President Harding's plan for the War Finance Corporation to take \$500,000,000 of the bonds of railroads, advance the money on them issue its own securities on them, and thus guarantee their payment by underwriting them looks mighty good to the financiers who are in the habit of picking up all desirable bond issues. Certainly it looks good to Wall Street. They say that it will stimulate business, too, by turning loose that much money through the railroads.

These bonds will be a second lien to those now on the railroad properties, and will be looking for a long time for payment of interest and principal of these bonds thus underwritten and guaranteed as to both principal and interest by the government through the War Finance Corporation. It will set the bad precedent of the government lending its credit to enable a private enterprise to do what it should be able to do for itself.

Henry Ford bought a railroad up in Michigan not long ago. He finds it not a difficult matter to pay the employes not less than \$8.00 a day, and to reduce freight rates, too, as fast as the Interstate Commerce Commission will permit him to do. He is not continually calling for some help from the government, but is running the road to render service a railroad is built for and nothing else, running it to haul passengers and freight at the rates in effect today he finds so profitable that he is honestly ashamed to take all the money and begs for a lowered rate.

A few years ago when he announced a wage policy different from any other yet in practice he was damned from one end of the country to the other by certain classes of employers because of his wage policy. Today his factories are among the few running to capacity, and it is because he is doing the business and making the money by paying such wages. Now, with the same iconoclasm in the matter of railroad wages and railroad rates the railroad managers of the country and especially the financial interests that control them will be raising the same sort of howl about him as a dangerous citizen and one upsetting the business of the country. — The Southland Farmer.

SHEEP AND TARIFF.

Eldorado Success: Now is the time to buy sheep. To make money out of anything you must buy it while it is down in price.

Dallas News: Sheep are down in price. The "emergency" tariff law gives sheep "protection" at the rate of one dollar to two dollars a head. But it takes a good shee to sell for as much as its alleged "protection" amounts to. Wool is given "protection" of from fifteen to forty-five cents a pound, under the new tariff, yet it isn't bringing in the primary market as much as its "protection". Our sheep raisers ought to look back upon

the days of free trade in wool and mutton, under the Democratic administration. Then they had theoretical competition with the wool and mutton of the outside world, but somehow they got better prices then than now. The reason was, at least in part, that they shared proportionately in the prosperity that comes with active international trade. Giving a shepherd theoretical protection doesn't do him any good if his markets are taken from him. Of course he has his home market. We hear a great deal about the home market, and how it should be reserved for the home producer. But our shepherds can tell any little boy or any little girl how the home market acts. It is saturated most of the time. With the outside world looking to other sources for its wool and mutton, our sheep raisers must look to their home market. And the inability of the home market to absorb all that is offered keeps the price flat.

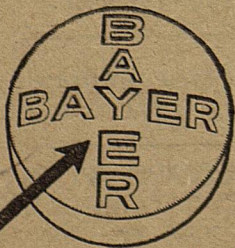

THE RISING GENERATION

"I WONDER what sort of men and women the children of today will make?" sighed the professor. "They all seem to have the idea that amusement is the one thing that is important. They spend their days and evenings on the streets, in theaters, or in automobiles. I don't see how they can grow up with any serious sense of the responsibilities of life."

"I suppose there ought to be a law," rejoined the low-browed man. "It is time to call a halt. Well may we ask, whither are we drifting?"

But, to tell the truth, I'm not losing any sleep over that proposition. I have the idea that the kids of this generation will stack up as high as any you ever knew. Among them there are several presidents of the United States, and innumerable congressmen and postmasters, and perhaps one or two Shakespeares.

"I've noticed that the old boys always view with alarm where the kids are concerned. It was that way when I was young. The boys of our neighborhood formed a gang, and we used to assemble every evening for diversion. There were no automobiles or movies then. Our pleasures were of the cheap but filling kind. In the winter, when there was snow, we took our handsleds and had great sport. Our parents found it impossible to get us to do any useful work when the evening was good, and said parents used to get pretty despondent over it.

"I have heard my father say a hundred times that the boys of that period were not worth the powder that would blow them off the landscape. 'All they think of is fun,' he used to say, so discouraged he could hardly stand it. 'When I was young,' he'd go on, 'children understood that amusement was merely incidental, not an end and aim in itself. When I was ten years old I used to saw all the wood used by the family, and carry buckets of water from a spring two miles away, and milk fourteen cows, and curry eight horses, and polish the stove, and hang out the week's washing, and when I had a few minutes to spare I sat down and read a good book, so that when I was twelve years old I knew the unabridged dictionary by heart. But the boys of the present day won't do anything useful or profitable unless you stand over them with a club.'

"Father used to talk that way all the time, until I got sick of hearing him. My grandfather was alive then, and he felt worse about it than dad did. He used to say he'd be jiggered if he could see anything ahead of such boys as he knew, but the jail or the poorhouse. All we cared for was a good time.

"It was the same way at school. If a boy was half an hour late in the morning, because he got interested in a game of marbles on his way to school, the teacher would say he never did see such a frivolous bunch as the boys of that generation were, and then he'd take down a small sapling from the wall and larrup the student until his troubled soul was soothed. "All the old graybeards were agreed that the boys of the neighborhood were headed for the everlasting how-rows, and we were always being lectured and roasted and held up as horrible examples. Yet, the most of us did pretty well. I am the only one I can recall who didn't make a shining success of life. I am grand worthy custodian of my aunt's cows. I might have risen to a greater height, but I was crossed in love when I was young. A man doesn't recover from an experience like that. He loses his ambition to be president, and is satisfied to peddle milk.

"But Freddie Bilker became a successful book agent, and has his own motorcycle; Jim Gangling studied law and finally was appointed notary public by the governor; Charlie Ormiston also studied law, and got a job on the police force; Oliver Messway is the best southpaw pitcher in the cross-country league, yet the old fossils used to say he would come to a bad end; then there was—"
