New law increases penalty for cattle theft

AUSTIN — Thieves who steal cattle will face harsher penalties starting today. Persons who steal less than 10 head of cattle, horses, exotic wildlife or fowl could be convicted of a third degree felony and face up to 10 years in prison, according to a law passed by the Texas Legislature in May that goes into effect Sept. 1.

"Cattle theft is on the rise in Texas, especially during these tough economic times," said Larry Gray, TS-CRA executive director of law enforcement. "In 2007, 2,400 head of cattle were reported stolen to the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA). In 2008, that number jumped to 6,404. We expect

those numbers to continue to rise in

"Until today, theft of less than 10 head of cattle, horses or exotic wildlife was a state jail felony, punishable by up to two years in jail. The new law will result in some criminals, especially repeat offenders, spending more time in jail," Gray continued.

TSCRA has 29 Special Rangers stationed strategically throughout Texas and Oklahoma who work alongside law enforcement agencies to investigate agricultural crimes, primarily cattle theft. All have indepth knowledge of the cattle industry and are trained in all facets of law enforcement. They are commissioned as Special Rangers by the Texas Department of Public Safety and/ or the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation.

Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association is a 132-year-old trade organization and is the largest livestock association in Texas. TS-CRA has more than 15,000 members who manage approximately 4 million head of cattle on 51.5 million acres of range and pasture land, primarily in Texas and Oklahoma. TSCRA provides law enforcement services, livestock inspection, legislative and regulatory advocacy and educational opportunities for its members and the industry.

Repair of 13 streets planned during City's new budget year

Eldorado city council members went over Monday night a list of streets that need repair during the council's budget hearing.

Following the brief hearing, the council approved the 2009-10 budget that went into effect the following day. The budget totals \$446,820 in the city's General Fund with another \$1,697,388 in the Utility and Sanitation Funds.

The council next approved a tax rate of 76.75 cents per \$100 valuation to service the budget.

Among the 13 streets that are due for repair are: Carson Street, Old Mertzon Road, N. Poplar Street (3 blocks), W. Warner Avenue (1 block), E. Mills Avenue (2 blocks), W. Mills Avenue, Nance Street, Pelt Street, Plum Street, McWhorter Avenue to Carson Street, Main Street to Hill Street, Main Street to Dorris Avenue and the practice field road. The money to pay for these projects will come from funds left over after the past two

90 West Construction of Del Rio is the company that will be carrying out the street repairs.

In other business, Mayor Nikolauk advised that he had received a proposal from a representative of Duncan Disposal for the collection of garbage within the city limits. He said he told the representative to come back with a better offer.

Choose a safe ride during the Labor Day weekend

DPS wants drivers and passengers to make the wise, and least expensive choice, of finding a sober ride to their destinations during the Labor Day

All available troopers will be on duty starting Friday, Sept. 4, through midnight, Monday, Sept. 7, looking for drunk drivers, speeders and seat belt

violators.

"Drivers and their passengers should choose a safe ride to wherever they're going this weekend," said Assistant Director David Baker, who oversees the Texas Highway Patrol. "Calling a cab or sober friend for a ride is much cheaper than getting arrested for DWI and going to jail."

A DWI conviction stays on an offender's criminal and driving record forever. For the first offense, the law allows a maximum of six months in jail, a \$2,000 fine and a one-year driver license suspension. A DWI

conviction also carries a \$1,000 surcharge for three years, in addition to any other fines or costs associated with the arrest.

DPS supports the "Drink. Drive. Go to Jail." campaign and is also a participant in Operation CARE— Combined Accident Reduction Effort—a nationwide effort by police agencies to reduce fatalities on major interstate highways during holiday weekends.

During Labor Day last year, DPS troopers arrested 623 people for driving while intoxicated and issued more than 10,000 speeding citations and 2,500 seat belt and child restraint tickets. In all, troopers wrote almost 20,000 tickets in an effort to make driving safer during the Labor Day holiday last year.

"Choose a sober driver this weekend," said Assistant Director Baker. "Otherwise, the Texas Highway Patrol will choose your ride for you."

