Political Intelligence— Who's Running Here?

It's almost fall, which means it's almost time to start speculating on next year's races. Bexar County folks are already talking about the possibility of U. S. Rep. O. C. Fisher's retirement. Fisher's 21st Congressional district lumps a large piece of Bexar with an even larger piece of West Texas, but nearly half the population comes from the heavily Anglo, mostly Republican north side of San Antonio. Fisher ("the only Congressman to get a zero rating from the ADA," as he billed himself in years past) is recuperating from heart surgery, but he swears he gets stronger—and more determined not to quit—every day.

Nonetheless, no end of folks are considering the race. Possible pri-

mary combatants include Rep. John Poerner of Hondo (the governor's water-carrier on school financing last session, who has said he will not run if O. C. does), Bexar County Judge Blair Reeves (who made the county a plaintiff in the Edwards Aquifer protection suit, but who raises some liberal hackles), Rep. Frank Lombardino of San Antonio ("Neanderthal," sniffs an Observer friend there) and Bexar County Commissioner Tom Stohlhandske ("Cro-magnon," says the same friend).

Speculation is just as heated among Republicans: Doug Harlan, the liberal Republican who ran Fisher a good race last year, is in London but reportedly is watching closely. And Henry Catto, presently ambassador to El Salvador, is another off-mentioned possibility. Catto, besides being Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby's brother-in-law, is the Republican who lost the legendary 1960 horse racing-and-prison-record House race

to Red Berry (no kidding, those were the issues, along with Catto's youth and wealth.) —The Texas Observer.

Remember That?

According to a recent story in U. S. News & World Report, food chain executives around the country report that—surprise—some food prices are beginning to drop back out of the stratosphere. Chicken, pork, and eggs, for example. What did it? Well, it wasn't massive, organized, coast-to-coast boycotts or a big, hallyhooded bunch of government price controls. Those have been tried and have failed. No, this was the totally unorganized but terrifically effective action of millions of housewives who just decided, each for herself, that the prices were too much to pay.

Unlike the nationwide beef boycott—which was an across the board buyers' strike—this was individual selective shopping, with

Gas Discovery Finaled

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1-Y University Lands, Schleicher County Ellenburger gas discovery 25 miles west-northwest of Eldorado and 5/8 mile northeast of depleted Ellenburger production in the Buckhorn (Strawn) field, and six miles west-southwest of the depleted one-well University Block 101 (Ellenburger oil) field, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.7 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 29,400-1. the nation's typical housewife buying when the price was right, passing up high-priced products for substitutes when it wasn't.

This sort of consumer resistance doesn't make a whole industry the villain. It doesn't provoke counter-boycotts by angry producers. What it does is reward those who can offer a lower price with sales, while it penalizes those who don't with the loss of their customers.

Americans may have forgotten the term during the past months of phases, freezes and buyer strikes, but this remarkable system is called the free market. It's not as showy and dramatic as the big nationwide projects, but in the long run it has the distinct advantage that it works. —Dallas Morning News.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days;

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session;

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts with jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million;

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified;

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages, to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."

Market Report

College Station, Tex.—Fryer chicken prices dipped "considerably lower than prices two or three weeks ago," according to Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt.
The consumer marketing information specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, termed fried chicken "almost impossible to surpass for economy and versatility."
"Egg supplies are adequate and count as a bargain when compared to other high-protein foods—grade A, large-size eggs offer the most economy and quality for your egg money."
Shortages in the meat case and high prices will dictate restraint in meat buying, the specialist predicted.
"However, beef items to consider this week include chuck roasts, ground beef, stew meat and liver. Also be on the lookout for reasonably priced sirloin rib and round steaks."
She cited dairy features as "irregular" with most emphasis on lowfat milk, cottage cheese and medium-sharp cheddar cheese.
Also, tuna is featured in some stores along with several ready-to-serve canned meats.
Turning to fruits and vegetables in seasonal supply, Mrs. Clyatt noted there are many—however, a strong demand from commercial processors keeps them a little higher than usual for this time of year.
"Worthy of consideration price- and quality-wise are prunes, plums, peaches, nectarines, bananas, seedless grapes, watermelons and cantaloupes."
"Fresh vegetable items in best supply at the most economical prices include carrots, cabbage, celery, dry yellow onions, head lettuce, potatoes, squash, corn, radishes, green peppers and green onions."

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Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL

Austin, Tex.—An executive order has been issued by Gov. Dolph Briscoe creating the Division of Rural Community Services in the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Governor Briscoe, who has listed rural development as one of the priorities of his administration, created the new division in response to what he termed "the urgent needs of rural areas."
In announcing the new rural services offices, Governor Briscoe said the role of the Texas Department of Community Affairs is to make all state resources available and accessible to local communities as they strive to help themselves.

The Rural Community Services Division will provide information and technical assistance to rural communities and will assist in development of a state policy for rural development, the Governor said.
The new office will serve as a clearing house and will be a central state office that rural communities can go to for help said Briscoe.
Raymond L. Prewett, executive director of the Texas Rural Development Commission, has been named to head up the Division of Rural Community Services.
A major part of his new duties, said the Governor, will be to assist rural communities in their relations with state and federal agencies and to direct communities with specific problems to the appropriate agencies.

Revision Commission Reverses
The Texas Constitutional Revision Commission reversed its August 25 decision—that the Texas Legislature should meet annually—and voted that the proposed new Constitution should require the legislature to meet once every two years. But the time and duration of session or sessions would be set by the lawmakers themselves.
