Gill Makes Swing Thru North of District

Republican Congressional candidate Dick Gill recently returned to San Antonio from a highly successful two-week swing through the northern part of the 21st District. Top state and national GOP leaders, meanwhile, lauded the race for the Congressional seat following a major campaign strategy session in San Antonio Monday.

Gill kicked off his tour of the north half of the District on June 15th with a three-day stop in Odessa—during which time he formally opened his Ector County Campaign headquarters. The remainder of the week was spent in San Angelo before returning to San Antonio for the week end of strategy conferences.

Those conferences culminated in a high-level critique of the campaign's progress Monday night by Texas' National GOP Committeeman and Committeewoman, Peter O'Donnell and Ann Armstrong, and representatives from State GOP headquarters in Austin. The results of the session were summed up by O'Donnell, who said he felt the 21st District race was steadily progressing toward a GOP victory in November.

"I think you have made excellent progress so far," O'Donnell commented after the three-hour session. "You have been doing all the right things and you have been doing them well."

Mrs. Armstrong seconded that

opinion, after saying that she had earlier maintained some doubts about the winability of the race: "Six months ago, I questioned whether or not this race could be won; I am amazed at how far you have come so quickly, and I am certain now that we will have a Republican victory in November."

Assistant Campaign Director Jim McHargue noted that Gill-For-Congress Committees are already fully organized and operational in nine of the district's 21 counties—with a target date of August 1 set for organizing the remaining committees.

In making that report, McHargue also noted definite attitude change across the district compared with 1968: "We have already exploded the 'Fisher Myth,'" McHargue said, "the idea that O. C. Fisher is invincible. I have been traveling this district every day for three months and there is a uniformity of opinion that O. C. Fisher can and will be beaten in November."

ON T.C.U. DEAN'S LIST

Ft. Worth, Texas.—Martha Sue Page of Eldorado has been named to the Dean's Honor List for the 1970 Spring semester at Texas Christian University.

As Many As 46 May Die In Texas Mishaps

Austin, Tex.—Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today cautioned motorists that traffic accidents during the Independence Day period from 6:00 p.m. Thursday, July 2, to midnight Sunday, July 5 may claim as many as 46 lives in Texas.

"I am urging all Texans to adopt the 'Drive Friendly' theme during this holiday and to avoid unsafe practices which contribute to accidents," Speir said.

The DPS director listed the chief factors contributing to traffic crashes as speed too fast for conditions, driving while drinking, and driving on the wrong side of the road, often as the result of fatigue.

Speir said all available Highway Patrolmen will be on duty during the holiday period, augmented by uniformed officers from other DPS services. Also, the DPS will conduct its "Operation Motorcade" program of tabulating and announcing traffic accidents three times daily in an effort to bring about increased awareness of the added dangers of holiday travel.

In addition to Department of Public Safety efforts, trained truck and bus industry safety men will take to the roads to participate in a unique Holiday Road Patrol.

Some 45 to 50 road patrol cars manned by experienced members of the Texas Council of Safety Supervisors will be on the highways to aid motorists in trouble. The program is sponsored by the Texas Motor Transportation Association, a statewide organization representing the motor carrier industry.

Junior Chamber of Commerce organizations in many parts of the state will operate rest stops for

motorists along heavily traveled highways.

News media, business, and trade groups are also participating in the traffic safety program and the DPS director lauded their contributions.

"We especially appreciate the close cooperation of newspapers, the broadcast industry, and the outdoor advertising companies in helping focus public attention on safe driving," Speir added.

