Documents offer glimpse into Jeffs' life as most wanted fugitive

Prophet wanted to establish new Texas Trust at YFZ Ranch

Warren Jeffs learned that he had been named to the FBI's Most Wanted List in 2005 after Schleicher County Sheriff David Doran notified YFZ Ranch manager Merril Jessop of the fact in a face-to-face visit.


That tidbit and hundreds of others came to light this week when a small portion of the evidence seized during the April 3, 2008 raid on the YFZ Ranch was made public. The evidence was included with other material filed with the court in the custody case of 17-year-old Teresa Jeffs. The material was released to the public when Judge Walther refused to seal the evidence following the dismissal of Ms. Jeffs' case.

In an August 16, 2005 transcript of Warren Jeffs' recitations, the FLDS prophet says that Merril Jessop told him of a meeting with Sheriff Doran.

During the meeting Doran reportedly observes that Warren Jeffs has ordered other men to surrender to authorities and asks why Jeffs won't surrender himself. The Sheriff continues to say that Jeffs was recently named to the FBI's Most Wanted List.

Jeffs goes on to claim that law enforcement officials are more interested in killing than capturing him, which is the reason he says he will not surrender.

Sifting through the documents hasn't been easy. With over 600 pages of material it may take days for some details to come to light.

One interesting detail that was uncovered refers to a trust fund Jeffs wanted to create in Texas. The trust would have functioned much like the United Effort Plan Trust that controls nearly all the property in Hildale, Utah and Colorado City, Arizona, collectively known as Short Creek. That fund was wrested away from Jeffs' control by state courts in Utah and a Special Fiduciary named Bruce Wisan was appointed as manager.

The documents for the proposed Texas Trust were never signed but they provide a blueprint for how Jeffs wanted to structure the community at the YFZ Ranch. It would have been a non-profit corporation with Jeffs as the sole beneficiary. The

trust would have owned all the property at the YFZ Ranch with Jeffs and seven of his lieutenants serving as the trust's board of directors.

Another interesting item involved Jeffs ordering Willie Jessop to travel to Florida as a diversion. Jessop now serves as spokesman for the YFZ Ranch. Jeffs said his Florida trip, austensibly to purchase land, would attract attention away from Short Creek long enough for the prophet to make a quick visit there.

Then there were the more personal concerns Jeffs had for his followers. He explained that one of the young women at the ranch had been in labor for three days but the family was reluctant to go to a hospital because the mother was underage and the husband, whom Jeffs identified as Raymond Jessop, would be in jeopardy of prosecution.

Jeffs says the Lord revealed to him that the couple would have a girl, but that he would also give them "an experience."

Raymond Merril Jessop was eventually indicted in 2008, following the YFZ raid. He is presently awaiting trial on felony charges including Sexual Assault of a Child and Bigamy.

At yet another point in the transcript, Jeffs was critical of Wendell Nielsen, one of his most trusted advisers. Jeffs explained that Nielsen was too jovial or

County adopts plan for prescibed burns, maintains overall Burn Ban

A Burn Ban remains in effect inside Schleicher County despite the fact that county commissioners met Monday and voted to allow the Edwards Plateau Prescribed Burn Association to continue conducting prescribed burns. They also added a provision to allow for burns to take place under the direction of a certified Prescribed Burn Manager as allowed under Section 153.047 of the Texas Natural Resource Code.

The move came even as the Texas Forest Service issued a Wildfire Alert for all of West Texas.

Fire Chief Jerry Jones met briefly with the commissioners Monday and advised them of his concerns that several suspicious grass fires may have been intentionally set recently along County Road 412 or Rabbit Road.

Chief Jones said he will be asking the Sheriff's Department for assistance in the matter.

Road superintendent Clay Burleson then asked the commissioners to call for bids on Diesel Fuel, which they did. The commissioners next approved bonds for newly elected officials. The men also approved a \$2,375 budget amendment for the Election Administrator Brenda Mayfield's office to pay for maintenance of voting machines. The amendment was requested by Mayfield during the commissioners January 26th meeting.

