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Polygamy activist denied access to YFZ cemetery

K. Dee Ignatin showed up at the YFZ Ranch gate last Thursday, just as she promised, and asked to visit the ranch's cemetery. Her request was denied, although at first it appeared as if she might be allowed on the property.

The anti-polygamy activist said she was "very respectful" with her request and offered to wear appropriate attire while on the ranch. In fact, she changed into a long-sleeved blouse and ankle-length skirt and removed magnetic stickers from her pickup that stated "Polygamy is Abuse."

She said her intent was to visit the grave of and pay respects to three-year-old Allen Rulon Rhobock/Jeffs who died in an automobile accident at the ranch on October 26, 2006. A mini-van in which the boy was riding reportedly struck a large boulder, sending the unrestrained child flying over the back seat where he struck his head and died.

Ignatin had in her possession a copy of the state law that states:

a) Any person who wishes to visit a cemetery or private burial grounds for which no public ingress or egress is available shall have the right to reasonable ingress and egress for the purpose of visiting the cemetery or private burial grounds. This right of access extends only to visitation during reasonable hours and only for purposes usually associated with cemetery visits.

(b) The owner or owners of the lands surrounding the cemetery or private burial grounds may designate the routes of reasonable ingress and egress.

Still believing she would be allowed to enter the property, Ignatin pulled her pickup behind that of a ranch resident sent to meet her. At that point, the man opened the gate but remained parked in front

of her pickup, blocking access to the property.

Ignatin said that a few minutes later, the man closed the gate and told her she could not enter because the ranch's attorney, Amy Hennington of San Angelo, had advised that ranch personnel need not let her to visit the cemetery since she had no family buried there.

Ignatin then drove into Eldorado where she visited with Schleicher County Justice of the Peace Jimmy Doyle and Sheriff David Doran, both of whom advised her that her desire to enter the property was a civil matter and advised her to take it up with an attorney.

Later that morning, Ignatin went to the 1893 gravesite of Henry Mahlmann, 44-year-old cowboy buried on the Griffin Ranch just north of the YFZ Ranch. She noted that the gravesite, despite being on private property, was well maintained and accessible to the public.

There are many such graves in Texas, including several here in Schleicher County.

Ignatin has apparently heeded the advice to discuss the matter with an attorney. She explains that she has already been in contact with a lawyer, in addition to contacting O. C.

"Chet" Robbins, executive director of the Texas Funeral Commission.

Ms. Ignatin has asked that her request to visit the cemetery at the YFZ Ranch be mediated as called for by the commission's alternate dispute resolution policy.

K. Dee Ignatin says she is a native Texan who first learned of polygamy when she took a job in the tri-state area of northern Arizona, southern Utah and Nevada. She has since moved back to Texas where she founded Americans Against the Abuses of Polygamy, a non-profit organization which she now oversees as executive director.

Commissioners hear citizen's requests, vote to buy John Deere motorgrader

Former county commissioner Bill Clark met Monday with the Schleicher County Commissioners Court, but it was unclear exactly what he wanted from the men.

Clark seemed to indicate he was pleased with Sheriff David Doran's attempts to recover tools Clark said had been stolen from him. And, Clark said he understood why Doran turned the matter over to the Texas Rangers for investigation.

Still, when asked by County Judge Charlie Bradley exactly what he wanted from the commissioners, Clark replied that he wanted his request on the record that the investigation be handled locally. That prompted the judge to produce a letter he had received from District Attorney Stephen Lupton's investigator Mike Harris. In the letter, Harris referenced and investigation by Texas Ranger Danny Crawford into criminal allegations made by Clark. The letter went on to state that matter was not of a criminal nature and there was not criminal action to be taken. It continued by saying that Clark had been advised that the incident was a civil matter.

Clark, who was accompanied to the meeting by Shane West and Nick Dahlberg, had nothing more to add.

Later in the meeting, Judge Bradley asked Sheriff Doran to comment on Clark's request. Doran said that Clark had complained about a theft but said he did not trust Doran's department to investigate the matter. So, the sheriff said, he turned the matter over to an independent investigator who determined there was no evidence of a crime. Doran stated that Clark's next step was to pursue civil action against the individuals he suspected.

