The TYC was placed in conserva torship in March 2007 after state of ficials received allegations of various forms of abuse and reports of failures and wrong-doing by staff.
The agency's stated mission is to provide for the care, custody, reha bilitation and reestablishment of Texas most chronically delinquent and serious juvenile offenders, ages 10 to 19. delkoff, who Perry named conservator and acting executive director of the TYC in December 2007. Nedelkoff succeeded Ed Owens who for six months served as conservator and act

AG calls for tougher laws
The Texas attorney general's fugi tive unit on Oct. 9 tracked down and arrested a Dallas man wanted for fail ing to register as a sex offender

The man, a convicted sex predator, was caught operating a sexually oriented Web site.

After the arrest, Attorney General Greg Abbott said the case indicates that tougher laws are needed to ensure law enforcement can properly monito known sexual predators.
Abbott recommended that reg istered sex offenders be required to supplement existing registration data by also providing the Texas Depart ment of Public Safety with their e-mail addresses and online identities, mobile telephone numbers, social networking aliases and other electronic identification information.

## What is Breast Cancer?

The human body is made of tiny building blocks called cells. Your body creates them, replacing those that die with new ones. Usually, the body creates healthy, normal cells that do just what they're supposed to do. This includes cells in the breasts.

If a cell changes into an abnormal, sometimes harmful form, it can divide quickly over and over again without dying, making many copies of itself. When this happens, a tumor, abnormal body cells grouped together in the form of a mass or lump, can start to form and grow. Breast cancer is a kind of tumor that develops in the cells of a person's breast.
Many people think that only women can get breast cancer, but because all people have breast tissue, men can get breast cancer as well - though this is rare. Another assumption is someone can not get breast cancer if they have no family history of breast cancer. This is not true, family history is only a part of someone's risk factor.
A tumor can form anywhere in a person's body. Someone has cancer when those abnormal cells will not stop growing, and then cause sickness in the body. Someone with breast cancer may have cancer cells in just one part of the breast, which might be felt as a lump. The cancer can spread throughout one or both breasts. Sometimes breast cancer spreads to other parts of the body, like the bones, the liver, or elsewhere.

Social Security to increase benefits 5.8 percent in '09

Monthly Social Security and Supplemental Security Income benefits for more than 55 million Americans will increase 5.8 percent in 2009, the Social Security Administration announced today. The 5.8 percent increase is the largest since 1982.
Social Security and Supplemental Security Income benefits increase automatically each year based on the rise in the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W), from the third quarter of the prior year to the corresponding period of the current year. This year's increase in the CPI-W was 5.8 increase

The 5.8 percent Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA) will begin with benefits that over 50 million Social Security beneficiaries receive in January 2009. Increased payments to more than 7 million Supplemental Security Income bupplemental Security beneficiaries will begin on December 31 .

Some other changes that take effect in January of each year are based on the increase in
average wages. Based on that average wages. Based on that increase, the maximum amount of earnings subject to the Social will increase to $\$ 106,800$ from will increase to $\$ 106,800$ from $\$ 102,000$. Of the estimated 164 million workers who will pay