School board adopts budget, sets tax rate

The Schleicher County School Board met Monday evening and adopted a school budget of \$6,354,529.00, to be served partially by a tax rate of \$1.17 per \$100.

The largest budget item is payroll which accounts for 80 percent of the school's expenditures.


SCISD Superintendent Billy Collins updated the board on attendance as of August 28, 2009 for all three campuses.

Elementary enrollment is 276 students, Middle School has 177 students and High School has 177 students.

Elementary has 28 Pre-Kindergarten who are ineligible for state funds, but are being instructed by the school district tax dollars. The largest class enrolled in elementary is second grade with 55 students, kindergarten has 51 enrolled, first has 53, third Grade has 47 students and the smallest class is fourth grade with 42 students.

The largest class in Middle School is fifth grade with 55 enrolled and the smallest is eighth grade with 35 enrolled. Sixth grade has 50 students and seventh has 37.

The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission recently revoked the license for the 13th Hour Bar. The bar was the scene of an April 5th shooting. that left a San Angelo man dead and an Eldorado man in jail facing a murder charge.

Darrell Duane Sellers, 48, of

Eldorado, is accused of shooting to death Michael Neeley, 29, following an altercation outside the bar.

State regulators cited the bar on numerous occasions in the past and noted a history of violence at the Pulliam Street establishment when the decision was made to revoke the license.

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Unemployment rate grows, even as Texas adds thousands of new jobs

AUSTIN -- Gov. Rick Perry and challengers released statements following the death of U.S. Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., who died Aug. 25 after battling brain cancer.

Senator Kennedy carried on his family's tradition of service to our country, devoting his life to the causes that mattered most to him," Perry said. 'We can all admire and should respect a life lived with such consistent adherence to a deeply-held set of beliefs. Anita and I extend our sincere condolences and prayers to his family and friends.'

U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, who is competing with Perry to be the Texas Republican Party's nominee for governor in 2010, said, "While Ted Kennedy and I disagreed on many issues, we were strong allies in the fight against cancer. The Kennedy-Hutchison cancer research bill is a tribute to his determination that the battle

Cancer may have claimed his life; it did not dampen his spirit or his will."

Tom Schieffer, Democratic candidate for governor, said of Kennedy, "Throughout his long and illustrious career, he was the strong voice for education, fairness and compassion in our society. That voice is quiet now but his legacy will continue to speak to all those who believe that government can make a positive difference in people's lives."

Kennedy, 77, was buried near his slain brothers, President John F. Kennedy and U.S. Sen. Robert F. Kennedy in Arlington National Cemetery on Aug. 29.

Lakey said the current pandemic has been much milder than anticipated and that this has given the state time to learn more about the disease and be prepared for additional outbreaks in

Suehs named to top spot at HHS

Gov. Rick Perry named Thomas Suchs of Austin executive commissioner of Health and Human Services, effective Sept. 1, for a term to expire Feb.

The executive commissioner oversees the operations of five health and human services agencies with a combined annual budget of \$30 billion and staffed by more than 50,000 employees.

Suehs succeeds Albert Hawkins, who Perry appointed to lead the agency in January 2003. Hawkins announced his retirement in May.

Note sale will help state budget

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced Aug. 25 that the state's sale of \$5.5 billion in tax and revenue anticipation notes achieved an interest rate of 0.48 percent, the lowest rate the state has ever received on its annual sale of

short-term notes.

"We had an impressive sale and an excellent interest rate — the best Texas has ever had," Combs said

Texas will use the proceeds of the sale to distribute state funding to public schools early in the upcoming fiscal year and manage its cash flow between the start of the fiscal year and the arrival of tax revenues later in the year. The

notes will be re-

paid Aug. 31, 2010.

Sugar and spice and everything nice? Try alum, and cayenne pepper and everything offensive.



Stupid enough to think that a new \$1 trillion health-care entitlement is just the thing to restore the country to fiscal health.

Stupid enough not to know that almost every entitlement known to man has cost more than originally estimated, with a congressional committee in 1967 underestimating by a factor of 10 Medicare's cost by 1990.

