

### SCISD unveils School Breakfast Program as students return from holiday break

ning Monday, January 7, 2002. assist schools in providing a nu-Students returning from their holtered in order to make time for the school children. The children may federally funded program.

Participation in the program, which is administered by the Texas Education Agency, is optional. SCISD trustees chose last year to care institutions. implement the program here, making a free nutritious breakfast available to every SCISD student.

According to information provided by the TEA, the goal of the program is to effectively meet the nutritional needs of Texas children by offering low-cost nutritious breakfasts to all children during the school day. Locally, low-cost translates to free since the household income requirements of the district's students qualifies for full reimbursement from federal funds.

It should be noted that every student, kindergarten through 12th grade, will be required to participate. While schedules have not been entirely agreed upon, campus administrators are working hard to make sure the students can cycle through the cafeteria in a timely

According to an information sheet provided to Eldorado Midwill be required to take the prepared food. They must select at least 3 of the 4 items presented. After that, the students may eat the food, give it to another student, or throw it away.

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
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## A post-Sept. 11 view of Eldorado...as seen through the eyes of an Italian journalist

The boldface banner headline under the photos reads: The mobilization of the Cowboys: we will defend America.



After further investigation, it was determined that the threat was not credible. At this time, there is no information to suggest that any threat to a Texas school exists.


