## Heavy Rain Brings Much Crop Damage

With various growers reporting 5½ inches of rain last week, the news this week is mostly about damage.

Following arrival of the first bales on October 16th, many growers started defoliating and were preparing to put their strippers in the field when everything was interrupted by more rain.

George Whitams is concerned about his hay crop. He says he has about 2500 to 3000 bales of hay already cut and laying on the ground when the rain came. He is hoping the rains stop and the crop dries up enough to be baled. "I'm hoping," he said.

But many people report that an additional inch fell early Monday morning.

Billy Jack Reynolds reported 5½ inches of rain last week, and the ground couldn't absorb it. Looking out at a lush field of cotton, all they could see was the tops above the water.

Among those voluntarily dropping by and reporting their rainfall were Jimmy West with 5.20 and Milton Faught with 3 inches.

The third quarter began with Cheatham kicking to the Hawks who returned to their own 41 yard line. On the second down Wall fumbled and Eagle Wayne Gibson covered. Eagles then carried to the 32 yard line, fumbled and Wall covered but failed to score.

The fourth quarter another Eagle fumble gave Wall their second T. D. The conversion failed leaving the score 16-14.

Cheatham carried the ball on the kick off to the Hawks 45 yard line. With 24 seconds left in the game Cheatham went over for an Eagle T. D. with Whitten making the conversion leaving the final score 24-14 for the Eagles.

Larry Fay, Leonard Lloyd, Albert Buitron, Hank Hutcherson, and Wayne Gibson were outstanding in both offensive and defensive play.

The Eagles go to Robert Lee Thursday the 31st of October. The game is at 6:00. Good luck boys!

It's difficult to predict how many qualified voters will go to the polls Tuesday to cast their ballots in this "off-year" General Election.

As of Monday morning, 17 absentee votes had been cast in the County Clerk's office and deadline for absences is this Friday, Nov. 1.

This is not a Presidential election year and neither of our two Texas senators is for election. Main interest locally, as elsewhere in Southwest Texas, is centered on the race for 21st District Congressman.

Veteran Democratic incumbent, Ovie Clark Fisher, is retiring at the end of this year from Congress after serving for 32 years. Congressmen's pay has quadrupled from the \$10,000 a year paid in 1942 when Fisher was elected to his initial term, to the present \$42,500 (and the "fringes" are worth an extra \$10,000 or so).

Both Democrat Bob Krueger and Republican Doug Harlan have been campaigning hard in recent months in their bids for Congress. Both have reportedly spent campaign funds equivalent to several times the annual salary of the post.

Both Krueger and Harlan have visited Eldorado in the interests of their campaigns during this past election year and have been well received by prospective voters.

Traditionally, the Southwest Texas area has been Democratic, but Krueger is apparently not counting on a "shoo-in" because he has continued to campaign actively over the 21st District since winning the Democratic nomination in the May and June primaries.

Some political observers consider the race a "toss-up" while giving Krueger a slight edge: Others think a lighter-than-normal turnout of voters Tuesday could tip it to Harlan, whose home territory is the heavily populated northwestern Bexar county. In fact, close to half of the district's voters live in Bexar, so they will carry considerable clout.

Considered a minor nominee is the American Party's Ed Gallion of Crane.

Local relatives received word recently of the death in Schulenburg of Fred Lux, who died there at the age of 87. He was the father of the late W. V. Lux of this place.

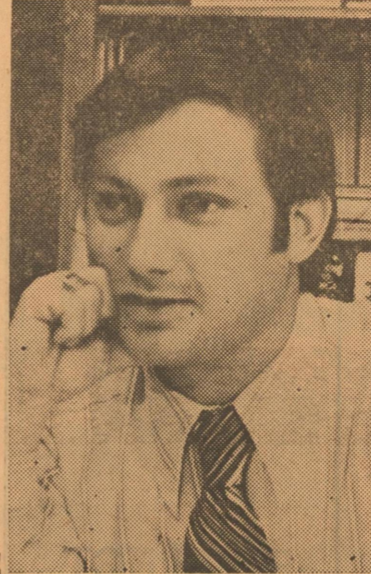

At the beginning of the second quarter, Eldorado's Jay Holley recovered a Wall fumble. But on the first play from scrimmage the Eagles fumbled back and Wall recovered.

