The leaves of damaged tomato plants become blotched with pale other people. ellow spots ranging from small pecks to large areas on both the apper and lower surfaces. The underside of the leaves lock like they have been lightly dusted with fine white powder. With magnification ine strands of silk and small greenish or reddish mites can be seen.

Several materials may be used to control spider mites. These are dic-ciol (Kelthane), sulfur and malathion. Dicofol will give most effective control but several applications may be required. 



6 Flounder fillets Salt and Pepper 2 cups coarsely crushed

2 tablespoons drained capers 3 hardcooked eggs, chopped 1/2 cup tomato juice 1/4 cup melted butter or 1 large dill pickle, chopped margarine

Sprinkle flounder fillets with salt and pepper. Combine the remaining ingredients, except butter, and blend well. Spread mixture thinly on fillets. Roll up and fasten with a toothpick. Stand rolls upright side by side in a greased 8-inch square baking pan. Brush with butter. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes or until fish becomes white and flakes easily. Serve hot, garnished with lemon slices and parsley sprigs. Serves six.
