Cleaning No-Frost Refrigerators

College Station, Texas.—No-frost refrigerators need regular cleaning, one authority emphasizes.

"Just because it doesn't build up frost is no reason to overlook cleaning," says Mrs. Doris Myers, home management specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Uncovered and stale foods—as well as accidental spills—create "off" odors in any refrigerator, the specialist continued.

"Regular cleaning removes these odors and sweetens an otherwise stale refrigerator."

Mrs. Myers recommended using a solution of two tablespoons soda per quart of water to "sweeten" or neutralize odors.

She outlined six steps for thorough cleaning.

1. Remove frozen foods from the freezer section and wrap in layers of newspapers—or place in an insulated chest—to keep frozen.

2. Wash freezer compartment with soda solution. Rinse with clear water, dry and return frozen foods to section.

3. Remove all foods from refrigerator. Wash the bottom, top and walls. Clean all drawers, racks and shelves thoroughly with soda solution. Return to proper place.

4. Wipe door and gasket with a cloth that has been dipped in detergent water and then wrung out. Rinse and dry well. Avoid touching the gasket as it will deteriorate.

The specialist warned that food- or grease build-up on the gasket can cause an incomplete seal. As a result, the refrigerator works harder to keep cool.

5. Wipe outside of food containers, jars and bottles with a damp cloth before returning them to the clean refrigerator.

6. Clean appliance exterior with

detergent water. Rinse with clear water and wipe dry.

In addition, the drip tray under the appliance should be washed and dried regularly. Occasionally dust the coils with a vacuum cleaner, she concluded.

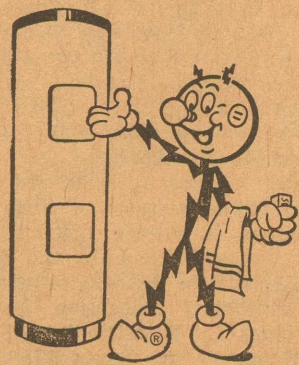

Indian Reservation Now In Full Swing

All activities at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation of East Texas are in full swing for the first time this year, Carson Watt, director of Tribal Enterprise, announced today.

Even though the Reservation, located 90 miles north of Houston on U. S. 190 between Livingston and Woodville, is in its first year of seven-days-a-week, year-round operation, up to now, some of its most popular attractions have been opened only on week ends.

"Our popular Na-Ski-La Indian Dancers are now performing every day, and the Indian craftsmen in the Living Indian Village are now conducting demonstrations of Indian cooking, the making of long-leaf pine needle baskets, colorful beaded jewelry and arrowheads, as well as demonstrating the use of the blowgun, a little known, though traditional weapon of these Woodland Indians."

Other activities, including the Big Thicket Tour, Indian Country Tour, Indian Chief Train Ride, Big Thicket Reptile Garden Tour, tribal museum and crafts shop, Inn of the 12 Clans Restaurant, as well as the Big Sandy Creek and the Lake Tombigbee Campgrounds, both of which offer swimming and fishing, complete trailer hookups, and restrooms with hot showers, are all in full scale operation.

Watt said that the Reservation was still relatively unknown and unexplored by the public and offered one of the most unique one day to one week vacation spots in the state.

Operating hours have also been extended from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays and from 12:30 to 6:00 p.m. on Sundays.

Both campgrounds are opened 24 hours every day.