After two possessions by each team, the Eagles drove down from their own 40 for a score with End John Tacker catching a 12-yard pass from Juan Montalvo with 1:09 left in the half. Eljijo Rodriquez ran the extra point to give the Eagles their only lead of the night, 8-7.

Wall managed 8 more points in the second quarter, 6 in the third, and 7 in the fourth.

This loss dropped the Eagles to a 0-2 standing in district. Jill Edmiston and Carolyn Page were presented as Football Queens, and Margaret Powell was Band Queen.

Their house sustained interior burns in the bathroom and the bathroom window was blown out, but none of the remainder of the house was damaged. Local firemen sent equipment to the scene.

Lloyd Patton, Fort Worth, will drill a 4,000-foot wildcat in north-east Schleicher County, 16 miles north of Fort McKavett and 2 1/2 miles south of the opener of the two-well Four Corners (lower Cross Cut) field of Schleicher and Tom Green county. It is the No. 2 H. C. and H. J. Grafa.

Location is 900 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 12-B-GH&SARR.

It is approximately 3/8 mile north of Patton's No. 1 Grafa, a 4,500-foot failure, abandoned April 31, 1968, and 1/4 mile south of a 5,972-foot failure and P mile south-east of a 4,200-foot failure.

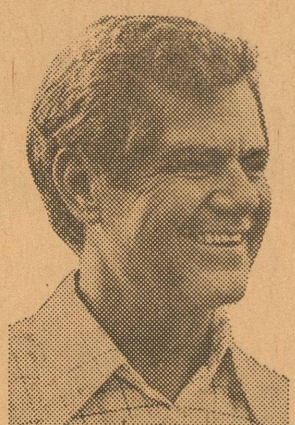
The Reynolds Home Demonstration Club met Oct. 21st at the Williams Country Store, with Mrs. Cecil Williams as hostess.

#### Program Set At Sonora On Predator Control Techniques

There will be a program in Sutton county on November 7th concerning Predator Control Techniques. The program will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Sonora 4-H Center. The morning program will consist of presentations on a current status of control techniques, use of the M-44 aircraft plane, then hunting and culling.

In the afternoon participants will be taken to the field for demonstrations on how to set traps, snares, and M-44.

Depending on the size of the crowd, plans are to break into small groups and use a round robin approach so that participants can have an opportunity to see and perhaps practice the techniques.

Program participants will be Mr. Milo Smith, Animal Wildlife Specialist, Mr. Milton Caroine, and other Bureau of Sports, Fisheries, and Wildlife personnel.

A Dutch treat barbecue will be served by the 4-H Club at cost of \$2.00 per plate.

Arrangements for this event are under direction of Allen E. Turner, District Extension Agent.

#### Prepare Now For Farm Census

Schiever County farmers should begin getting their records in shape for the 20th nationwide Census of Agriculture which will be conducted during the first part of 1975 by the Bureau of Census.

Accurate and detailed records will make it easy for farmers to comply with the federal agency's request. The important thing is to keep good records of your farming operations this year.

Farmers will receive their report forms by mail early next January. These should be completed and returned promptly.

Questions will ask for acreage of cropland harvested, quantity and market value of major crops produced, acres irrigated and means of irrigation, acreage treated with pesticides, lime and other chemicals, acreage fertilized by kind of fertilizer (dry, liquid, gas).