Moving on to other business, the commissioners also heard from Janet Andrews, a county resident who lives in the southeastern corner of the county. Andrews was accompanied by her husband Joe, and their daughter Grace, as well as rancher James Huffman. Ms. Andrews asked that the county should not get involved with a dispute over where the Lower Colorado River Authority will place power transmission lines in Schleicher

County. She said she didn't want the county to get into supporting one group over another.

Swimming pool manager Syllas Polite then spoke briefly with the commissioners about pool attendance and ongoing maintenance of the facility. Judge Bradley advised that a new diving board should arrive at the pool this week.

County Agent Cody Bundick was also on hand and he updated the court on 4-H programs. Bundick told the court that new guns for the 4-H Shooting Sports had arrived and where being retrofitted. He said the group held a fund raiser over the weekend, manning the concession stand at a roping.

Road superintendent Mark Graves asked the court if he could dispose of old junk iron and an old tank. The court gave him permission to have the iron tested for radiation and disposal.

The court then voted to purchase a demo model 770 John Deere motor grader for the amount of \$164,000.00. The original price of \$188,000.00 was decreased significantly with the removal of rippers from the purchase and the trade-in of surplus county road equipment.

Although the grader is provided by Yellowhouse Equipment, it is being purchased through the Houston-Galveston Area Council of Governments.

Jamey West, representing Yellowhouse Equipment, was on hand for the meeting.

Graves also told the court that his crews are preparing the road around the little league field for paving and the paving material has been ordered.

It was also noted that a self-

YFZ defendants ask judge to toss evidence from raid

San Antonio attorney Gerald Goldstein filed a long-awaited 103-page brief Monday in 51st District Court. In it, he asks Judge Barbara Walther, on behalf of his clients, Frederick Merrill Jessop and other YFZ Ranch defendants, to suppress evidence taken from the ranch during the now famous YFZ Raid that began the evening of April 3, 2008.

Goldstein's brief argues that Texas law enforcement, specifically Sheriff Schleicher County David Doran and Texas Ranger Brooks Long should have known that the call that prompted the raid was a hoax. Goldstein also argues that lawmen "fully intended to lay siege to this community, interrogate hundreds of children, and rummage through the 'multiple' residences and religious structures located therein."

Goldstein's brief came two months after a four-day long evidentiary

hearing and more than a month after Deputy Attorney General Eric Nichols filed his brief in the case.

Goldstein's brief repeated multiple arguments made by the defense team during the previous hearing.

The lawyer's central argument seems to be condensed in one statement, "In short, it is clear that the authorities used what turns out to be a hoax phone call as an excuse for staging a massively intrusive raid upon a disfavored religious group. Under the guise of looking for a man they should have known was not there and a child that did not exist, the Texas authorities conducted a general search to see what they could find."

Deputy Attorney General Eric Nichols' argument on behalf of the prosecution was much more concise and to the point. The 14-page document was even written in such a way

Lillie Belle "Pat" Kent May



Pat May died peacefully on July 11, 2009 in Grand Prairie, Texas, at the age of 91.

Born Oct. 3, 1917, Pat was the youngest of 9 children of Albert Ephraim Kent and Carrie Cummings Kent of Eldorado, Texas, and granddaughter of Andrew Malone Hill, a captain in the Confederate Army. Pat's father died during the great flu epidemic of 1917, when she was only a few months old. In order to support the large growing family after his death, her mother campaigned for and was elected Treasurer of Schleicher County in 1923, a position she held for 10 years, at a time when few women, much less the mother of 9, held elected office.

Pat grew up in a lively, loving household with her 8 siblings: Ruth Inez Alsop, Albertine Foster, Tom Kent, Mildred Stanford, Maude Waldrep, Edwin Lee "Buck" Kent, Pauline Means, and Luther Andrew Kent.

