FLDS company cited for violating child labor laws

The U.S. Department of Labor oba tained a permanent injunction recently against Paragon Contractors of Hildale, Utah, after repeated violations of federal child labor laws. The injunction, issued by U.S. District Judge Tena Campbell prohibits the company from employing any underage workers.

Hildale is home to thousands of members of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, a polygamous sect that broke away from the mainstream Mormon church decades ago.

Many of the group are relocating to Schleicher County, Texas where followers loyal to jailed FLDS prophet Warren Jeffs have built a small town, complete with massive white limestone temple on the YFZ Ranch, some four miles northnortheast of Eldorado.

Paragon Contractors is owned by James and Brian Jessop. The men are said to be loyal followers of Warren Jeffs. They are also nephews of Merril Jessop, the man who oversees day-to-day operations at the YFZ Ranch.

Calls to Paragon's office in Hildale drew no comments on the story.

Paragon was recently fined \$5,280.00 after a 16-year-old was discovered working for the company on a roofing job. In 2006 the company paid a \$10,395.00 fine and was ordered to pay \$3.296.00 in back wages for minimum wage violations. That case involved children as

young as 12 and 13 who were found to be working on another roofing job.

The Labor Department's youth employment regulations identify 17 hazardous occupations prohibited for workers under the age of 18, including roofing and operating dangerous equipment such as power-driven cicular saws, band saws and guillotine shears.

Judge Campbell ruled that Paragon be permanently prohibited from violating provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act that include prohibiting the hiring of children under age 14 to perform any type of work or hiring children and teenagers under 16 to work on construction sites.

The use of child labor by FLDS companies has long been cited by antipolygamy activists as a reason why state and federal authorities should closely monitor activities within FLDS communities such as the YFZ Ranch.

In 2004, R&W Excavating, another FLDS controlled company, was fined \$6,000.00 for violating Utah's child labor laws.

And, there has been evidence of child labor being used at the YFZ Ranch, specifically, aerial photographs showing young children working on various project, even roofing. (see photo at right)

Authorities say they will continue to investigate alleged abuse of state and federal child labor laws, whether they occur in Utah, South Dakota or Texas.

Wildfires, high winds combine to char 2,500+ acres southeast of Eldorado

Firefighters from across the area converged on southeast Schleicher County on Monday, less than a week after Texas Governor Rick Perry issued a disaster declaration for 152 counties, including Schleicher, Sutton, Menard and Kimble, in response to the threat posed by wildfires.

The culprit was a blaze, sparked by power line on the Griffin Ranch. Units of the Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department responded but found themselves out matched as high winds drove the fire north and east onto the Mertz Ranch.

Fire Chief Jerry Jones soon called for assistance from area fire departments and units responded from Sonora, Menard, Ft. McKavett, Ozona and Wall. Tanker trucks from Niblett's Oilfield Service and JMC Transports hauled water to the scene. An aircraft was also dispatched by the Texas Forest Service.

"It looks like it started early Monday morning," Sheriff David Doran said of the fire. He noted that foggy weather likely contributed to a fire on an electrical power pole which smoldered until a cross arm burned into.

"That's when the electricity went off here in town," Doran

By that time, the first fire units had been dispatched from Eldorado. Firefighters battled the blaze into the early evening hours when the fire finally came under control.

Firefighters were called back out Tuesday afternoon as northerly winds whipped fires on the Old Ft. McKavett Road on the Nicholas Ranch and near the intersection of FM 864 and McIntosh Road in Sutton County. Local units were dispatched into Sutton county to assist the Sonora VFD with that blaze.

For his part, Fire Chief Jerry Jones expressed his appreciation to those departments who came to assist with the fire on Monday. He also asked that local citizens be mindful of the dry conditions and to remember that a burn ban remains in place in Schleicher County.







Firefighters battled a blaze Monday on the Mertz Ranch south, southeast of Eldorado. High winds and dry conditions combined to feed the flames which charred some 2,000 acres before volunteers managed to surround the blaze. More fires were reported Tuesday afternoon, putting a strain on already exhausted firefighters.

He was named Outstanding Conservationist of 1999 by the Eldorado Soil and Water Conservation District. He earned a bachelor's degree at Texas A&M University and a doctorate of veterinary medicine at Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine.

Ernie Morales of Devine was named presiding officer of the Texas Animal Health Commission for a term to expire at the pleasure of the governor. Morales is co-owner of Morales Feed Lots Inc. He is currently on the board of the National Cattlemen's Beef Association and past chairman of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association. Additionally, he is a member of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association and past member of the Cattlemen's Beef Board. He received a bachelor's degree from Texas A&M University. He replaces Richard C. Traylor of Carrizo Springs.

Others named to the board include Randy Chris Brown of Lubbock. He is a vice president of City Bank Texas, past board member of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, serving on its Arbitration Committee and past board member of the National Cattleman's Beef Association. Additionally, Brown

is past vice chairman and past director of the Hansford County Appraisal District, and past president of the Gruver Independent School District. He received a bachelor's degree in Animal Business from Texas State Technical College. He replaces Rogelio Martinez of McAllen.