Sheriff David Doran then appeared before the court to request the purchase of four commercial grade laptop computers at \$1,111 each.

Doran told the men that his department last purchased new laptops five years ago. The commissioners took the request under advisement and plan to act on it at their next meeting.

Gaines County resident Connie Menix next met with the commissioners concerning his desire to lease Schleicher County school land in that county recently released by Jerry D. Harris. Menix further expressed an interest in drilling several water wells on the property.

At that, the commissioners voted to authorize Judge Charlie Bradley to negotiate with Mr. Menix for plowing of the land until such time as it can be leased.

Judge Bradley advised Menix, that County Attorney Clint Griffin recently finished an outline of a new lease and the commissioners are in the process of looking it over. No other action was taken on the matter.

The court then approved Phillips Irrigation Solutions bid for installation of a new sprinkler system on one-third of the courthouse lawn. The cost came to \$5,995. The commissioners plan to complete the entire lawn in sections.

Judge Bradley then distributed a draft the county's 2006 audit as prepared by Jones, Hay, Marschall and McKinney for consideration by the commissioners.

County Treasurer Karen Henderson then presented a transfer in the amount of \$12,000 paid to the City of SEE COUNTY ON PAGE 6

. City Council holds regular monthly meeting

The Eldorado City Council met Monday, February 9, 2009 with all members


The meeting began with Utility Superintendent Floyd Fay requesting 50 cent pay raises for two new employees. The council granted the request and Fay moved on to report on work in the various utility deparments.

Fay explained that an inspector from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) reported some minor

violations in the city's sewer department which are being addressed.

Fay went on to explain that city workers are running the pothole patcher again and that an employee was injured after tripping over a pipe at the landfill and was airlifted to Shannon Hospital because one of the ambulances was out of service. City Secretary Carolyn Mayo added that the employee was released that same day.

Fay went on to explain that the city is

still operating a rented front-end loader at the landfill.

Responding to questions about compliance problems at the landfill, Mayor Nikolauk noted that he was aware that TCEQ inspectors had found several small infractions like a sign that wasn't sized properly and blowing trash.

TCEQ recently assigned the city with a poor compliance rating after repeat violations of rules including the state's daily cover and intermediate cover rules. The city's compliance rating has slipped from Good to Average to Poor in recent months. On January 6, 2009 TCEQ turned the city's case over to its Enforcement Division for complinace monitoring.


Mayor Nikolauk noted that he was aware of the poor rating but wasn't

In other business, City Secretary Carolyn Mayo reported a \$20,000 shortfall in budgeted revenue, mostly due to income lost when the YFZ Ranch stopped hauling their wastewater to the city's sewer plant. The city had been receiving approximately \$3,500 per month until the ranch put its own sewer plant into operation.

That prompted a discussion of an agreement between the city and the YFZ Ranch under which the city would oversee operation of the ranch's sewer plant.

Mayor Nikolauk explained that, at TCEQ's urging, the city agreed to participate in a plan to supervise the plant. As part of the plan a "dummy corporation" was created by the YFZ Ranch with Utility Suprintendent Floyd Fay listed as one of its officers, the mayor said.

Now, TCEQ is quesitoning whether the city is eligible to take part in the agreement since the agency's rules only **SEE CITY ON PAGE 6**

Secondhand smoke is the third leading cause of preventable death in the United States. Every year, secondhand smoke kills 53,000 Americans, more than three times as many people as drunk drivers. The U.S. Sur-

there a debate regarding the dangers of secondhandsmoke, and Texans are catching on. More than twothirds of Texans - 68 percent - support

a comprehensive ban on smoking in public facilities and indoor

workplaces, according to a recent poll by Smoke-Free Texas. This includes eliminating secondhand smoke in bars and restaurants, where workers are 50 percent more likely to die from lung cancer than the general

This year, just as we did in 2007, we have filed bills to make public facilities and indoor workplaces smoke-free. This legislation will save thousands of lives, improve public health, reduce state spending, boost business and support tourism. It is no wonder that 24 other states already have passed similar legislation.

