

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

The undeveloped land which Hill quickly and with as little lost time cleared became the townsite of as possible, they did not spend what is now Harlingen. In order to irrigate the rich soil, a principal source of the community income, he organized the Harlingen Land and Water Company and designed an extensive system of irrigation canals. Furthermore, he helped frame the state law estab-lishing the Cameron County Irrigation District.

As the state was swept up with the nation's rapid industrialization, Hill felt that transportation by sea was essential. Hence, he planned the intracoastal canal system linking Harlingen with the Gulf at Port

Transportation by rail was at an all-time peak, as industries shipped their goods all over the country So that Harlingen would be included in nationwide commercial activities, Hill helped raise the money to bring a branch of the St. Louis, Brownsville and Mexican Railway into the Valley.

Succeeding generations of the Lon C. Hill family have also been noted participants in civic, state and national affairs. His son, Lon C. Hill, Jr., was lauded in the Congress of the United States on March 14, 1970, as proponent of the International Falcon Dam on the Rio



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

Texas Air Control Board held a series of news conferences in five metropolitan areas to air information on the federal government's plan to impose transportation con-

The Board was told by its executive secretary proposed anti-pollution controls are unreasonable and would cost Texans \$300 million for auto emission controls that affect only 1% of the pollution problem. The Board balked on a staff motion to test in court federal power to control auto pollution in the state.

Meanwhile, the federal Environmental Protection Agency scheduled July 17-19 public hearings in Texas to get reaction. Controls would go into effect August 15, involving gas supply, parking, car pools, anti-pollution devices and special road lanes for buses.