Money For Nothing, **Rings For Free**

How Texas' USF Gives Big-Telecom Access To Your Wallet

Texas taxpayers are a generous lot. Just ask the good folks at Windstream Communications, who state bureaucrats say improperly received more than \$6 million from Texans over the last seven years. Operating then under the name Valor Telecommunications, the company is accused by regulators of taking advantage of the outdated, unaccountable Texas Universal Service Fund - one of

> lic Utilities Commission is investigating the Windstream case, with state commissioners looking at charging the company more than \$12 million for the alleged overpayments plus interest and penalties.

phone bill.

The problem isn't with this particular company, but the USF in general. Originally designed decades ago, when land-line telephones were cutting edge technology, to ensure that even folks in the most remote portions of the state have telephone access. Phone customers are required to pay the fee, which is theoretically used to provide service in hard-to-reach areas and for customers with other challenging situations.

In reality, the USF has become little more than a cash-cow for telephone companies needing to shore up their bottom-line. The funds are disbursed with almost no accountability, and the telephone companies need only turn in a one-page form that contains no background information and no proof of having actually rendered service. Not a bad day: fill out a form, and get millions in taxpayer cash without so much as a pesky question.

The telecommunications business is vastly different today than it was just a decade ago - and almost unrecognizable from the sector as recently as the 1970s. Increasing numbers of families don't even have a land-line, preferring the ease of cell phones, while others use voice-over-internet services, satellite phones, and cable-lines to make the home phone ring.

It's abundantly clear that the telecom business has changed, but the USF remains stuck in telephony's dark ages.

In the Windstream case, it is alleged that the company was "double-dipping" by getting monies from both the federal and state USF pots - never mind that the money all comes from the phone customers pocket. When government gives corporations unfettered access to the taxpayers' wallets, in the form of mandated fees, without any true oversight or accountability, we're just asking for fraud and abuse.

Obviously cases of overt mis-payment and fraud must be pursued, but for the health of the state's economy, and the good of Texas' taxpayers, lawmakers should seek to reform the USF. Heck, it might even be time just to hang-up on it.

Touring Jack London's Neighborhood

"The grapes on a score of rolling hills are red with autumn flame. Across Sonoma Mountain wisps of sea fog are stealing. The afternoon sun smolders in the drowsy sky. I have everything to make me glad I am alive. I am filled with dreams and mysteries. I am all sun and air and sparkle. I am vitalized, organic."

Those words were written by Jack London, an adventurer and author who wrote 50 books (Call of the Wild, White Fang) from his ranch north of Sonoma, California in the early 1900's. He died in 1916 at the age of 40. His place is now a state park.

We toured the area around Santa Rosa and Glen Ellen with some friends who live there. It is an extremely compact area. It seems we didn't go but a few miles and there would be something new to explore. In a one-block area we toured an olive oil manufacturing facility, a cheese company, a chocolate factory and a winery.

Those California folks know how to do it. The olive oil place (Figone's Olive Oil Co.) was something I'd never experienced before. It had acres of olive trees



and huge (dumpster-size) boxes of olives leading to the entrance. Visitors could sample the various varieties of olive oil. The John Raymond Cheese Company had cheeses from all over the country including some made in California. We must have sampled a dozen different types of cheese. Same for the Eric Ross winery across the street: types of wines that were totally new to me. At Wine Country Chocolates we watched wine-infused (cabernetsauvignon) truffles being made by hand. Such tasty delights, and all just a few yards apart.

Besides visiting our friends in Sonoma, we were in California primarily to visit our son BZ and his family, who live in the hills of Oakland. We were there nine days. We did take a detour to Gilroy, California where I made a speech. Gilroy is the garlic capital of the

USA. Yes, we did get some samples. We even sampled garlic ice cream. Gilroy is a city of 50,000. The annual Garlic Festival, held in the summer, attracts 150,000 visitors.

Just before we left to go to California, my 4-year old grandson Max asked me over the phone if I knew any jokes. I told him one off the top of my head, but then scoured the Internet for kid jokes and carried a good supply of them with me. I fired one off every few hours. Max told his friends that I knew lots of jokes. Max even repeated some of them and told them well. His little brother Aiden didn't get them, but since everybody was laughing, he laughed, too.

Max is learning how to cook. His class at school wrote a cookbook and Max's recipe for spaghetti was included in it. "Put noodles in oven for like one minute, two minutes, three minutes, four minutes, five minutes and make it cold with water. Add sauce, the sauce I like but not the sauce I don't like. All sauces are red, different kinds of red. Add a clock, maybe a pointy rock or a cowbell."

Sounds delicious.

Some steps are supposed to make TAKS tests more resistant to cheat-

Other steps are designed to provide more information that can be using in investigations if allegations of testing irregularities arise.

One measure, for example, is to ask students in grades 9, 10 and 11, prior to taking tests, to sign a statement

promising not to cheat. TAKS measures reading at grades 3 through 9; writing at grades 4 and 7; English language arts at grades 10 and 11; mathematics at grades 3 through 11; science at grades 5, 10 and 11; and social studies at grades 8, 10 and 11.

Satisfactory performance on TAKS at grade 11 is a prerequisite to a high school diploma.

Panel to focus on accountability

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and Speaker Tom Craddick jointly appointed members to the Select Committee on Public School Accountability.

SB 1031, passed last year during the 80th session of the Texas Legislature, required the creation of the select committee.

SB 1031 also changed the state's method of assessing high school student performance by moving from high-stakes exit-level tests to end-ofcourse examinations.

The biennial realignment was announced on Friday, February 1, 2008, by the University Interscholastic League, the governing school sports, academic and band health problems. competitions.


