Baptists To Launch Week-Long Revival

Beginning Sunday, October 20, in the evening worship service at 7:00 p.m., through the Sunday, October 27 11:00 a.m. worship service, the First Baptist Church will be conducting its fall revival with Dr. Jerold McBride as evangelist and Mr. Ron Etheredge leading the music. Friday, October 25, there will be a covered dish supper at 6:00 p.m. followed by a devotion period before the Eldorado vs. Wall football game.

Dr. McBride was born in Rocky Ford, Colorado and attended public schools in Winnfield, Louisiana. He holds a B. S. degree from Hardin Simmons University, and a B. D. and Th. D. from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. He has been listed in the 12th edition of Who's Who in the South and Southwest.

While a student in college and seminary, Dr. McBride served as pastor of Eolian and Crystal Falls in the West Texas area, Calvary Baptist Church in Breckenridge, and Tabernacle Baptist Church in Gainesville. Before coming to the First Baptist Church of San Angelo where he has been serving as pastor since 1969, McBride pastored Southside Baptist Church in Palestine, and the First Baptist Churches of Chickasha and Ponca City, both in Oklahoma.

He has been active in denominational leadership and is the author and contributor to several publications. Dr. McBride and his wife Elizabeth have three children: Renee, 13, and Charlotte and Todd, both 9.

Mr. Ron Etheredge was born and reared in Dallas, Texas. After graduating from high school, he continued his education receiving a BA in Music from North Texas State University and a Bachelor of Church Music (with a voice major) from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He has served two Dallas churches and Eastern Hills Baptist Church in Garland as Music Director. Before coming to the First Baptist Church of San Angelo to serve in that capacity, he served as Music Director at Crescent Park Baptist Church in Odessa. Mr. Etheredge has been active in Association work within the Southern Baptist Convention and leads the youth choir at the General Encampment at Paisano Baptist Encampment at Marfa. He is married to the former Kay Ansley of Dallas and the couple have two children, Craig, 7, and Ronda, 13.

Tuesday night at 5:30 (Oct. 22) there will be a hot dog supper for all the children's departments. There will be a children's choir in the service that will follow. Saturday night is youth night with a youth choir planned as well as an after church fellowship with Ron Etheredge entertaining.

Rites Held Thursday For Jack Shugart, 58

Funeral services were held here last Thursday afternoon in First United Methodist Church for Jack Shugart, 58.

Shugart was found dead two days earlier by a search party which went into a mountainous arena of central Mexico to learn of his fate after his aircraft was discovered by aerial search between Guadalajara and San Luis Potosi, Mexico.

Shugart was alone on the fatal flight, and his plane had earlier been reported overdue, and later missing. His body was found in the wreckage of the aircraft on the side of a mountain located about 14 miles from his destination, San Luis Potosi.

Shugart's whole family assisted with the search when his plane was reported missing.

Shugart was a prominent Fort Stockton building contractor, who built many of the homes in the Dees and Shugart Additions on the west side of Fort Stockton.

He also built and owned the Sands Motel and Restaurant buildings, and later constructed the Sands Apartments in Fort Stockton. Shugart was active in the affairs of the First Methodist Church of Fort Stockton, and served on the church's official governing board as well as the building committee for the new church. He also was one of the charter directors of First Savings and Loan Association, during the first several years of its operations.

He was a former citizen of Eldorado, and a one-time publisher of the Eldorado Success. He was a graduate of Eldorado High School.

Shugart and his family moved to Fort Stockton in the late 1950's from Eldorado, and lived there until he and Mrs. Shugart moved to San Luis Potosi about eight years ago to open a motel there which he had built.

They later moved to Guadalajara and built a hotel there. Shugart had a new project, a condominium apartment building, under construction in Guadalajara and was there on business when the crash occurred.

Cause of the crash is unknown. Sen. John Tower asked the cooperation of the Mexican government in locating Shugart and his aircraft, and planes, helicopters, jeeps and horses were all employed in the search.

Survivors include his wife, Lorena, of Guadalajara; two daughters, Mrs. Phil (Jackie) McClure of Fort Stockton and Janie Shugart of Fort Worth; one son, Jerry Shugart of Dallas; four grandchildren; and two sisters, Mrs. Leslie Baker of Eldorado and Mrs. Glenn Spann of Irving.

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What Emission Control Devices Do

(by John L. Hill, Attorney General)

Austin, Tex.—Many consumers in the market for a new car are wondering just what it is that the new emission control devices do, why they are needed, and most of all, how they will affect a car's performance and cost.

First of all, the controls are needed to make the new car emissions come within the standards set by the Environmental Protection Agency under the Clean Air Amendments passed by Congress in 1970.

