New liquid measuring cup includes metric units.

Within 10 years it is expected that the United States will be converted to the Inter-national Metric System. Authorities agree that the first step toward switching to metric is to start thinking to here ric is to start thinking metric. One way for the homemaker is with Foley's new liquid measuring cup. It includes the customary cup and ounce measurements up to 2 cups (16 liquid ounce) plus metric (16 liquid ounces) plus metric measurements to 500 milliliters — a cook's introduction. to the metric system. There are six basic units in

the International Metric sys-tem. The unit of length is meter, mass is gram, volume is liter, time is second, electric current is ampere, and temperature is celsius (formerly called centigrade). All other units of measurements are expansions of these six base units. The entire system is based on ten and multiples or submultiples of ten. A milliliter, the measurement used for the new Foley measuring cup, for example, is one thousandths of a liter. A liter is a unit slightly larger than a quart. Five hundred milliliters measure a little more than 2 cups, or a little more than a pint. The new metric measuring cup is made in clear plastic with a convenient long handle and two pouring spouts. It is available with and without a juicer that snugly fits the top.



How Appliances Guard Your Health

Most families look upon modern appliances as necessities or conveniences, but few probably realize their value in promoting good health.

Yet the same technology that has eliminated so much household drudgery also has contributed significantly toward the improvement of health in the family as well as the community.

Rose Franklin, a staff home economist with the General Electric and Hotpoint Con-sumers Institute, cited in a recent speech some of the nu-merous health benefits to be derived from the use of auto-matic dishwashers, food waste disposers, automatic washers and the household refrigera-tor and freezer.

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A dishwasher, Miss Frank-lin pointed out, not only eliminates a time-consuming chore, it actually does wash chore, it actually does wash and dry dishes hygienically cleaner than dishes washed and dried by hand. Ultraviolet tests, she said, show that more food soil is removed from dishes washed in an auto-matic dishwasher than is re-moved from dishes washed by hand in the sink or dishpan.

One of the reasons autointerior of the reasons auto-matic dishwashers do a better job of cleaning is that they are designed to use water as hot as 140 to 150 degrees, whereas human hands can barely stand water terms barely stand water tempera-tures of 110 to 120 degreeseven with rubber gloves.

The dishwasher also eli-minates the need for a dish towel, Miss Franklin pointed out, which often is used for a lot of other household clean-up chores and which may become contaminated and surread germs spread germs.

The food-waste disposer pro-

motes household good health by eliminating food residue which, particularly during the hot summer months, can ferment and decompose in a gar-bage can and attract disease-carrying flies and rodents. By providing a convenient and simple method of flushing most food wastes down the drain, potentially dangerous contamination centers are eli-minated, Miss Franklin said.

Home laundry equipment Home laundry equipment also plays an important role in family health by providing a cleaner wash, to say nothing of easing the burden on the homemaker. Certainly, the push-button ease with which today's wash can be done does a lot to promote both the mon a lot to promote both the men-tal and physical health of the homemaker who once had to spend up to eight hours at what was described as "steam-ing healthraching hand shan ing, backbreaking, hand-chap-ping, cold-catching, temper-destroying work."

The health benefits of household refrigeration are often overlooked simply because the electric refrigerator has been common in the home far longer than any of the far longer than any of the other appliances previously mentioned, Miss Franklin noted. The ability to freeze or preserve fresh foods and meats, fish and poultry not only helps retard spoilage and contamination but also as-sures a better balanced and more nutritious diet to pro-mote continued family good more nutritious citer to pro-mote continued family good health. Ice from the freezer also is helpful in the treat-ment of minor cuts, scrapes and headaches.

The appliance industry over the years has made significant contributions to promoting good health and, reported Miss Franklin, it will con-tinue to do so in the years


