KELLIS TO FAVOR TRUCK LAW AMENOMENT.

W. F. Kellis says when he goes to the coming special session of legislature he will favor amendment to senate bill No. 101 so as to exempt from taxation all vehicles except on hard-surfaced roads; he will also support a rural school aid bill and a measure providing for legislative and senatorial redistricting bill.

Mr. Kellis says that he has received many letters of protest against the truck law bill, these same letters of protest should be filed with the Governor, the law as passed by the last legislature is an insult to the people of this section of Texas, the tax before the new law was passed amounted to ten percent on the investment, which we think is tax enough, Eldorado now pays ten dollars per ton on freight, and in cases of bad wet weather sometime pay more.

We have taxed ourselves to build a good highway, now comes the law makers of Texas and put an additional excessive tax on the people of such counties as this, every tax placed on the truck comes of the people, as the truck men are just getting by any way.

The proper thing to do is to repeal that truck law outright, it's unjust and rotten to the core. We are in favor of a heavy fine for a truck man to use a hard-surface road without good rubber tires, but do not tax the people of this section to maintain some other portion of the state. We cannot abandon the truck, it's an absolute necessity for this county, and if the present legislative body does not repeal this law, The Success will be thoroughly convinced that it will be necessary to de-void Texas.

KILLING NEAR MILLERSVIEW IN CONCHO COUNTY.

J. William Bryant, of Eden Texas, was killed near Millersview, Concho County, at the Tom Bengé ranch, Thursday June 9. Tom Bengé was arrested and taken to Ballinger jail.

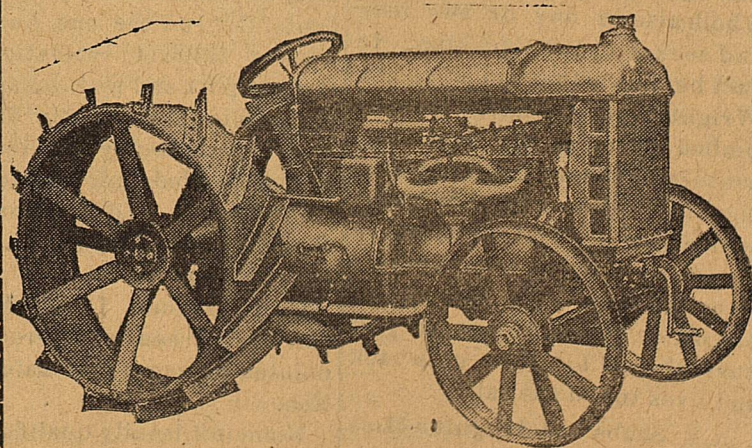

ORDER FOR SCHOOL TAX ELECTION.

Whereas, on this the 14th day of June 1921, at a regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Eldorado Independent School District of Schleicher County, Texas, came on to be considered the petition of W. O. Alexander and 25 other legally qualified property taxpaying voters residing in said school district, praying that an election be ordered to determine whether there shall be annually levied and collected upon all taxable property in said school district an ad valorem tax of fifty cents, (50c) on the one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the support and maintenance of the public free schools of said district and to pay the interest on the bonded indebtedness of said district and to provide a sinking fund to pay the principal at maturity.

Therefore, be it ordered by the Board of Trustees of the Eldorado Independent School District that an election be held at the Bearce Building in the town of Eldorado in said school district on the 16th day of July 1921, to determine whether the Board of Trustees of said school district shall have authority annually to levy and collect upon all taxable property in said district an ad valorem tax of fifty cents, (50c) on the one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the support and maintenance of the public free schools of said district and to pay the interest on the bonded indebtedness of said district and to provide a sinking fund to pay the principal at maturity.

C. I. Dabney, L. M. Hoover and J. P. Green are hereby appointed managers of said election.

None but legally qualified property tax-paying voters shall vote at said election. Those in favor of levying such tax shall have written or printed upon their ballots "For the Tax", and those opposed to the levying of such tax shall have written or printed upon their ballots "Against the tax".

A copy of this order, signed by the president and attested by the secretary of this board, shall serve as proper notice of this election, and the president shall cause notice of said election to be given as required by law.

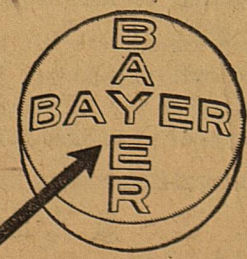

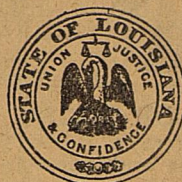

The Story of Our States

By JONATHAN BRACE
XVIII.—LOUISIANA



THE discovery of Louisiana dates back to the beginning of the Sixteenth century, when the Spanish explorers, Alvarez de Pineda and De Soto sailed up the Mississippi. In 1682 La Salle descended the Mississippi and took possession of the entire valley in the name of the French king, Louis XIV. In his honor this region was named Louisiana. French colonies soon sprang up, including New Orleans, which was founded in 1718.

An interesting chapter of Louisiana was the formation of the Company of the West by a financial schemer named John Law. This company ostensibly was to exploit the new colony and held out to speculators an alluring get-rich-quick scheme.

In 1763 France ceded Louisiana east of the Mississippi to England, and, by secret treaty, New Orleans and the western territory went to Spain. Spanish rule proved unendurable to the inhabitants and the restrictions over the navigation of the Mississippi led to hostilities between the northern American settlements and Spain. This situation, however, was brought to a peaceful termination by Spain relinquishing her rights to this territory to France and the purchase in 1803 by the United States from France of the entire Louisiana territory.

The southern portion of this acquisition was organized as the territory of Orleans and in 1812 was admitted as the eighteenth state of the Union, with an area of 48,506 square miles. As the Louisiana coat-of-arms has a pelican in its center, the state is often called the Pelican State.

The Story of Our States

XVII.—OHIO



THE Northwest Territory, of which Ohio is a part, was a bone of contention between Spain, France and England. Spain's claim was based on the voyage of De Soto up the Mississippi river. France, through the explorations of La Salle from the north and the early entry of French priests from Canada, considered this territory theirs. As for England, she rested her claims on the discovery of North America by the Cabots, and in the charter granted to Virginia included all the country lying to the West.

The French were the first to get a foothold in Ohio, but the English pioneers, who shortly began to drift westward, firmly established their settlements in the fertile Ohio valley. After a long period of warfare, in which the Indians played a leading part, the Northwest Territory was finally ceded to the United States by the Treaty of Independence in 1783. And Virginia and other states, which had laid claim to portions of this region turned over their rights to the federal government.

The government of the Northwest Territory was formally created by the ordinance of 1787. People from the East migrated into this territory in such numbers that by 1803 Ohio was taken into the Union as the seventeenth state. The fourth largest state in size of population, Ohio has 24 electoral votes for President, while in area, with its 41,040 square miles, it ranks only thirty-fifth, which shows how densely it is populated. It is noted as the state of Presidents. President Harding makes the seventh Ohioan to fill the presidential office.

The name Ohio is derived from the Iroquois word O-hee-yo, meaning "beautiful river." It was first applied by the Indians of the Five Nations to what we now call the Allegheny river, one of the chief tributaries of the Ohio. Gradually the name came to include the whole river, sometimes even being applied to the Mississippi. Later it was confined to the river between Pittsburg and Cairo, and appropriately the first state formed on its northern bank was named after it. Ohio is often called the Buckeye State from its large number of horse-chestnut trees.