Stupid enough not to realize that it is through budget trickery -- the taxes begin immediately, the spending is put off for a few years -- that the program in the House shows "only" a \$239 billion deficit over the first 10 years.

Stupid enough not to focus on how the gap between the House plan's revenue and spending steadily grows after the first 10 years, making it a long-term budget buster.

Stupid enough to think increased preventive care will



save the government money, just because President Barack Obama constantly repeats it despite all the independent studies to the contrary.

Stupid enough to believe that a program with no cost controls that can be discerned by the Congressional Budget Office will control costs.

Stupid enough to consider it wise to use several billion dollars in cuts from Medicare to create a new entitlement rather than to forestall Medicare's own looming insolvency, currently projected for 2017.

Stupid enough not to see through Obama's sudden insistence on calling his plan "health insurance reform" as empty poll-tested phrasemaking.

Stupid enough to consider Obama's reform a good deal when its insurance regulations would increase premiums for most healthy people.

Stupid enough to think that the very real problem of people with pre-existing conditions locked out of the insurance market can't be alleviated short of a 1,000-page bill reordering the entire health-care system.

Stupid enough to buy Obama's cockamamie stories about unnecessary tonsillectomies and amputations -- undertaken by greedy doctors to pad their profits -- driving healthcare costs.

Stupid enough to get gulled by rhetoric attacking special interests when almost all the special interests are backing Obama's plan for cowardly and

self-interested reasons. Stupid enough to consider new taxes on employment -- imposed by the so-called employer mandate -- a good idea during a weak economy with a 9.4 percent unemployment rate.

Little Plastic Bricks

It's like visiting a Lego art museum with a little bit of Disneyland and Six Flags mixed in. Recently we took a trip to LEGO-LAND, an amusement park at Carlsbad, California that is celebrating its tenth anniversary this year. Everything revolves around the little interlocking plastic bricks. The park has full-size cars made completely of Legos. It has statues of people, movie characters, giant dragons and

dinosaurs sculpt-Rolling ed by the talented hands of Lego art-Along ists and designers. The crowning achievement and the park's main attraction is Mini-

land: scale models of Las Vegas, San Francisco, New Orleans and New York made from (guess what) Legos.

LEGOLAND has exciting rides, too, everything from roller coasters to miniature Lego cars that kids six years old can drive. You can find plenty of good things to eat and observe. Kids waiting to go on a ride can play with Legos. One of the venues lets kids make their own Lego cars and race them down a ramp. You can watch 4-D movies with special glasses and effects that make you feel what it's like to zoom down a roller coaster.

My son BZ has been a Lego enthusiast since boyhood. Now his son Max is a huge Lego fan who subscribes to the Lego magazine. He constantly looks at it. Each issue is practically in shreds before the next one comes. "I have a lot of Lego stuff," says Max. "I'm a pretty good builder." His dad-

dy helps him a lot. We took 6-year-old Max, his 3-year-old little brother Aiden and our six-year-old grandson Caleb to LEGOLAND. Making cars and racing them gave the six year olds the most enjoyment. They both say, "I won most of the races." Aiden liked Miniland.

The park in Carlsbad is one of only four LEGOLAND amusement parks in the world. Others are in England, Denmark and Germany. Another is under construction in Malaysia. The little plastic bricks have created an empire that started in the workshop of a carpenter in Billund, Denmark named Ole Kirk Christiansen. He began making wooden toys in 1932 and in 1934 started a manufacturing group. He named it LEGO, developed from the Danish phrase leg godt, which means "play well." The company started making plastic toys in 1940.

Plants in Denmark and the Czech Republic produce 600 bricks a second or 20 billion per year. Play sets for different age groups feature pirates, Vikings, castles, Star Wars figures and vehicles, Indiana Jones, SpongeBob Square Pants and Bob the Builder. Characters from Toy Story have just been added.

