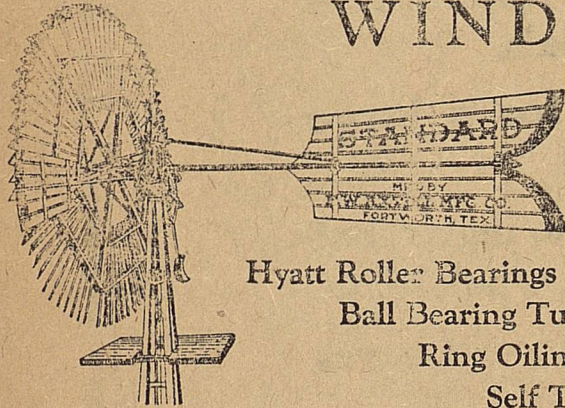

The Success joins the many, many friends in wishing these esteemable young people many happy events a long life's road and may their sunset be as bright as the beginning of this new day.

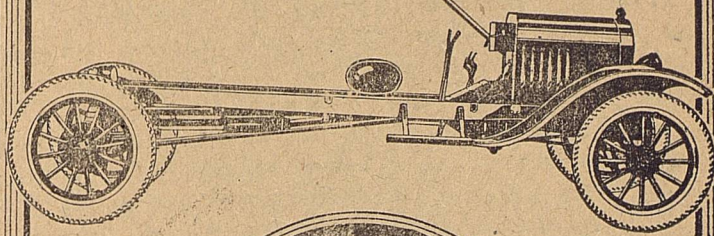
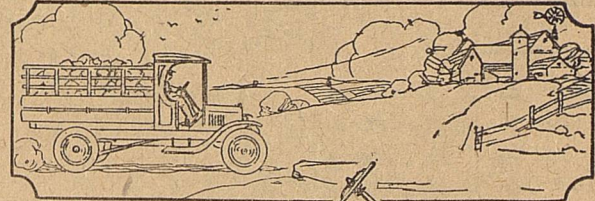