Pat graduated from Eldorado High School and attended business school in San Angelo. After marrying William T. May on Sept. 8, 1946 in Abilene, they lived in Ft. Worth before finally settling in Austin. She worked for 30 years at the State Capitol as secretary of the Veterans Employment Division of the Dept. of Labor, retiring in 1975. She was praised by colleagues for her remarkable leadership and dedication. Following the death of her husband

Bill in 1997, after 51 years of a happy marriage, she moved to Grand Prairie in 1998.

Pat was noted for her keen sense of humor, quick wit and intelligence, and generous, loving spirit. Her beauty was not just skin deep, as she gave of herself tirelessly to others, including family, friends, church, and the Austin State School, where she volunteered weekly for many years. She also taught Sunday School and was active at the Hyde Park Baptist Church in Austin, where she always extended herself to families in need. She will be lovingly remembered but greatly missed by all who were lucky enough to know her.

She is survived by her beloved sister Mildred "Mimmie" Stanford of San Angelo, who will be 102 in September. She is also survived by 20 nieces and nephews who loved her dearly and cherish countless happy memories of their "Aunt Pat": Wanda Cober of Grand Prairie, Ruth Sulser and Winona Harper of San Antonio, Mary Dee Wendt of Denver, Thala Stalls of Albuquerque, Tina Schacht of Decatur, AL, Carol Kerbel of Santa Fe, Al Stanford of Midland, Truett Kent Stanford of Los Banos, Ca., Jack Stanford of Brownwood, Joe Stanford of Fallbrook, Ca., Jim Kent of Potsdam, Germany, Mary Ann Stewart of Dallas, Tom Kent of Leander, Bill Kent of Midland, Mary Pauline Sullivan of Brownsville, Jann Walther of Cat Spring, Texas, Noble Means of Duncan, Okla., Ray Kent of Tomball, Don Kent of Tyler, and many great nieces and nephews.

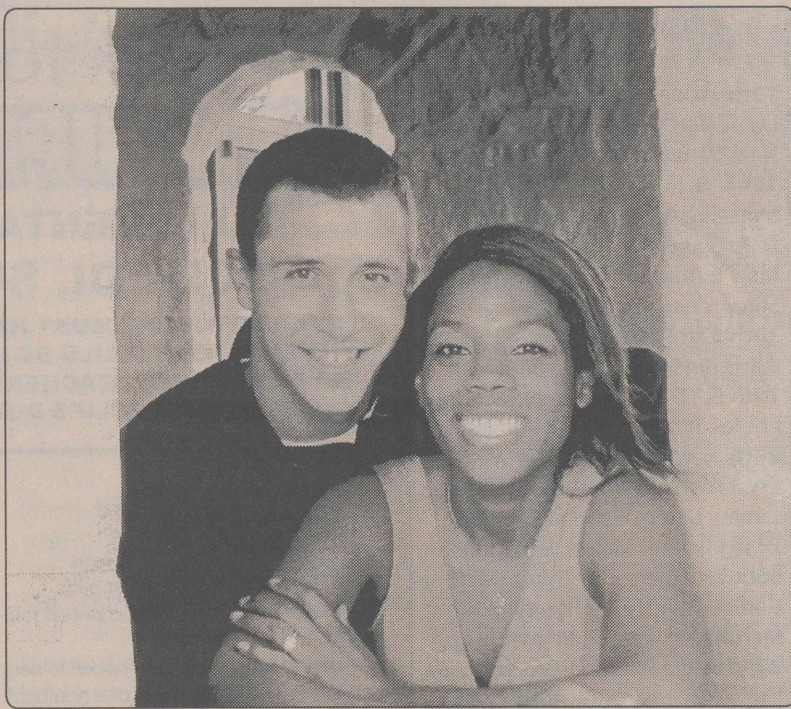

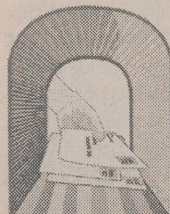
He was preceded in death by his parents; a great-grandson, Cane Alexander; four brothers; a sister; and his best friend, Swinger Hale.