We are proud to author House Bill 5 and Senate Bill 544 that give all Texans strong, comprehensive protection from hazardous secondhand smoke in the workplace. When this legislation becomes law, Texas workers no longer will have to choose between their health and their paycheck.

We have spent the last three years working on this issue and so have our opponents. Big Tobacco would like everyone to believe two things. First, the overwhelming body of scientific evidence linking secondhand smoke to heart attack and cancer deaths is "junk science." Second, the right to smoke is an individual liberty second to none.

The science is not in doubt. Big Tobacco would have you believe it is, but consider the source. In 1994, tobacco executives testified under oath before Congress and stated that "nicotine is not addictive."

Now consider this. There have been nine comprehensive studies on the effects of secondhand smoke and the positive effects of comprehensive smoke-free laws. Every study conclusively linked these laws to significant reductions in heart attack deaths. These studies were conducted by well-respected institutions such as the Harvard School of Public Health, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the Surgeon General, and they were published in peerreviewed medical journals such as the Journal of the American Medical Association.


Some opponents invoke the cause of liberty. They are correct to do so, but wrong in to whom the liberty belongs. All Texans deserve to breathe smoke-free air, and no one should have to choose between their job and their health.

Texas government requires businesses to spend billions to clean the air outside. Texas government also requires businesses to expend thousands of dollars to comply with a litany of health and safety code regulations. Legislators make decisions all the time that limit the liberty of individuals and business owners so that the health and safety of the patrons and workers are protected.

This legislation does not take away anyone's right to smoke. All we are asking is that smokers respect the rights and health of Texas workers. In Texas, it is not illegal to drink alcohol, but we all understand the dangers involved with drunk driving. However, it is a shock for most people to realize that secondhand smoke kills more than three times the number of people as drunk drivers. How do we rationalize that?

The debate is truly over. Secondhand smoke kills. As Lance Armstrong recently stated, in 10 years we will look back at this debate and wonder, "What were we debating, and why did it take Texas so long?"

Our so-called representatives in Congress clearly have no idea what to do to get the economy moving again. Just consider some of the line items they've included in the proposed \$900 billion stimulus plan--a plan that is supposed to create jobs and stimulate the economy. • \$2 billion to re-start a near-zero emissions coal power plant in Illinois that the Department of Energy defunded last year because it said the project was inefficient.

• \$1.4 billion for rural waste dis-

posal programs. • \$6 billion to turn federal buildings into "green" buildings.

• \$1.2 billion for "youth activities," including youth summer job programs.

• A \$246 million tax break for Hollywood movie producers to buy motion picture film.

• \$650 million for the digital television converter box coupon

• \$88 million for the Coast Guard to design a new polar icebreaker (arctic ship).

• \$448 million for constructing the Department of Homeland Security headquarters.

• \$248 million for furniture at the new Homeland Security headquarters.

• \$160 million for "paid volunteers" at the Corporation for National and Community Service.

• \$5.5 million for "energy efficiency initiatives" at the Department of Veterans Affairs National Cemetery Administration.

• \$850 million for Amtrak.

• \$100 million for reducing the hazard of lead-based paint.

• \$75 million to construct a "security training" facility for State Department Security officers when they can be trained at existing facilities of other agencies.

• \$110 million to the Farm Service Agency to upgrade computer

• \$200 million in funding for the lease of alternative energy vehicles for use on military installations.

Congressional Republicans categorized the list as an example of "wasteful" stimulus spending. Considering the amount of pork barrel spending those very same Republicans have approved over the years, it may be hypocritical of them to adopt such an outraged tone. But, in this regard, they are right--the new stimulus package is a crapshoot. While many of these projects may be worthy programs, it's doubtful that they're going to create the kinds

Perry's emergency items call for legislation that would:

• Reform the Texas Windstorm Insurance Association and fund the related Catastrophe Reserve Trust Fund;

• Improve state schools and centers operated by the state of Texas; and

• Appropriate funds to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for screening and detection devices for contraband and personnel, and security equipment.