These amendments set strict limits for the hydrocarbons, carbon monoxide, and nitrogen oxides emitted by cars. Although the EPA hasn't required any particular devices in order to meet these strict standards, most of the new cars will be using single catalytic converters to neutralize polluted emissions by trapping and treating them after they leave the car's combustion chamber.

How will these emission controls affect the performance of this year's car models? The EPA says that some new cars may be a bit harder to start in cold weather and somewhat slower to warm up. They may also be a little more hesitant in operation.

The new cars will require the use of a different type of gas, one that is unleaded and phosphorus-free. Unleaded gas is expected to reduce the health hazard of lead emitted in auto exhaust, especially in many urban areas, where cars are the major source of lead in the air. This new gas will cost more, but its extra cost may be offset by the fact that its relative cleanliness compared to standard gasoline means sparkplugs and muffler should last longer.

Some '75 models may get better gas mileage with emission controls and unleaded gas, others may not. The main factor in determining gas mileage is the car's weight. A car weighing one-half as much as another will get about twice the gas mileage as the heavier car. Air conditioning and automatic transmission may also lower gas mileage. On heavier cars, the new controls may lower gas mileage slightly, but the fuel economy of smaller, lighter cars won't really be affected.

The Attorney General's Environmental Protection Division lawyers say that consumers who are serious about getting better gas mileage should plan fewer short trips, avoid fast "jackrabbit" starts, keep cars tuned up, consider purchasing radial tires, and drive at a steady speed of between 30 and 50 m.p.h., depending on driving conditions. All of these can result in more efficient use of gas.

As for price of the '75 cars with emission controls, a National Academy of Sciences report estimates that the new equipment will raise the sticker price about \$140. Inflation and any optional equipment would be additional.

The EPA cautions that tampering with the emission control system of a new car can hamper performance and fuel economy and could cause engine damage. Also, under the Clean Air Amendments, auto manufacturers must provide a five-year or 50,000 mile warranty on emission control systems in new cars, and tampering with the system might void this warranty.

In addition, the Clean Air Amendments make it illegal for anyone to remove or render inoperative the emission control system of a car before its sale, or for the manufacturer or dealer to do so after the sale. A fine of up to \$10,000 can be assessed for each violation.

Texas Air Control Board regulations also prohibit tampering with emission control devices. The Attorney General's Environmental Protection Division, which represents the Board, warns that violation of these rules are punishable by civil penalties of up to \$1,000 a day.

Both the Environmental Protection and Consumer Protection Divisions of the Attorney General's Office recently notified garagemen, service station owners, and publishers of a book on emission control bypass methods of such penalties. They also pointed out that additional civil penalties could be assessed for violations of the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act if misleading claims are made regarding fuel economy for bypassed systems.

Consumers who believe their car's emission control system has been tampered with should contact the Attorney General's Environmental Protection and Consumer Protection Divisions.

TSTA District Convention is set for October 20-21 in San Angelo. Dr. David W. Martin of the University of Texas at Houston will speak at the annual district convention for District XV, Texas State Teachers Association, to be held at the San Angelo Coliseum.

Barbara Anne Pursler, San Angelo educator, who is president of TSTA District XV said that upwards of 2500 members are expected to attend. The district covers 18 counties.

The program will begin with certification of delegates at 3:30 p.m. Sunday, October 20th, at the Angelo State University Center. A dinner for the delegates will follow the meeting at 6:00 p.m.

Most of the public schools in the 18 county district (including Eldorado) will dismiss classes on Monday, October 21st, so their teachers can attend the convention, Pursler said.

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Old Local Stockyards Properties 'Recycled' Into Building Near A&M

An Office Complex has recently been completed at College Station utilizing some materials salvaged from here. 707 Texas Ave. is a new office and shopping complex just completed across from Texas A&M, College Station, Texas. The developing corporation is Building Consultants II, owned by Pat D. Cooper (formerly of Sonora), Anthony Caporina, and Nick Polermo.

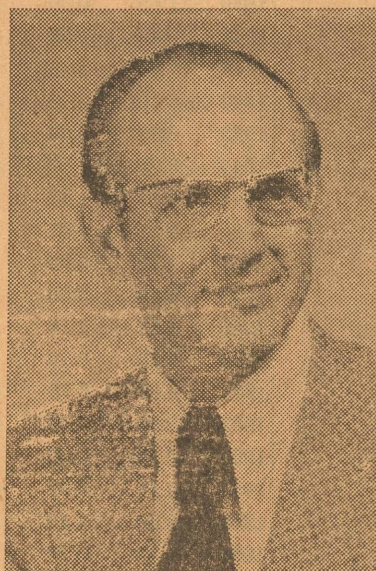

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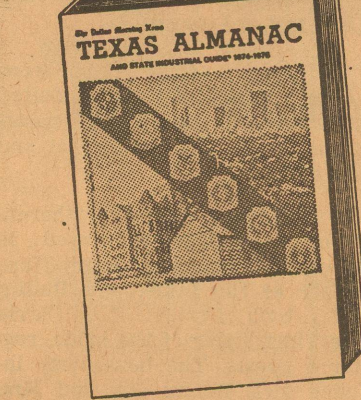

