





There will be plenty to pack in lunch sacks and to fill the cookie jar for a perfect snack or fast dessert. These cookies are rich and full of butterscotch flavor. Velvetized evaporated milk makes them tender.

For the best cookies, remember a few baking tips. Watch the baking time carefully to avoid underbaked, doughy cookies or overbaked, hard ones with dark edges. Cookies dropped on a shiny cookie sheet will brown more evenly. Mound the dough on cool cookie sheets when you drop it to prevent excessive spreading. And be sure to cool your cookies on racks to prevent sogginess.

Cream butter, shortening and sugars until smooth and creamy. Add eggs, evaporated milk and vanilla; mix well. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and baking soda together. Gradually add flour mixture to sugar mixture, beating constantly on low speed. Scrape sides of bowl frequently. Stir in butterscotch morsels and nuts. Drop rounded teaspoons of dough on lightly greased cookie sheets. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 9-10 minutes or until cookies are golden brown.
