

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Measuring Up

According to a 16th century surveyor, the way to find what a foot stood for was to line up 16 men, measure their left feet and take the average.

In 18th century Europe, a "foot" was that of the reign-



ing king. About 280 different sizes were in use.

The feet on the rulers we use today are all the same size, and all our measuring devices, like the rulers, tape measures, yard and metre sticks made by Lufkin are accurate and standardized.

The yard was established in the early 1100's, when Henry I of England decided it should be the distance between the point of his nose and the tip of his thumb.

Eldorado-Divide District News

The amount of rainfall received and when it is received will be one of the most important factors effecting agricultural production this year. However, equally as important is how much of the rainfall received is kept where it falls for crop use. Since land users have no control of when and how much it rains, all the time needed can be spent in keeping the rain where it

falls when it does fall.

Holding the water on the land where it falls is nothing new to most farmers in the Eldoradomost farmers in the Divide Soil and Water Conservation District. To help hold all or most all of the rainfall received. level closed end terraces have been constructed on a big percentage of the dry cropland in the District. Various kinds of implements were used to construct the terraces. The one way plow has been used by most every farmer either in constructing or maintaining terraces.

Rainfall for Schleicher county last year was 26.99 inches. Since 1936 there have been only six years that exceeded 26.99 inches. Last year rainfall varied in amount received at the different gauges used for the county average. Therefore some part of the county received more than 26.99 inches while oth ers received less than 26.99 inches Already this year's rainfall is frequently the subject of farmers and of these conversations.