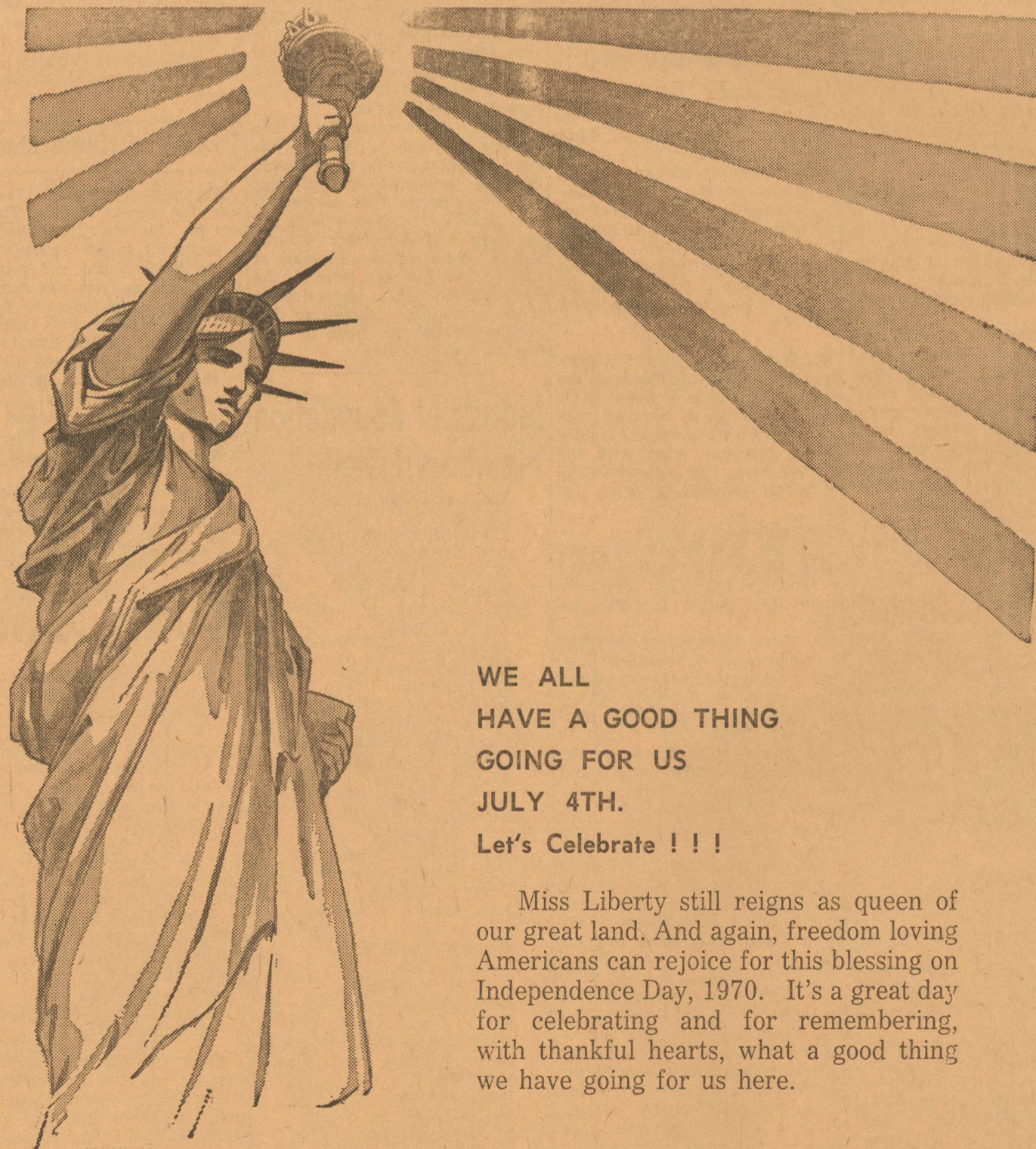

Good Food Buys For Warm Weather

College Station, Texas.—June is Dairy Month and time to call attention to the fine quality of our national milk supply, reminds Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist.

"Milk is protected all the way from the cow to you, then the responsibility is yours," Mrs. Clyatt said. "Keep milk covered and in the coldest part of the refrigerator."

This is also a good time to try new and different milk products, she added.

Warmer weather is accompanied by less demand for the less tender cuts of beef requiring the moist-heat method of cooking," Mrs. Clyatt noted. "This is one reason why the forequarter cuts are reasonably priced, making chuck roasts and steaks economical buys."

A few of the quick-cooking beef steaks, ground beef and liver are also marked at lower than usual prices in some markets.

"In the pork department, Boston butt roasts, shoulder steaks, ham, picnics and bacon are generally the best choice, pricewise," Mrs. Clyatt said.

