

Second Revenue Sharing Checks Come To County and City Offices

For the second time in about a month, the local County and City governments received Federal Revenue Sharing checks last week.

The County Commissioners met and voted to renew the \$20,800 Certificate of Deposit for an additional 30-day period. They accepted the new Federal Revenue Sharing Check in the amount of \$19,986, and ordered the County Treasurer to purchase another Certificate in amount of \$20,000.

City Secretary Lum Burk reported that the city office received a second check for \$3,165.

Spell Of Ice And Snow Closes School For Two Day Period Last Week

During the latter part of last week, a spell of severe weather accompanied by snow and ice visited this area and all of West Texas. The Eldorado schools joined others of the area in closing Thursday and Friday. A covering of ice and packed snow made streets slick and dangerous to drive on.

School Supt. C. T. Humphries stated that the two days would be made up some time in the coming Spring, probably at Easter.