Concerned over Electric Transmission Lines

Editor:

In May of this year, the Lower Colorado River Authority sent notification packets to landowners in Tom Green, Irion, Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble, Kerr and Gillespie counties - whose property it might cross with one of three different routes of the proposed Twin Buttes-McCamey Transmission Line project.

These notices included vague maps of the proposed routes and fluffed information regarding the reasons for them and how it will affect the land they confiscate. It also included a list of meeting locations where they would explain what they were up to sort of. As it turns out they got the addresses from abstract title numbers - many of which apparently haven't been updated. Therefore, many of the possible affected property owners have not received notification. It seems this is all they are legally required to do. This project is moving very fast - too fast for a program of this magnitude.

If owners don't begin working together now, they could wake up one morning in the not too distant future with a four-legged 180 foot tower in their front yard and a 160-200-foot easement going through the middle of their ranch. When coming up with these routes, LCRA made no effort to go down section lines, miss a house or barn, or to stay far enough from airports to abide with FAA regulations or utilize existing right of ways. They pretty much drew straight lines from Christoval to Kerrville.

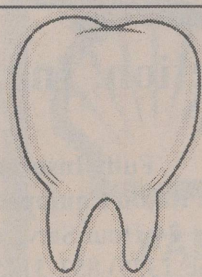
There won't be another effort to locate owners until October by LCRA, when the authority decides whose land it is going to confiscate. By then it will be too late. Before you know it they'll be coming through your gate. You can check out what LCRA is up to by going to their web site, lcra.org/crez. Then search Twin Buttes-McCamey D Westwind- Kendall 345kV Transmission Line project. Another site you can check out is clearviewalliance.org. This is a group of folks

that may be affected and are doing something about it.

We have no beef with the folks that want wind turbines on their land. They have the right to do with their ranch as they see fit and what they feel is best for themselves and their families. But, there has got to be a better way to solve this problem than to have your country taken by eminent domain with virtually no consideration for which route will do the least damage.

If you don't want your land scarred now is the time to do something about it.

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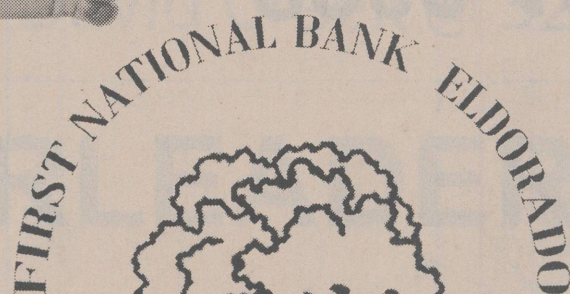
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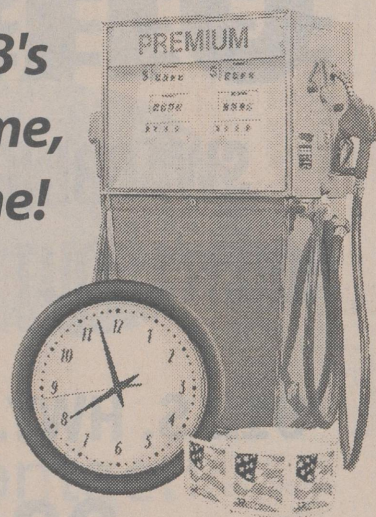

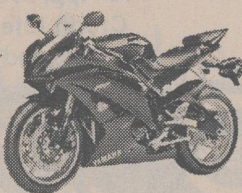
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County Commissioners kill lights at little league field

contained 10,000 gallon unleaded fuel tank and pump has been placed at the Fire Hall and is waiting for electricity and fuel system connected.

County maintenance supervisor Mike Haynes then spoke to the court about the breaker boxes at the little league fields. He advised that the boxes were dangerous and that he asked Southwest Texas Electrical Coop look at the cost of replacing the old equipment and making the area safe.

The proposed price of \$60,000 seemed to catch everyone by surprise and the commissioners instructed Haynes to have the electricity disconnected at the ball fields until another solution could be found.

The commissioners also approved funding a full-time deputy clerk position through the end of the year. The position was initially funded by a County

Essential Grant from the state in order to help with court filings of papers related to the YFZ cases. The court also approved a resolution asking the state for another such grant.

