## WEST TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEETING.

Friday morning, W. O. Alexander, W. H. Parker, L. M. Hoover and A. T. Wright, attended a meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, wherein the Truck and other laws affecting West Texas was thoroughly discussed and the meeting went on record as having the Truck law repealed, it being one of the most unjust laws ever enacted to operate against the people of West Texas. The meeting also favored the establishing of a West Texas A. & M. College.

The meeting also passed a resolution offered by Mr. Alexander endorsing the the bill in Congress, known as the French-Capper or Truth Fabric Bill, this bill is designed to compel manufacturers to stamp his cloth with its contents of virgin wool or shoddy material, so that any purchaser may know which he is buying.

## STERLING WOOL SOLD.

The West Texas Wool and Mohair Associations sells 975,000 pounds of wool last week but did not give out the price.

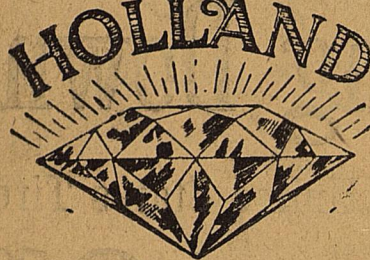

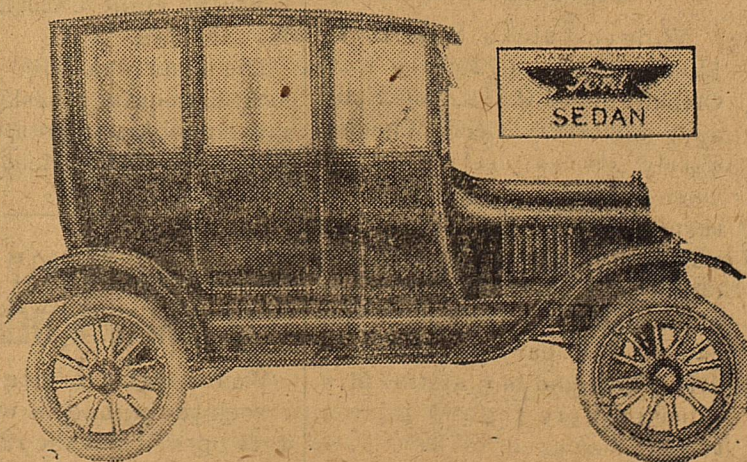

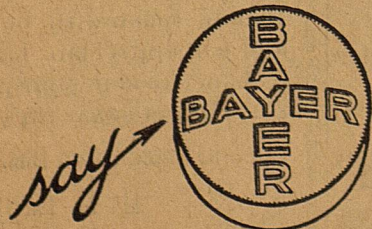