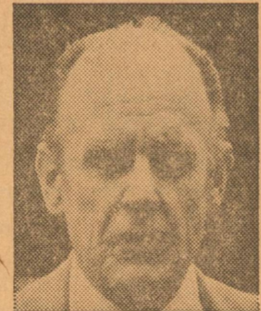

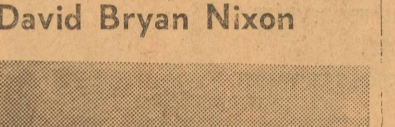

Harlan Has Rally; Cites Bracero Need

Harlan for Congress headquarters reported there was a rally for the Military community on Monday, Oct. 28, Veterans' Day, at the Roaring Twenties on Blanco Road in San Antonio. It was a Harlan-Rowe Military Rally. Mrs. Janelle McArthur, Harlan Campaign Manager, said the rally was held in conjunction with Nick Rowe, the former POW, who is a candidate for State Comptroller. Rowe, a 1960 West Point graduate, was a Special Forces Officer who escaped from the Viet Cong after five years as a prisoner. He and Doug Harlan were the featured guests at the function. Rowe is also the author of the book, "Five Years to Freedom." He is a native of McAllen, Texas. There was live music, provided by Larry Herman and his orchestra. Mrs. McArthur said, "We were most pleased to have Nick down to San Antonio for this rally. He is an outstanding man, as evidenced in his endorsement by the Dallas Morning News, and I know that everyone who met him was as impressed as I am."

Calls For New Bracero Program

Doug Harlan, candidate for the U. S. Congress from the 21st District, today restated his support for a Bracero-type program to legalize the use of Mexican nationals in farm and ranch labor. Harlan was pleased to learn that President Ford and Mexico's President Echeverria discussed the same program. Harlan said we are facing an acute shortage of persons who are willing to do the kind of intense physical labor required on many farms and ranches. He said, "Most farmers can't find or afford to hire people willing to do stoop labor. Unless we have another source we can tap, food prices will have to go up again." "President Ford is headed in the right direction on this problem in considering the Bracero program. The labor unions are wrong in saying that alien labor replaces domestic labor; there isn't any domestic labor," Harlan added. "If the unions keep up their opposition, the farmers will either have to mechanize and hire nobody or switch to crops which require lesser amounts of physical labor. Both actions will hurt the consumer and the labor market. These unions have no concept of responsibility or reality in their approach to agricultural problems," Harlan said. "I don't see how a union organizer can come into Texas and treat a farm or ranch like it's a steel plant. It just does not work," said Harlan. "If we don't have a program like this, the cattlemen's labor costs are going to go up astronomically, if they can get help at all. Many will face bankruptcy," Harlan added. Harlan also said that a well-regulated program would give employers the opportunity to cooperate in stemming the flow of illegal aliens; as well as giving the Immigration Service the tools to keep track of aliens in the United States.

**A Record Breaking State Fair**

The 1974 State Fair of Texas drew an all-time record number of people, surpassing the 1971 fair with a total of 3,133,388 patrons.

For decades, the fair has been a gem for Dallas, attracting to the city a broad spectrum of people from every walk of life.

The revenues the fair generates are important, of course. But more important is excitement of the fair, the trip to Dallas from the out-reaches of the state or the visit to the city from other regions and countries during a time steeped in the traditions of the Southwest.

This was a banner-year for the State Fair, not only in numbers of people, but in what fairgoers discovered once inside the grounds.

The foremost improvement was the cleanliness of the grounds. Wayne Gallagher, the State Fair's new general manager, had spear-headed a drive to upgrade the physical appearance of the exhibits and mazes during the spring and summer months. Then he insisted on maintenance during the fair itself.

The results were exceptional. Even on the last day, Sunday, Oct. 20, hardly a single stray piece of paper or trash could be seen anywhere; this type of attention will go a long way toward removing the stigma the fair has had when compared to Six Flags, the immaculate amusement park which Gallagher formerly headed.

In addition to the cleanliness, the flowers and exhibits were better than ever, adding a second dimension to the fair.

Gallagher envisions improvements of plaza areas, continued renovation of the midway, new livestock facilities and better staffing as a result of the financial success of the 1974 fair.

All of these factors should combine for a more attractive fair, and a better-coordinated environment year round at Fair Park. As the State Fair gets set for its Bicentennial theme next fall, our hats are off to Wayne Gallagher for a commendable performance in 1974. — Dallas Morning News.