Sheriff David Doran then briefed the court on his department's monthly reconciliation report. And, he told the commissioners that his office had received a \$9,000 Homeland Security Grant to pay for equipping the department's mobile command post. The equipment has been ordered through Concho Valley Council of Governments (CVCOG), the sheriff said.

Doran also told the court that a COPSync grant application has been filed by his office through the CVCOG and is awaiting approval in Austin. He also told the commissioners that a recent inspection was made of the Sheriff's Department's fire alarm system and that the equipment

received a good report.

Sheriff Doran concluded his report by acknowledging jail administrator Lesa Romero for preparing the monthly reports. He also noted that Chief Deputy George Arispe is the new president of the Texas Chief Deputies Association. Both were present and were acknowledged by the commissioners.

The commissioner then learned from Christy Ross, representing Ves Com Phone Systems, that they could save about \$200 per month on their phone and Internet bill with the installation of a T1 line and a wireless bridge to serve the courthouse at a cost of \$21,242.00.

The men voiced no opinion on the deal which will be considered again at budget time.

Several agenda items were then approved by the court including:

- A new refund policy for the County Clerk Peggy Williams' office.

- A resolution on Park Grant Program asking for financial assistance.

- Election judges as recommended by the Republican and Democrat county chairwomen for the next two years.

- Renewal of county health insurance with a 10 percent increase in premiums.

Monday's meeting was presided over by County Judge Charlie Bradley with Commissioners Matt Brown, Lynn Meador and Johnny Mayo in attendance. Commissioner Kirk Griffin was absent.

The next meeting of the Schleicher County Commissioners Court is slated for 9 a.m. on Monday, July 27, 2009 in the first-floor meeting room of the county courthouse.

Last session, the Legislature cut funding for the program to \$2 million over the next two years.

Child Drownings Concern Health Officials

With 63 cases of children drowning in Texas so far this year, health officials are warning Texans to take precautions and never leave children in a pool alone.

Dr. Pat Crocker, chief of emergency medicine at Dell Children's Medical Center in Austin, said children younger than 4 should never be more than arm's length from a watching adult. Swimming pools should be covered and fences locked. Children over the age of 13 should learn CPR.

Steroid Testing Continues to Find Few High School Abusers

Only eight cases of steroid use among Texas high school athletes were confirmed among the more than 16,200 tested from January through May. Since testing began in early 2008 after the Legislature approved the \$6 million measure, more than 45,000 students have been tested for steroid use, and only 19 cases have been confirmed.