Denim Jeans Still Rank Highest

Fashion forecasts show the dress may be making a comeback, but nothing will ever replace jeans. Jeans are no longer exclusive property of the junior customer—they are making a strong appeal to the contemporary age group also.

Blue denim is seen not only in jeans, but also in skirts, jackets and coats.

Denim is made from 100% cotton—a scarce commodity now. With jeans making up a large percentage of the sportswear market, a majority of the cotton is being diverted there.

Small stores specializing in pants and jeans are taking much of the market from department stores. But the goods in these specialty shops are usually higher priced—although the quality and variety is generally better.

Are "Ghosts" Making Your Money Disappear?

Is your money disappearing so fast you think ghosts must be haunting your pocketbook? These ghosts won't knock on your door Halloween night—you'll have to hunt for them.

One of the fastest ways for a family to discover what's happening to the money is for everyone to keep a list of the money they spend for one month. Then follow these guides . . .

List the things bought that the family could have been just as happy without.

Circle items that could have been done or obtained with a resource other than money—traded, substituted or made.

Underline things bought on impulse—those not planned or discussed with other members of the family.

Check items bought on credit that wouldn't have been bought if cash had been necessary. This does not include planned or emergency credit purchases.

There may be other ghosts haunting your pocketbook, but count how many you've found with these guidelines.

Freezing Prepared Foods

Home-frozen main dishes are a boon to the busy homemaker. Frozen combination main dishes can add variety to your menu, offer quick meals for unexpected guests and provide appetizing, nutritious foods on busy days.

In spite of the variety of frozen prepared foods on the market, it is usually more economical to make your own. You can cook enough for several meals when you have time and then serve the family favorites on busy days.

You can freeze all of the prepared food in meal-size packages or serve part of the food immediately and freeze the rest. Place food to be frozen in the dish in which it is to be cooked, but first line the pan with heat-resistant freezer wrap.

Press the food to the slope of the container to prevent air pockets. Pull the wrap over the food. Put edges of the wrap together and fold several times so the wrap lies directly on top of the food.

Fold ends of the freezer wrap and seal with freezer tape. Label with the name of the food, date frozen and last date the food should be used for best eating quality. Freeze it immediately.

After it has frozen, it may be removed from the container and returned to the freezer. Then when you are ready to use the food, remove the wrap and return to the container in which it is to be cooked. Cook the food without thawing.

Some main dishes that freeze well are baked beans, lasagna, meat loaf and chicken a la king. These dishes may be stored in the freezer at 0 degrees F. and below.

Shoes Add To A Wardrobe's Total Fashion

Shoes, though often overlooked, are an important accessory in coordinating a wardrobe. With today's faddish looks in shoes, consumers need to be careful about choosing a style that will last the life of the shoe.

Choose children's shoes that fit properly and are sturdy. Children outgrow shoes so rapidly that the quality should outweigh the quantity when buying their shoes.

Proper care of shoes prolongs their life, and several measures for that care are:

- use a damp cloth to clean plastic covered shoes;
- a brush cleans suede best;
- fabric shoes can be washed in the machine; and
- leather shoes should be waxed.

Garden Check List For October

Dig and store caladium tubers. Throw out any that look diseased or rotted.

Continue to mow grass at regular intervals until hard frost stops growth.

Remove any noticeable dead or diseased branches from trees and shrubs before they drop all their leaves; the dead areas are easier to see now.

Do not be tempted to start pruning trees and shrubs just because your neighbor is doing so.

Finish dividing and replanting all iris, day lily and similar plants this month.

If you have a fall garden, keep a lightweight cover of some kind handy to cover tender vegetables in case of frost. A large cardboard box such as those in which furniture or refrigerators are shipped make excellent temporary cover for tomato plants.

Check St. Augustine lawns for Brown Patch. Treat with Terraclor (PCNB) to control.

Keep leaves raked and picked up in lawn areas. Do not burn or place in trash, rather use them in a compost pile in some out of the way area in the yard.

Good time to treat the lawn area with a complete fertilizer, especially in areas where excessive fall rains have leached out most of the nitrogen from the soil.

Look around the yard and make notes of any plants needing replacing, repairs to be made, and other chores that can be done during the winter months.

