They flood the mails, and tie up telephone lines, and some disappointed consumers have registered complaints about them with the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division.


One abuse which has caused this office to take action is the "free vacation" gimmick in which prospects were offered free "vacations" in return for visiting a project, but later discovered that they had to ravel at their own expense, buy their own meals, and had nothing

to see but a bare lot. That comes under the heading of false and misleading advertising and some speculators have been obliged through court-approved voluntary compliance agreements to stop that practice.

Recently, my staff gained a permanent injunction against entrepeneur who attempted to lure people to a lake "development" by the use of highly deceptive advertising. The developer was ordered by the district court to cease making these fraudulent claims.

Too often, consumers do not complain—because they do not know they can, or they are ashamed to admit they took the bait. Did you ever receive one of those mailings which include a

1. Operating hours are 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Tuesday thru Saturday. No admittance to dump grounds will be permitted other than during these hours.

2. There is a \$1.00 minimum fee for dumping. This \$1.00 fee will cover loads up to and including one-ton pick-ups. Any load over this will be charged \$3.00 to dump.

3. No animals or livestock of any kind will be permitted to be disposed of at the dump.

4. No burning at the dump will be allowed at any time by any person other than designated City employee.

5. All loads will be dumped at designated location under the supervision of attendant on duty.

THERE WILL BE CITY EMPLOYEE ON DUTY AT THE DUMP GROUNDS DURING THE HOURS THE DUMP IS OPEN TO COLLECT FEES AND SUPERVISE DUMPING.

Doctor Shortage Affects Texas

By U. S. Senator John Tower One of the great paradoxes of our day is the ever-increasing critical shortage of health manpower

in the midst of the most affluent society in history. The simple fact is that there are not enough physicians, dentists or optometrists to meet our country's demand for health care. It is conservatively estimated that there currently is a shortage of 48,000 physicians, 20,000 dentists and over 10,000 optometrists nationwide.

This shortage is especially felt in hard-pressed rural and urbancore areas, including many Texas counties, which do not normally attract medical personnel. For this reason I have introduced a bill in the Senate to provide a special tax incentive for health professionals

"And seeing the multitudes, he went up into a mountain: and when he was set, his disciples came unto him."

St. Matthew 5:1 The Sermon on the Mount is the acknowledged statement of the ideal Christian life.
