

The measure passed on a 3-1 vote with commissioners Bill Clark, Johnny Mayo and Kirk Griffin voting in favor and Ross Whitten voting against. The men further directed that the transmission be repaired on the 1997 cruiser and that it be kept as a spare. However, a 1996 Ford currently in the Sheriff's Department fleet will be used as a trade-in.

Next, the commissioners renewed what has become a regular discussion at their bi-weekly meetings concerning the county Ag Building. Judge Griffin explained that he had asked San Angelo architect Gary Donaldson to look at the property but that Donaldson has yet to do so. At one point the question was asked as to why the county had agreed to trade for the building in the first place. Judge Griffin reminded the men that they had decided the acquisition from the school district would help reduce the demand on the county Memorial Building, a building that is itself in need of repairs.





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

Here in Eldorado, the EMS is a volunteer ambulance service that has 2 paid personnel, 18 volunteers and 1 physician. With these funds we have to budget for daily expenses, supplies, training, ambulances up keep, payroll, State licenses and dues, and continued education of the personnel.

Property Tax Benefits

Renditions: All property owners have the right to render their property to the Appraisal District. A rendition is a written document stating the name and address of the owner, the legal description of the property and may contain a estimate of the value. It must be submitted to the District between January 1 and April 16.

Protests: All property owners with real or personal property that has increased in valuation by \$1000 or more will receive a notice of appraised value. These notices will be mailed in May. If the property owner is dissatisfied with the value set by the district he should contact the Appraisal District to discuss the valuation. If the question is not resolved, he may appeal to the Appraisal Review Board for an adjustment. That protest must be filed by May 31, or within 30 days of the notice, whichever is later.

Homeowners: The Texas Legislature and many local government entities have allowed for part of the value of a homestead to be exempted from taxation. If you have a homestead exemption there is no need to re-file. However, if you have purchased a different home since January 1, 2001 you will need to file for this exemption. If you have questions or need an application you should contact us at the address or phone number listed

Over-65 and Disabled Homeowners: The Texas Legislature allows many local government entities to grant substantial tax relief for homeowners who are over 65 or disabled. A minimum of \$10,000 value exemption is available from all school districts. In addition, over-65 homeowners may have the amount of school tax frozen the year after they are 65. A taxpayer is not eligible for both over 65 and a disability exemption. If you qualify for both, the over 65 exemption will reduce your taxes more than the disability exemptions.

Quarterly Payments and Tax Deferral: If you are 65 or older and have applied for the homestead exemptions for senior citizens, you may pay your current taxes on your home in four installments. Homeowners who are disabled and apply for homestead exemptions also may pay their home taxes in installments. If you are over 65 years of age and are unable to pay your property taxes on your homestead you may be able to defer payment. For additional information contact the Appraisal District at the number listed below.

Farmers and Ranchers: Landowners who are using their land for commercial production of food or fiber may be entitled to receive a special appraisal on their land, which is based on agriculture production. The land must have been utilized for farming or ranching for five of the last seven years and be currently devoted to agricultural use. If you have not been receiving Ag use appraisal on your land in the past and wish to apply, you may receive an application by contacting us at the address listed below.

Disabled Veterans: You may qualify for a property tax exemption if you are either (1) a veteran who was disabled while serving with the U.S. armed forces or (2) the surviving spouse or child (under 18 of age and unmarried) of a disabled veteran or of a member of the armed force who was killed while on active duty.

Asked after the meeting about likelihood of having three vacancies on the board following the election in May, Mankin said that there are currently no plans to fill the seats. "That will be a decision the board will have to make," Mankin stated.

New Business began with the appointment of Physician's Assistant "Ike" Whitten to active staft. It was explained that Whitten will soon be sharing emergency room coverage with Dr. Pat Taylor. To pave the way for Whitten to cover the emergency room, the trustees amended the district's medical staff bylaws as well as the board of trustee bylaws. Randy Mankin explained that the hospital's participation in Medicare's Critical Access Program makes it possible for the emergency room to be covered by a physician's assistant. It was also noted that Whitten will be supervised by Dr. Taylor, during those times when he is covering the E.R.

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