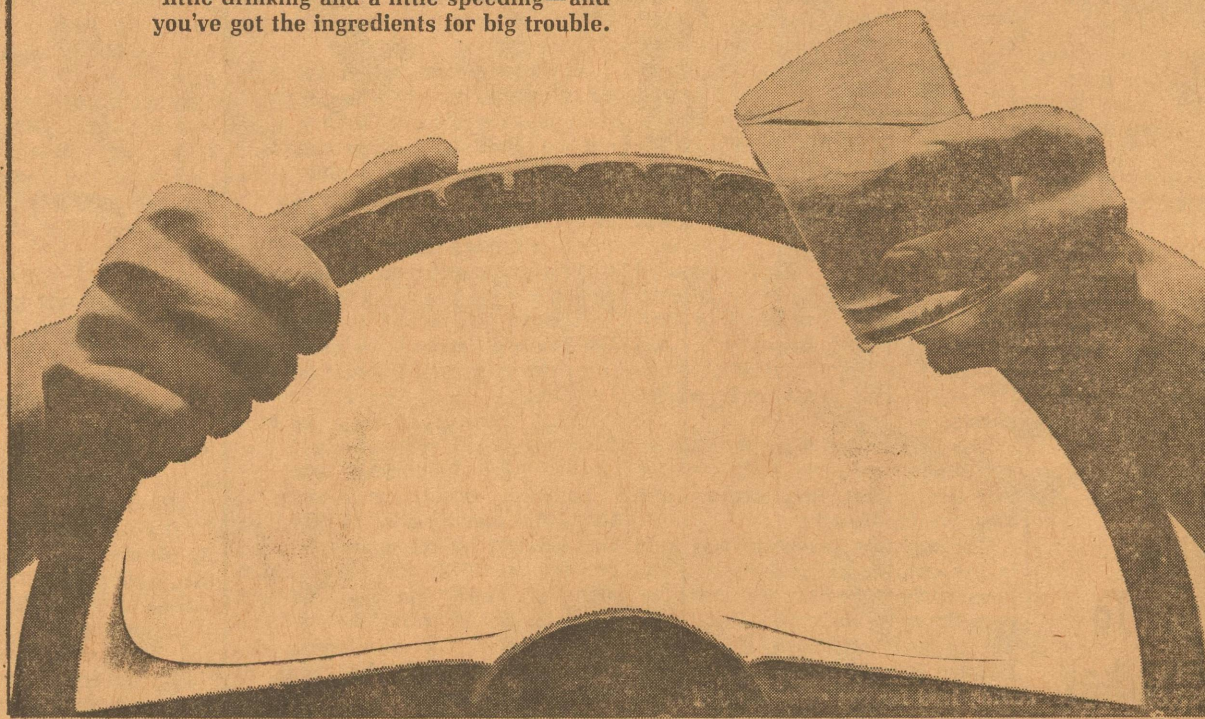

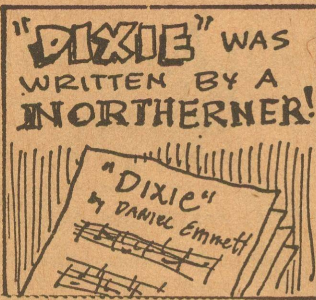

Longue Vue Rose Collection Featured In American Publication

New Orleans, La.—The roses of Longue Vue, which are now in full bloom, were featured in the April issue of The American Rose, official magazine of the American Rose Society.

Longue Vue is a city estate garden in New Orleans which was opened to the public several years ago by the Longue Vue Foundation. The eight-acre garden is a series of cloistered patios and courts which feature classical landscape design and fountains.

Roses which received favorable comment by the American Rose include the elegant apricot-colored "Helen Traubel," All America Rose Selection in 1951; "White Knight," a Hybrid Tea perfected by F. Meiland and an All America Rose Selection of 1952; "Margo Koster," a Polyantha rose, and "Summer Snow," a Floribunda rose which thrives at Longue Vue.

On the cover of The American Rose is a border of "White Knight" in standard and bush form, as well as the climbing Cherokee Rose which extends to the roof level of Longue Vue House.

Longue Vue is one of the five gardens featured in the color film, "Great Gardens of Louisiana" which was released by the Louisiana Travel Promotion Association two years ago. Other gardens in the film are Hodges Gardens, Many, Louisiana; Rosedown Plantation Gardens, St. Francisville; Jungle Gardens and Rip Van Winkle Gardens near New Iberia.

THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG

Of America.

And to the Republic—a state in which sovereign power is vested in representatives chosen by the people to govern. And government is the people and it's from the people to the leaders, not from the leaders to the people.

For which it stands.

One nation—meaning, so blessed by God.

Indivisible—incapable of being divided.

With Liberty—which is freedom and the right of power to live one's own life without threats or fear of some sort of retaliation.

And Justice—the principle of quality of dealing fairly with others.

For All—which means it's as much your country as it is mine.

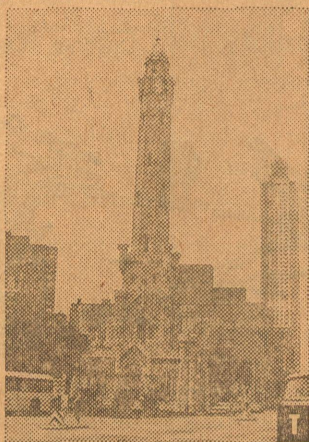
A LANDMARK DECISION

A major achievement in American civil engineering, Chesbrough's Chicago Water Supply System has been designated a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark by the American Society of Civil Engineers.

The system, which includes the famed Chicago Water Tower and the Chicago Avenue Pumping Station, was constructed between 1864-1869 to obtain a safe potable water supply for the citizens of Chicago. It also was the first major system to utilize offshore intake systems. Its subaqueous tunnel was a pioneering project in American civil engineering history.

The Chicago Water Supply System as we know it today—made up of intake cribs located far out in Lake Michigan, large intake tunnels carrying the water from the cribs to filtration plants and pumping stations on shore, and an extensive system of cast iron distribution mains—had its real beginning in 1869 with the completion, under Ellis S. Chesbrough's direction, of the two-mile crib, the two-mile tunnel, the Chicago Avenue Pumping Station and the Water Tower.

The tunnel was designed to supply water for one million inhabitants at the rate of 50 gallons per day for each person; the average quantity used at that time. Chesbrough's tunnel extended 10,567 feet out under Lake



Michigan and was lined to a finished diameter of five feet. Work on the land shaft began in March 1864, and continued day and night with an average progress of 12 feet per day. The pumping station and water tower were completed in 1869, only two years before the great Chicago fire. During the fire, the fireproof water tower stood in the heart of the conflagration and remained one of the few buildings to withstand the blaze.

In designating the Chicago Water Supply System as a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark, the American Society of Civil Engineers paid particular homage to its designer, Ellis S. Chesbrough, who also served as president of the Society in 1878, the oldest national professional engineering society in the U.S.
