



## Indian Reservation Now in Full Swing

All activities at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation of East Texas are in full swing for the first time this year, Carson Watt, director of Tribal Enterprise, announced today.

Even though the Reservation, located 90 miles north of Houston on U. S. 190 between Livingston and Woodville, is in its first year of seven-days-a-week, year-round operation, up to now, some of its most popular attractions have been opened only on week ends.

"Our popular Na-Ski-La Indian Dancers are now performing every day, and the Indian craftsmen in the Living Indian Village are now conducting demonstrations of Indian cooking, the making of longleaf pine needle baskets, colorful beaded jewelry and arrowheads, as as well as demonstrating the use of the blowgun, a little known, though traditional weapon of these Woodland Indians."

Other activities, including the Big Thicket Tour, Indian Country Tour, Indian Chief Train Ride, Big Thicket Reptile Garden Tour, tribal museum and crafts shop, Inn of the 12 Clans Restaurant, as well as the Big Sandy Creek and the Lake Tombigbee Campgrounds, both of which offer swimming and fishing, complete trailer hookups, and restrooms with hot showers, are all in full scale operation.

Watt said that the Reservation was still relatively unknown and unexplored by the public and offered one of the most unique one day to one week vacation spots in

Operating hours have also been extended from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays and from 12:30 to 6:00 p.m. on

## Cleaning No-Frost Refrigerators

College Station, Texas.—No-frost refrigerators need regular cleaning, one authority emphasizes.

'Just because it doesn't build up frost is no reason to overlook cleaning," says Mrs. Doris Myers, home management specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Uncovered and stale foodswell as accidental spills-create "off" odors in any refrigerator, the specialist continued.

"Regular cleaning removes these odors and sweetens an otherwise stale refrigerator."

Mrs. Myers recommended using a solution of two tablespoons soda per quart of water to "sweeten" or neutralize odors

#### A LANDMARK DECISION

A major achievement in American civil engineering, Chesbrough's Chicago Water Supply System has been designated a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark by the American Society of Civil Engineers.

The system, which includes the famed Chicago Water Tow-er and the Chicago Avenue Pumping Station, was constructed between 1864-1869 to obtain a safe potable water supply for the citizens of Chicago. It also was the first major system to utilize offshore intake systems. Its subaqueous tunnel was a pioneer ing project in American civil engineering history.

The Chicago Water Supply System as we know it todaymade up of intake cribs located far out in Lake Michigan, large intake tunnels carrying the water from the cribs to filtration plants and pumping stations on shore, and an extensive system of cast iron distribution mains-had its real beginning in 1869 with the completion, under Ellis S. Chesbrough's direction, of the two-mile crib, the two-mile tunnel, the Chicago Avenue Pumping Station and the Wa-

The tunnel was designed to supply water for one mil-lion inhabitants at the rate of 50 gallons per day for each person; the average quantity used at that time. Chesbrough's tunnel extended 10,567 feet out under Lake



Michigan and was lined to a finished diameter of five feet. Work on the land shaft began in March 1864, and continued day and night with an average progress of 12 feet per day. The pumping station and water tower were completed in 1869, only two years before the great Chicago fire. During the fire, the fireproof water tower stood in the heart of the conflagration and remained one of the few buildings to withstand the blaze.

In designating the Chicago Water Supply System as a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark, the American Society of Civil Engineers paid particular homage to its designer, Ellis S. Chesbrough, who also served as president of the Society in 1878, the oldest national professional engineering society in the U.S.

Texas leaders on the SAD project have been Dr. Robert Toler of the Agricultural Experiment Station and the A&M University Plant Sciences Department, and Dr. Walter Walla, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Floratam has resisted SAD in greenhouse and field tests for the past three years.

As for chinch bugs, the pests apparently are unable to feed on the improved grass and cannot sur-

Foundation sod of Floratam has been made available to certified producers, and lists of these producers can be obtained by homeowners from their local county Extension Service agents. Supplies may be short this year, but should be plentiful next spring.

Toler urged homeowners to buy the sod only from reputable nurser-

#### Black Spot Attacking Roses

Black Spot, a fungus disease, is appearing in many roses this year due to high humidity and rainfall.

The disease causes dark spots on either side of the leaf with chlorosis, or yellowing, of the surrounding leaf area. The darkness of the spots and yellow margins distinguish black spot from other diseases which also cause black spots.

Black spot, which may weaken plants and make them more susceptible to other disorders, causes premature leaf drop and sometimes severe defoliation. Continued attack results in unattractive plant foliage as well as reduced size, number and quality of blooms.

Rose varieties may vary in susceptibility to black spot but none are completely immune. Hybrid teas are generally more susceptible

The first step toward controlling black spots is sanitation. If only a few leaves show symptoms, remove and hurn them Remove all diseased leaves from around plants, particularly at the end of the growing season since the fungus overwinters in such leaves. The canes are also a frequent overwintering place so it is sometimes wise to prune them back before new growth starts. However, do not cut

too close to grafts. Many commercial fungicide preparations are also available to control black spot and other rose diseases. Follow a regular spray program throughout the growing season with maneb, benomyl, chlorothalonil or folpet. Sulfur dust is also effective but may cause plant burns when applied at temperatures above 85 degrees.

Additional information for rose disease control may be obtained from the county Extension office.



#### County Extension Agent's Column By DIANE LUBE

#### Buying A Sewing Machine

If you're thinking of buying a new sewing machine, comparisonshop just as you would for a car. Before shopping for a sewing machine, decide whether you want a cabinet or portable model. Then buy the type that fits your needs and pocketbook. You're wasting money if you buy a machine that has features you'll never use.

A sewing machine may have straight-stitch, zigzag stitch, or a combination of zigzag and utility or decorative stitches. Shop around and try several before deciding which is needed.

When checking a machine, notice if it runs smoothly and quietly and is free from vibrations at all

Does it have a choice of speeds? Does it operate as well at a slow speed as fast? Will it stop and start quickly

Take several samples of fabric with you to check stitching. Two strips of fabric, cut equal lengths and seamed, should be the same length after stitching

Also, stitches should be balanced and not drawn primarily to one

Try threading the machine and winding a bobbin. It should be easy to do with accessible threading guides. The bobbin case should be easily removed and replaced.

Where is the light? Does it throw light on the work surface? Is it where it won't burn you? Does the light make threading easy?

Ask how to clean and care for the machine. Are all parts easy to get to for cleaning and oiling? Look at the instruction book. It should be easy to read and also

contain illustrations. Does the book seem to have enough instructions? Will the store give you free personal instruc-

Purchase your machine from a reputable dealer who will give reliable service. Also be sure you understand the guarantees offered by the manufacturer.

After comparing machines and making your choice, read the fine print of your contract.
