REV. S. C. DUNN HONORED IN MASONRY

According to the Brady Standard, Rev. S. C. Dunn, popular pastor of the First Methodist Church, of Brady, has been appointed to the Grand Chaplain to the Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M. of Texas, at their meeting in Waco last week.

The many friends of Rev. Dunn here will be glad to hear of his thus being honored.

ARTICLE 2 AND ARTICLE 10.

Re-read article 10 of the Wilson League of Nations and then read article 2 of the Harding administration and then tell us what the real difference is, they have practically copied article 10. Article ten was the basis of the Republican fight against the Wilson League and in which Harding help to defeat, now he hands it back under the guise of his own plans of an Association of Nations.

Wilson's Article 10.

"The members of the League undertake to respect and preserve, as against external aggression, the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all members of the League. In case of any such aggression or in case of any threat or danger of such aggression, the council shall advise upon the means by which this obligation shall be fulfilled."

Harding's Article 2.

"If the said rights are threatened by the aggressive action of any other power, the high contracting parties (the United States, Japan, Great Britain and France) shall communicate with one another fully and frankly in order to arrive at an understanding as to the most efficient measures to be taken, jointly or separately, to meet the exigencies of the particular situation."

If article 2 is worth considering by the Republican party, how then can they account for the blasphemous things said about article 10.

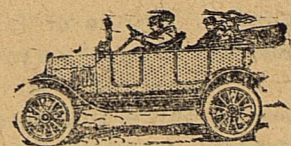

I was inclined to murmur and repine, for I was just done with my housecleaning and was so tired I felt as though I'd like to lie down and sleep for six months, and there I was with a sick child in the house, and I was to be up night and day seeing that she didn't catch cold for if a child catches cold when she has that disease, some of the measles are sure to strike in, and then she goes blind or loses her hearing or becomes an idiot."

"I was complaining to Mr. Curfew and saying harsh, bitter things, when a boy came to the door with a telegram.  argument is necessary."

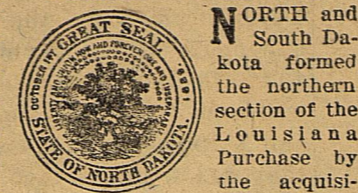

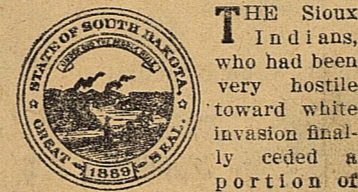
**The Story of
 Our States**

 XXXIX.—DAKOTAS



NORTH and
 South Da-
 kota formed
 the northern
 section of the
 Louisiana Purchase by
 the acqui-
 sition of which from France the
 United States nearly doubled its
 size.

The Dakotas were the last
 states which were made up wholly
 from this purchase, to be-
 come a part of the Union. Short-
 ly after its acquisition, the Lew-
 is and Clark expedition was sent
 out to explore it and they spent
 their first winter in 1804 near
 Mandan. The British had many
 fur posts in this region, and as
 they considered it part of Brit-
 ish territory, they built a fort
 in 1810 near Pembina. British
 rights, however, were withdrawn
 in the Treaty of 1818, which es-
 tablished the formal boundary
 between the United States and
 Canada.



THE Sioux
 Indians,
 who had been
 very hostile
 toward white
 invasion final-
 ly ceded a
 portion of
 their land to the government in
 1851. This was opened up for
 settlement and thus immigration
 was started in this part of the
 country. In 1854 the section
 west of the Missouri river be-
 came a part of Nebraska territory,
 while the portion to the
 East was attached to Minnesota.
 However, in 1861, the separate
 Territory of Dakota was organ-
 ized. Population did not increase
 rapidly, until 1866, due to the
 warlike demonstrations of the
 Indians.

It is from these Indians that
 the name Dakota comes.

But it was not until 1889 that
 the Dakota territory was divided
 and formed into two states. To
 avoid any feeling of jealousy as
 to which was made a state first,
 the two bills were signed by
 President Harrison after they
 had been shuffled up and were
 then re-shuffled so it is not
 known which was signed first.
 Their areas are about the same,
 North Dakota containing 70,837
 square miles, while South Da-
 kota has 77,615 square miles.
 The population is also about
 equal and each is entitled to five
 presidential electors.
