At the beginning of the second quarter, Eldorado's Jay Holley recovered a Wall fumble. But on the first play from scrimmage the Eagles fumbled back and Wall recovered.

After two possessions by each team, the Eagles drove down from their own 40 for a score with End John Tacker catching a 12-yard pass from Juan Montalvo with 1:09 left in the half. Elijio Rodriquez ran the extra point to give the Eagles their only lead of the night, 8-7.

Wall managed 8 more points in the second quarter, 6 in the third, and 7 in the fourth.

This loss dropped the Eagles to a 0-2 standing in district. Jill Edmiston and Carolyn Page were presented as Football Queens, and Margaret Powell was Band Queen.