FEMA extends deadline for help

The Federal Emergency Management Agency extended to Feb. 20 the deadline for Texas homeowners, renters and business owners to apply for federal and state disaster assistance for damages and losses caused by Hurricane Ike.

The Governor's Division of Emergency Management requested the extension, citing a continued flow of new applications from Texans for disaster assistance. Homeowners, renters, and business

owners who choose to register may be eligible for: · Grants to help pay for temporary

housing needs; • Essential home repairs;

• Serious disaster-related expenses not covered by insurance or other sources; and

· Low interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) to repair or replace real or personal property.

"If you've delayed registering for FEMA assistance, please do it now," said federal coordinating officer Stephen M. De Blasio Sr. "FEMA wants to help Texans who need and qualify for assistance, but we can't help you if you don't register."

Reps request broader access

One hundred and two Texas House members on Feb. 2 sent a letter to Texas cable and satellite providers asking them to televise legislative sessions across the state.

"This is the logical next step in making state government more transparent and accountable," said Rep. Joaquin Castro, D-San Antonio, who led the effort to collect lawmakers' signatures.

Lawmakers file tax-capping bills

Already this session, many lawmakers have filed bills to limit property taxes and appraisal increases:

Most of these bills specify appraisal caps of 103 percent, 105 percent or 110


Some of the bills would amend state law and some would be in the form of proposed constitutional amendments that could end up on the Nov. 3 elec-

Taking the Polar Express to the North Pole

The excitement grew as the big steam engine approached the depot in Palestine ringing its bell, sounding its whistle and creating clouds of steam. Families dressed in pajamas were full of anticipation. They would soon be boarding the Polar Express for a trip to the North

Last year eighteen thousand people rode the Polar Express out of Palestine. This year the number increased to thirty thousand.

My wife and I were among the group. Yes, I did have on my PJ's. Our five-year-old grandson Caleb was with us. He is a train fanatic first class. I asked him how many times he had seen the Polar Express movie and he said thousands of times. He has been fascinated with trains since he was a year old. He has half a dozen different train sets in his room.

The Polar Express runs along the tracks of the Texas State Railroad in November and December. It has two or three runs every evening. The steam engine pulls nine cars, each one carrying around a hundred passengers. The train leaves Palestine and travels a few

miles up the track toward Rusk and stops at Santa's house at the North Pole. It's actually a spot along the railroad with thousands of lights. Santa's house sits at the entrance to the North Pole and he waves at passengers as the train comes to a stop.

While the children and adults plaster their noses against the train windows to see the lights, Santa boards the train with some elves who start handing out large reindeer bells to passengers. Santa and his elves ride back to the depot in Palestine.

The hour-long trip has lots to offer. Soon after the train starts moving, those on board are treated to cups of hot chocolate while the hot chocolate song (Hot, Hot, Hot!) from the movie plays over the train's sound system.

The servers of the hot chocolate

are acrobats who turn flips at the depot while people board the train. On board, they dance with passengers and lead the crowd in Christmas songs. On the return trip, they pass out copies of the Polar Express book. The pajama-clad passengers follow along while the story is read over loud speakers.

The American Heritage Railway, which owns the Silverton-Durango train and the Great Smoky Mountains Railroad, bought the Texas State Railroad a year ago and has brought some unique trains to operate between Rusk and Palestine. Huge crowds showed up to view Thomas the Tank Engine. The two newest ones are THE LITTLE EN-GINE THAT COULD and THE LONE RANGER. The latter, to run on Thursdays, will feature a train robbery that is interrupted by the Lone Ranger.

A Lone Ranger movie with Johnny Depp as Tonto will be filmed on the railroad in coming months. The LITTLE ENGINE THAT COULD will run pretty much all year on Thursdays. On the drawing board is a train featuring Snoopy and Charlie Brown.





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


A Special Tribute To America's Presidents