Check your pesticide storage cabinet. Destroy all empty containers in such a way that will prevent children and pets from getting to them.

Store all wettable powders in waterproof containers. Keep the original container with label and instructions intact so you will know what it is next spring. Usually wettable powders and liquid con-

centrate will keep from one season to the next if properly stored. Dusts will seldom be effective the second season.

Be sure to keep any leftover fertilizer containing a weed killer in a separate and well marked area so there will be no danger of using it in the wrong place next spring after the silver fish have made the label illegible.

Clean, sharpen all hand tools and cover all metal parts with a light coat of oil to prevent rust before storing for the winter. A bucket of dry sand plus a cup or two of oil makes an easy way to clean those yard tools and prevent rust.

When you use the lawn mower for what you figure is the last time before storing till spring, make a list of repairs and adjustments needed and take it to your favorite handyman for repairing during his winter slack period rather than waiting till spring when everyone wants the same work done yesterday.

TEXAS ALMANACS at the Success

Harlan Expresses Views

Doug Harlan, candidate for U. S. Congress from the 21st District, addressed the Board of Directors of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers on Oct. 8, in Del Rio.

The board, in its fall meeting, heard Harlan give his views on inflation, land use, and welfare.

Harlan stated that the main solution to the number-one problem facing America today—inflation—is a reduction in Federal spending in non-critical areas, coupled with lower interest rates. "It is time to take the fat out of bureaucracy and off the bureaucrats, and make the Federal government an equal partner with the American people in the effort to win the battle against inflation," Harlan said.

Termining proposed Federal Land Use regulations "the gravest threat to private ownership of property," Harlan said local problems should be worked out through local solutions by local governments. Harlan said he will be a strong advocate of this approach while in Congress.

He added his door will always be open to local leaders to discuss how he, as a Congressman, can aid them in their efforts.

In support of his "no-work-no-welfare" viewpoint, he castigated current welfare programs as being based on wrong principals. "We need to reinstate the 'work ethic' in this Country," Harlan said.

Harlan also expressed his emphatic opposition to any guaranteed annual income plan.

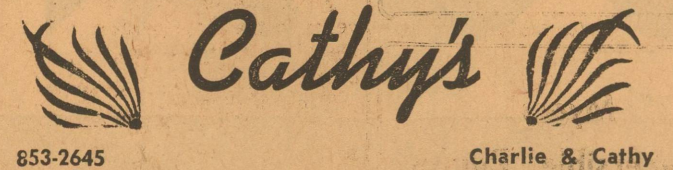

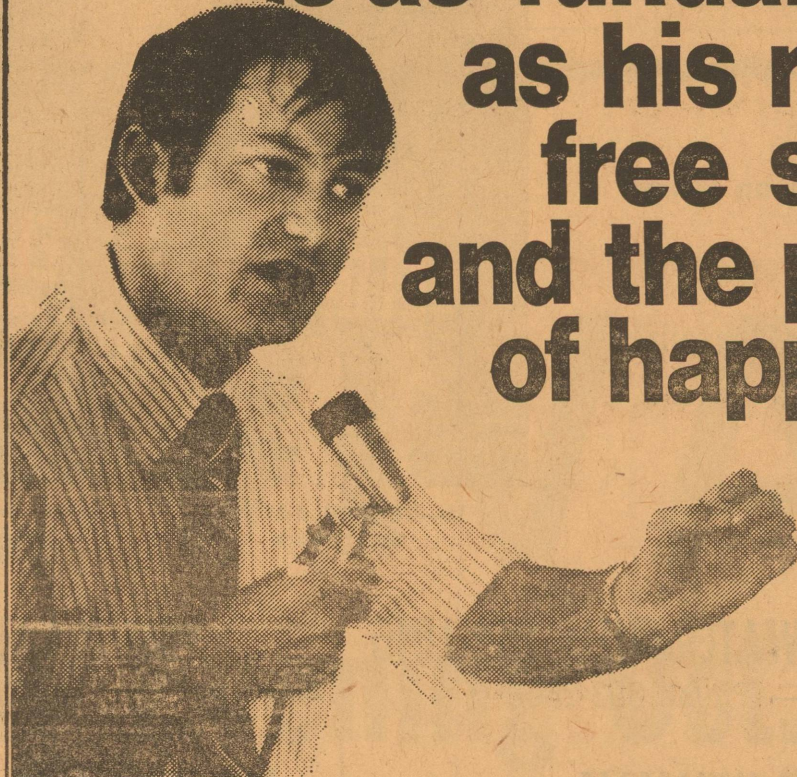
Miss Wood Serving As Lubbock Policewoman
