolen is down statewide since its record level in 1991 of 168,837. In recent years, the vehicles stolen most often are pick-up trucks. In 1998, the last year for which numbers are available, 96,614 vehicles were reported stolen in Texas. That compares with 101,687 in 1997. The numbers for 1996 and 1995 were 104,928 and Show and Creative Arts Show were also judged. 

On This Date

On this date in 1733 James Edward Oglethorpe, a British philanthropist and member of the House of Commons, arrives at Charleston, South Carolina, with a group of 116 colonists to settle the British territory of Georgia. In 1842 during the first British-Afghan War, British troops retreating from Kabul are ambushed and nearly annihilated at the Khyber Pass. In 1898 French novelist Emile Zola publishes J'Accuse, an open letter to French President Felix Faure that accuses the French judiciary of giving into pressure from the military to perpetuate a cover-up a treason case. In 1992 serial killer Jeffrey Dahmer entered a plea of guilty but insane in fifteen of the seventeen murders he confessed to committing over a thirteen-year period beginning in 1982.


