
## Mittel completes 35 years as volunteer weather observer

Today's improved communications makes the data from cooperative weather station available on a real time basis meaning this data has a direct affect on stock prices, building and construction, and industrial production.

#### City of Eldorado Ordinance 101-2 **Animal Control**

Adopted June 3, 2002

I. Purpose This animal control ordinance is enacted to regulate, restrict, or prohibit, if necessary, animals; to protect the public from unvaccinated, diseased, stray, roaming, dangerous, or wild animals; to make unlawful acts of animals that interfere with the enjoyment of property or the peace and safety of the community; and to carry out any other lawful duties authorized by state laws and applicable ordinances. This ordinance supersedes Animal Control Ordinance #104-97 as amended, as well as any and all other Animal Control Ordinances previously enacted by the City of Eldorado.

II. Jurisdiction This ordinance shall be applicable within the corporate limits of the City of Eldorado, Texas.

III. Administration and Enforcement The City hereby authorizes the City Administrator and Animal Control Officer to enforce the provisions of this ordinance within the corporate limits of the City. **IV. Provisions** 

A. Dogs and Cats

1. An annual license shall be required for every dog or cat, four (4) months old or older. Licenses may be obtained at Eldorado City Hall.

a. In order to obtain a license the owner must provide proof of current rabies vaccination for the animal and pay a fee of five (5) dollars.

b. A City collar tag will be issued at the time the license is granted.

to wear City collar tags. Any dog or cat found not wearing a City collar tag will be presumed to be unlicensed and will be subject to impound.

d. In every case, it is the Owner's responsibility to renew the annual License in a timely manner.

e. When ownership of an animal changes, it is the responsibility of the owner to notify City of the change. f. City collar tags may not be

transferred from animal to animal. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to own, or keep custody of or to take care of more than four (4) dogs and four (4) cats, (4) months or older. Any dog or cat found not wearing a City collar tag is presumed to be unlicensed and without permit, and will be subject to impound. City collar tags may not be transferred from animal to animal.

3. Commercial Kennels are allowed under this ordinance for the purpose of boarding, cleaning and grooming cats and dogs under the conditions specified below:

a. Commercial Kennels operating within the corporate limits of the City must meet and adhere to all pertinent State and Federal guidelines.

b. An annual inspection by the Animal Control Officer finds that the Commercial Kennel is operating in a safe, clean and humane fashion.

c. Noise and/or odors from a Commercial Kennel must not interfere with the rights of neighbors to peacefully enjoy and use their property.

d. Commercial Kennels will pay an annual inspection fee of \$50 to the City and will be subject to periodic inspections by the Animal Control Officer.

B. Songbirds, Fish and Traditional Indoor Pets

1. Persons desiring to keep pet songbirds, fish, and/or traditional indoor pets, including but not limited to hamsters, ferrets, mice, and small reptiles, within the corporate limits of the City of Eldorado may do so without a permit or license provided that they are kept in a clean and well maintained cage and/or aquarium and are maintained in accordance with appropriate state and federal laws.

2. Songbirds and/or fish and/or traditional indoor pets must not interfere with the rights of neighbors to peace-

fully enjoy and use their property. C. Livestock or other Domestic

1. No person shall keep any pigs, sheep, horses, mules, or goats, or any chickens, ducks, geese, turkeys, or other domestic fowl, cattle or livestock within the corporate boundaries of the City.

D. Violations

1. It shall be unlawful for any person to own, keep, possess, or maintain an animal in such a manner as to constitute a public nuisance or a nuisance to neighbors. By way of example and not of limitation, the following acts or actions of an owner, harborer, or possessor of an animal are hereby declared to be a public nuisance and are, therefore, unlawful

a. Having an animal that disturbs the rights of, threatens the safety of or damages a member of the general public or interferes with the ordinary use and enjoyment of their prop-

b. Allowing or permitting an animal to damage the property of anyone other than its owner, including, but not limited to, turning over garbage containers or damaging gardens, flowers or vegetables, or defecating upon the property of another; or

c. Maintaining animals in an environment of unsanitary conditions or lack of cleanliness which results in offensive odor or is dangerous to the public health, welfare of safety, or a failure to maintain a condition of good order and cleanliness which reduces the probability of transmission of disease; or

d. Maintaining property that is offensive, annoying or dangerous to the public health, safety or welfare of the community because of the number, type, variety, density or location of the animals on the property; or

f. Maintaining an animal that is diseased and dangerous to the public

2. The owner of every animal shall be responsible for the removal of any excreta deposited by his or her animal(s) on public walks, recreation areas, or private property.

3. Complaints of alleged violations of this ordinance will be referred to the Animal Control Officer for investigation and possible enforcement.

V. Enforcement A. Animals will be allowed on public property only if they are kept on a leash or another person assigned by the

B. Any animal found on public property in violation of Section V. (A.) may be impounded by the Animal Control officer until such time as:

1. The animal is claimed by its owner, and

2. All fines and fees, including License and/or Permit fees, allowed by this ordinance are paid in full.

3. Proof of current rabies vaccination is provided to the Animal Control Officer.

4. Animals impounded under this three (3) working days nor longer than lined above.

VI. Fines and Animal Control Fee A. Violations of this ordinance are punishable by a fine of not less than \$50

and not more than \$500 per offense. B. Persons convicted of violating this ordinance will also be charged court costs as allowed by the laws of the State of Texas.

C. The Animal Control Fee for violations of this ordinance will be \$25 per D. The City Administrator, Animal

Control Officer, and all other City employees are hereby prohibited from waiving Animal Control Fees and/or Fines allowed under this ordinance.

E. Impound fees will be charged to animal owners at the rate of \$10 per

F. Euthanization fees will be charged to animal owners at the rate of \$25 per

VII. Dangerous Animals

A. Reports of animal attacks on humans or other animals will be referred to the Animal Control Officer for investigation. Animals suspected in such attacks may be impounded for rabies observation, as deemed necessary by the Animal Control Officer and at the sole expense of the Owner. Animals will be released from impound only after successfully completing the rabies observation period, as provided by Texas law, and then only after all City license and/or permit fees as well as impound fees have been paid in full. No partial payments will be allowed. In cases involving stray animals, or when an animal's owner cannot be identified animals reported as being g. Maintaining an animal that involved in attacks on humans or other animals, will be humanely euthaat or attacks pedestrians, joggers, nized after being impounded for 3 (three) working days. However, depending on the animal's physical characteristics, Animal Control Officer may determine and order that euthanization take place sooner than the 3 (three) working days outlined above.

B. Animals believed to be dangerous may be reported to the Animal Control Officer for investigation. If the Animal Control Officer considers the animal to be dangerous it will be impounded until a hearing can be held in a court of law to determine the animal's fate, provided the animal's ownand are accompanied by their owner er can be identified. In those cases, the owner will pay all expenses related to the impounding of the animal. The owner will also reimburse the City for expenses relating to humanely euthanizing the animal, provided the court orders the animal to be destroyed. In cases involving dangerous or aggressive animals when the owner cannot be identified, said animals will be humanely euthanized after being impounded for 3 (three) working days. However, depending on the animal's physical characteristics, Animal Control Officer may determine and order that euthanization take place soonordinance will be kept no less than er than the 3 (three) working days out-