Lego bricks were based largely on England's Kiddicraft Self-Locking Bricks, released in 1947. These were originally made of wood, later changed to plastic. Lego later acquired the rights to Kiddicraft. Lego's modern brick design was developed in 1958 and bricks from that year are compatible with current bricks. Since its beginning, Lego has produced 400 billion bricks.


"It wasn't pretty," Offensive Coordinator Danny Wilhelm said after the game, "but we will take it."

Governor Perry says Texas is prepared for H1N1 Flu season

Texans encouraged to take precautions SAN ANTONIO - Gov. Rick additional 805,000 courses purchased with funding from the Perry today, along with Depart-81st Legislature. ment of State Health Services

(DSHS) Commissioner David Lakey, Texas Education Commissioner Robert Scott and Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples, highlighted the state's preparedness efforts in advance of the anticipated H1N1 flu season.

"Texas' effort to deal with the H1N1 virus is robust and we are more prepared than ever to handle the challenge with more anti-viral medication in stock, more state and local coordination and more science to battle H1N1," Gov. Perry said. "With the new school year beginning in most communities today, it's a good time to remind Texans that frequent hand-washing, good hygiene and staying home if you're sick can fight the spread of the H1N1 flu virus."

As a proactive measure, in a letter to U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius today, Gov. Perry requested the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) provide an additional 25 percent, which is approximately 800,000 courses, of Texas' allotment of antiviral medications from the Strategic National Stockpile. He also sent a letter to U.S. Homeland Security Secretary Napolitano requesting that the federal government allow a pandemic to be eligible for

a major disaster declaration. Texas currently has 2.5 million courses of antiviral medication prepositioned in the state, including the state's previous 25 percent allotment from the Strategic National Stockpile and an

"Although this flu season will be a challenge, it can be effectively managed. The good news is that, although this virus has rapidly spread worldwide, it has not changed and has not become more severe," Lakey said.

'We must remain vigilant and take personal precautions such as covering our cough, washing our hands, staying home when ill and getting vaccinated for the flu."

To prepare for the upcoming flu season the Governor's Division of Emergency Management (GDEM) and DSHS cohosted an H1N1 summit earlier this month, regional summits across the state, and a statewide conference call with state, regional and local leadership.

GDEM has been working with DSHS, the Texas Education Agency (TEA), and the Department of Agriculture to provide guidance to local school districts and health departments and the state will also provide H1N1 guidance letters to all school administrators.

"The health and safety of our students is paramount," Texas **Education Commissioner Rob**ert Scott said. "TEA will continue to provide information and support to districts as they prepare and coordinate with their local communities in advance of the upcoming flu season."

The Department of Agriculture and TEA have developed a plan for the continued distribution and access to free and reduced lunches for children should schools close (Currently, 2.1 million school children participate).

"We are committed to protecting students from illnesses and ensuring nutritious meal services continue," Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples said. "Millions of Texas children depend on the meals served at school every day, and we want to make sure schools have the option of continuing this crucial service, while still protecting those students from any public health threat."

Health officials say everyone should follow standard precautions to reduce the spread of any respiratory illness.

·Stay home when you are sick to avoid spreading illness to

•Cough or sneeze into the crook of your elbow or a tissue and properly dispose of used

·Wash hands frequently and thoroughly with soap and warm water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

The CDC estimates the H1N1 vaccine will be available by mid-October and in Texas the distribution will be managed by DSHS. It is estimated that 45 million doses will be available nationwide.

Groups targeted for the vaccine will include pregnant women, household contacts and caregivers for children younger than six months of age, healthcare and emergency medical services personnel, all persons six months through 24 years of age and persons 25 years through 64 years of age who have health conditions associated with higher risk of medical complications from influenza.

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

Family history key risk factor in developing Osteoporosis

(SPM Wire) Knowing your family health history is proving to be extremely significant, when it comes to the health of your bones.

Of all the gifts that generations of women have passed on to their loved ones, one of the most important is the gift of knowledge about health - especially information about bone health and osteoporosis. NOF encourages all individuals, young and old, to eat a well-balanced diet rich in calcium and vitamin D, exercise and be active, and avoid smoking and drinking alcohol.


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