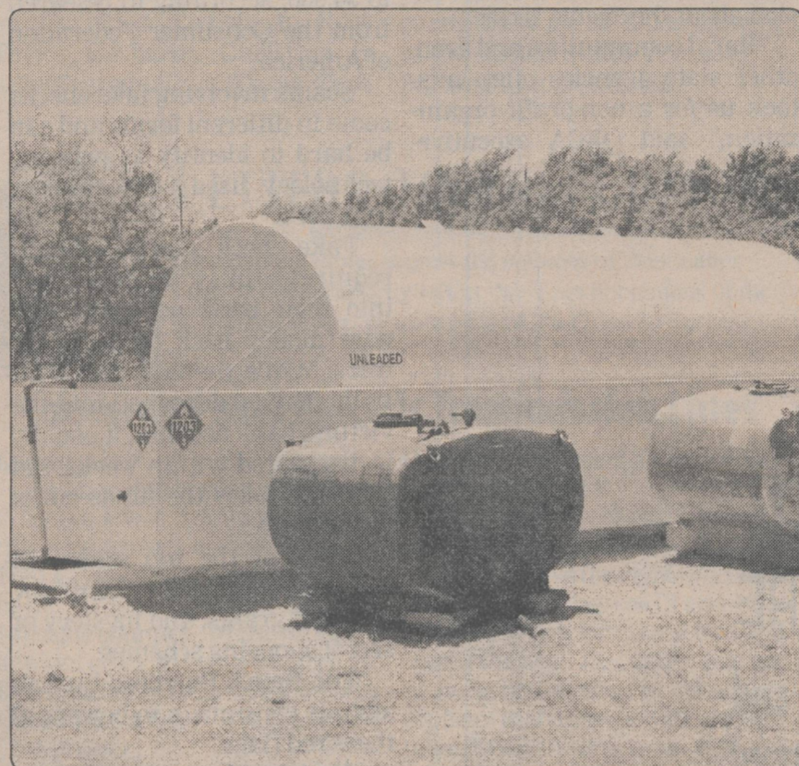

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ORCA becomes Texas Dept. of Rural Affairs Sept. 1st

AUSTIN — The state agency dedicated to rural Texas will have a new name as of September 1, 2009, thanks to legislation authored by Representative Drew Darby and carried in the Senate by Senator Craig Estes.

The law changes the name of the Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA) to the Texas Department of Rural Affairs (TDRA). The agency's URL will become www.tdra.state.tx.us. The agency's duties and dedication to rural communities remain the same.

"The new name will make their status as an official state agency unmistakable," said Representative Darby. "HB 1918 supports the agency's ability to deliver services in the most efficient and effective manner."

The agency's acronym, TDRA, pronounced Te De Ar A, will replace the old acronym of ORCA, which often led to confusion about the agency's role.

"Rural communities and even other state agencies often mistook us for a non-profit organization," said ORCA executive

director Charles S. (Charlie) Stone. "The new name makes our role as a state agency and provider of state and federal grants immediately clear to everyone."

Since its creation in 2001 by the 77th Legislature, the agency has awarded over 4,891 grants, totaling more than \$642 million. These funds have gone out to communities and counties for


economic development, disaster relief, infrastructure, and healthcare, benefiting more than four million people in Texas.

"Rural communities are vital contributors to the prosperity of this state going well beyond agriculture with manufacturing and a growing renewable energy industry," said Senator Estes, chair of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Affairs. "The newly named Texas Department of Rural Affairs emphasizes not only the value of this department, but the value of our rural areas to our overall state economy."

"We thank Representative Darby and Senator Estes for

supporting rural communities and this agency during the legislative session," said Dr. Wallace Klusmann chair of the ORCA governing board.

ORCA is the state agency dedicated solely to rural Texas and is a provider of rural-focused state and federal resources for community development, disaster recovery, economic development, housing and rural health. The agency serves as the state's primary liaison with HUD and manages the federal disaster allocation for public infrastructure. ORCA is the federally-designated State Office of Rural Health. 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Avoiding Check Scams

(SPM Wire) Nearly one-third of adults have been approached by scammers trying to pass fake checks and at least 1.3 million people have fallen victim, with an average loss of \$3,000 to \$4,000, according to research from the Consumer Federation of America.

Scams involving fake checks come in different forms and can be hard to identify as printing technology used by scammers improves.

Fake check scams typically require victims to deposit checks into their bank accounts then wire money back to the scammers. While the fake check initially may be deposited into the victim's bank account, it usually is discovered within weeks and the bank takes the funds out of the account.

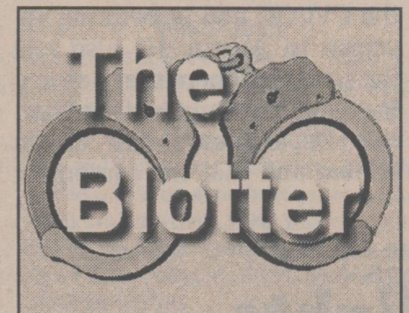
Some of the top scams involve fake lotteries, phony government grants, and mystery or secret shopping schemes.

The Better Business Bureau advises consumers to beware of these red flags:

- You're told you won a lottery or grant for which you didn't apply.
- The name on a check doesn't match the name of the company or individual with whom you're dealing.
- You're given instructions to deposit a check into your account and promptly wire part of those funds back to sender or to another specified company or contact.

Don't be fooled by phone calls. Just because you've spoken to scammers, doesn't mean they're not trying to rip you off.