Some of the good quality vegetables now available are potatoes, several varieties of squash, corn, carrots, cabbage, mustard greens, and collards, she said. Others include cucumbers, green onions, radishes, and head lettuce, Mrs. Clyatt added.

"Bell peppers are more plentiful and prices are lower," the specialist said. "Oranges, apples, bananas, pineapples, strawberries, avocados, honey-dew melons, cantaloupes and watermelons are in good supply and prices are attractive," she said.

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

Spider mites are one of the most destructive pests of tomatoes. By their feeding on the sap of tomato plants they can greatly decrease production of tomatoes in the home garden. When spider mites are left uncontrolled tomato plants soon die. Heaviest damage is caused to tomato plants during hot, dry weather.

The leaves of damaged tomato plants become blotched with pale yellow spots ranging from small specks to large areas on both the upper and lower surfaces. The underside of the leaves look like they have been lightly dusted with fine white powder. With magnification fine strands of silk and small greenish or reddish mites can be seen.

Several materials may be used to control spider mites. These are dicofol (Kelthane), sulfur and malathion. Dicofol will give most effective control but several applications may be required. Sulfur and malathion are not as effective but might be used where dicofol is not available.

Pesticides should be applied according to information given on the label. Further information on control of pests in the home garden is available at my office.

Grasshoppers can cause damage to rangeland as well as cultivated crops in Schleicher county. Control should start when grasshoppers become noticeably abundant.

Signs of threatening infestations of grasshoppers can be found along roadsides and ditch banks as well as in and along the sides of idle fields.

Field margins are usually the hatching places for grasshoppers that damage row crops. Early treatment of such areas before the young grasshoppers move into the field will reduce the acreage that might otherwise need treatment.

Insecticides in the form of sprays, dusts or baits can be used

to control grasshoppers. Sprays give higher initial kills than dusts and continue to kill for a longer period of time.

Information on the selection and use of insecticides for control of grasshoppers on cultivated crops or rangeland can be obtained at my office.

Perfectionist: One who takes great pains and gives them to other people.

Tomato blight can ruin an otherwise healthy crop if proper fungus control isn't practiced.

Both the early and late varieties of blight cause the ripening tomato fruit to take on a soft, watery appearance. However, these diseases can be controlled by regular spraying with fungicide such as Polygram, folpet or one of the maneb types.

Spray the plants at ten to 14-day intervals by completely covering the foliage. This will prevent rotting of the fruit as it matures this summer.

Portable elevators and augers are found on most Texas grain and hay farms. They quickly move material into bins, mows or other storage facilities, relegating the scoop shovel to the museum and saving long hours of back breaking labor.

As is true with most pieces of equipment safe operation depends upon the human element; thus, recently these conveyors have become known as "people grabbers." Lacerations, amputations and fractures have resulted. Fingers, legs, hands and feet have become entangled with the PTO shaft, V-belt, and pulley auger flighting and flight chain. People often remove guards or fail to replace them after repairing a machine. People, who know better, adjust equipment while operating when it should be stopped.

Elevator and auger accidents can be prevented. Today's equipment is improved in design efficiency and safety. But, it is up to the man using the machine to stay clear of moving parts, to keep shields on, to keep children away, to use care and prudence in operation and maintenance of equipment.

Austin, Tex.—If you are very rich, you can afford cheap construction. When you buy a home you are making your most important investment. When you repair or remodel, you are increasing the value of that investment.

"Make certain the materials used in the house you buy, or for the improvements you make, are adequate for the job," warns Joe Butler, executive vice president of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas. "When you buy materials, it pays not to skimp. Good materials are not necessarily the most expensive and you will save money in the long run by avoiding expensive repairs and maintenance costs," Butler states. "You need products that look good, are easy to maintain and last a long time. Your local lumber dealer can advise you, particularly as to the proper grades of lumber and plywood products."

If you plan to use the services of a contractor, take care to choose one with a reputation for honesty and good workmanship. Talk with people for whom he has done work. Ask your lender about him if you plan to finance the project with a loan, and find out how he rates with the building material dealers from whom he buys. "If you have a lot of money and can afford high maintenance costs, you can afford cheap materials. However, the average person cannot afford that luxury," Butler says.
