





Seven New Cultures To Be At Festival

San Antonio, Tex.-All of Texas' 26 major ethnic groups will be represented in the state's biggest party, the Texas Folklife Festival in San Antonio, September 6-9. Seven cultures will join in the fun this year for the first time at the second annual celebration at the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures.

The newcomers—French Alsatians, Danish, English, Swedish, Swiss, Yugoslay and Dutch-will join last year's festival participants to complete the line-up of ethnic groups which have given Texas a fascinating cultural heritage.

Two thousand participants from over 100 Texas cities will converge on the Alamo City to demonstrate how Texans of all races and national origins have fun.

Describing the festival as "Texas" Biggest Block Party," festival manager O. T. Baker said, "This is a fun thing. Texans from 26 ethnic groups come here to identify themselves. It's sort of an informal state-wide family reunion."

Festival visitors can sample the foods of 23 different nations, enoy the music and dances of over dozen ethnic groups, try their skills at horseshoe pitching and Belgian bowling, or join in the fun of an "East Texas Style Singing Convention" held nightly under a Pioneer Brush Arbor. On the grassy slopes of the Ins-

titute grounds, visitors can relax and be entertained by a voriety of performers-Negro and Wendish choirs, old-time fiddlers and country-western bands, foot-stompin' Cajun music makers and flamenco guitarists.

Baker said 17 festivals from throughout the state will participate, from the Albany Fandangle to the New Braunfels Wurstfest. The 15-acre site will be covered

with many exhibits ranging from Texas Longhorns to Irish artifacts. All the fun and games of Texas will be there, including zany events such as watermelon seed spitting contests, Cajun crawfish races, domino tournaments, cow calling demonstrations, Scottish caber tossing and Indian stick ball games.

For nostalgia, the festival will recall a spectrum of pioneer life with such activities as corn shuckin' and shelling, log rolling, log house raising, rail splitting, quilt-Reference ing bees and many other by-gone experiences.

Texas' finest artists and craftsmen will be demonstrating their specialties throughout the celebration and children will have the opportunity to build their own toys, play in a haystack or just slide down the grassy hills of the Institute

An attendance of 100,000 is estimated for the festival, compared to the 64,000 persons who turned out for the event last year. Free shuttle bus service will be

provided throughout the Folklife Festival, servicing San Antonio's major downtown parking lots.

Usually these pests are most active in late summer and fall, but favorable temperatures and moisture conditions have brought on their early arrival. Thus they may be invading other areas ahead of schedule.


Armyworms attack many plants and can do serious damage to lawns, pastures, and early planted small grains.

Although normally night feeders. they also are active on cloudy days. Since usually unseen during the day, frequent and careful inspection should be made in shaded areas to detect the worms before extensive damage occurs.

When hatched, the worms are ess than 1/2 inch long and are white with black heads. At maturity armyworms are about 11/2 inches in length and may range from pale green to almost black in color with several light stripes along the body. One identifying marking is an inverted "Y" on front of the head.

Where control is necessary, it is suggested to contact the county Extension office for specific recmmendations. Regardless of what insecticide is used, follow direc-tions on the label.

Unless controlled, armyworms are capable of destroying entire lawns, fields of forage or other! Therefore, early detection crops. and action are crucial for successful control.



Save Energy By Being Watt-Wise

It's easy enough to figure | out what it costs hourly to operate any specific appliance. It's almost impossible, though, to determine what it costs to operate a typical family's appliances for a typical day; there are simply too many variables-climate, family size, time spent at home, number of appliances, etc.

However, the Edison Electric Institute has calculated that each American household last year used an average of 21 kilowatt hours of electricity a day for all purposes. The average cost per day was 48 cents.

By any measure, electricity and the appliances it serves must be considered among our most efficient necessities.

Because appliances are so essentially economical to operate, the consumer cannot expect to slash his monthly utility bill dramatically by cutting corners on energy consumption, points out Jane Butel, manager of General Electric Company's Consumers Institute. After all, how much room for saving is there in a daily expense which may be 48 cents or less?

The GE consumer specialist, however, points out that there are ways to reduce expenses and conserve energy if the homemaker is willing to work at it, and that the saving of a few pennies here and few pennies there may eventually add up to a meaningful sum.

More importantly, though, if everyone were to make a continuing contribution toward conservation of our elec-

trical resources, it would ease the strain on them during this period in which the demand for electricity threatens to exceed the industry's ability to supply it. One important way you can

save-money as well as electrical energy-is by practicing regular preventative mainte-nance, reports Mrs. Butel. Maintenance is often overlooked as a money-saver because appliances generally perform their tasks so quietly and dependably it is often assumed they are functioning efficiently as well.

A 10-year-old refrigerator, for example, is probably preserving food and making ice as automatically today as the first day it was installed. However, a door gasket may have hardened with age and cracked, allowing cold air to leak out and making the compressor work longer hours to maintain the desired interior temperature. Or it may well be consuming more energy than when new because accumulated dirt and dust around condenser coils are forcing the compressor to work harder to dissipate heat.

Surprising as it may seem, plain old good housekeeping is one way to conserve energy, save money, extend the life of your electrical appliances – and avoid having to call for the repair man!

Although you probably won't notice a great difference in your electrical bill, each such penny-saver does make a contribution to economy and conservation.




