\$590,595 School Budget Presented For '74-5 Year

The Board of Equalization for our countywide school district met at the Court House last Thursday and were presented a tentative budget for the 1974-75 school year in the amount of \$590,595. Official adoption of the budget will take place in November.

The new budget is \$38,205 higher than the \$552,390 of a year ago and in 1972 the budget was \$559,288. The new budget figures were given as follows:

Protect Stored Grain From Insects

Corn and sorghum harvesting is starting in many areas of Texas and makes good sense to protect those ment. high yields from insect damage once the grain goes into storage.

Actually, two steps are necessary to protect grain from insects. First of all, the storage bin should be cleaned and then sprayed with a 2.5% premium-grade malathion. pint vodka 1/4 cup apricot flavored brandy (or orange liqueur)

1 large watermelon 2 cups cracked ice 2 cups watermelon cubes (or cantalope and honeydew balls) Mint leaves (optional)

Combine lemonade, vodka and apricot flavored brandy (or orange liqueur) and chill for several hours. Cut a thin slice off on long side of watermelon, so it has a flat base to rest on. Make a lengthwise cut on the long side opposite this removing about one-third of the watermelon, and scoop out most of the watermelon meat so that the remaining shell becomes bowl-like. Cut saw tooth design around edge of watermelon if desired. Put 'cracked ice in melon shell, and chilled punch mixture. Garnish with melon cubes or balls and mint leaves. Makes 15 servings.
