Barn. County Extension Agent Scott Edmonson and High School Ag Teacher Cory Stevens were busily getting things ready for the first-ever stock show to be held in the new ag barn.

Come one, come all to the 67th annual Schleicher County Junior Livestock, Food and Project Show, beginning today at the agricultural exhibition center just south of Eldorado on U.S. 277.
 Creative arts entries will be judged today with public viewing beginning at 5:00 p.m. Livestock entries must be in place by 6:00 p.m. this evening.
 Nancy Lester wants to remind anyone who wants to enter items in women's division need to

have their entries at the show barn between 10 a.m. and noon on Thursday, January 10. Entries will include art, hobbies & crafts, and clothing.
 The Livestock show will begin Friday afternoon, January 11th with Meat Goats being shown at 2:00 p.m. Lamb divisions will begin showing at 7:00 p.m.
 On Saturday, beginning at 9:00 a.m. the Steer Show will begin the days events followed by the Heifer and Swine Show. The food show

and dog show two popular events will follow. The dog show open to the public will have three age divisions and two categories. The categories are "Dressed Dog" and "Groomed Dog." Please have your dog at the show barn at 10:45. See the complete schedule of events, below.

Ballots set for March 12th party primaries

After the deadline to file for a place on the March 12, 2002 primary ballot in the Democratic and Republican primaries passed last week, the only contest races on the county level proved to be for the County Commissioner seats in Precinct 2 and 4. Incumbent commissioner Bill Clark drew a challenge from Albert Torres in the Democratic Primary. With no Republican on the ballot in that precinct, the primary will likely decide the election.
 Meanwhile in Precinct #4, three men are hoping to take over when current commissioner Ross Whitten steps down. Whitten's decision not to seek re-election opened the way for the contested election for an open seat. Filing to run in the Republican Primary were Matt Brown and William Edmiston. The winner of that race will face Mike Lux, who filed in the Democratic Primary.
 None of the other local races drew challengers. County Judge Johnny Griffin, County Clerk Peggy Williams, County Treasurer Karen Henderson and Justice of the Peace James C. Doyle are each on the ballot in the Democratic Primary. None of them have opponents.
 State Representative District 74 Pete Gallego will have no opponent in the Democratic Primary. However, Uvalde County Attorney Pedro "Pete" Nieto has filed for that office in the Republican Primary. Likewise, State Senator Robert Duncan has no challenger in the Republican Primary but San Antonio pharmacist Leticia Van de Putte has filed for that office in the Democratic primary election, according to documents filed with the Secretary of State's office in Austin.

Community computer network moves a few steps closer to becoming a reality

Two local taxing entities signed on this week to assist in bringing high speed internet access to Eldorado. First, the Schleicher County Hospital District's board of trustees voted unanimously last Thursday to contribute \$10,000.00 toward the project. Then, the Eldorado City Council followed suit at its meeting Monday night and voted unanimously to contribute an additional \$10,000.00. The money will be used as matching funds if and when a grant from the Texas Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) is received.
 Debbie Griffin and Kay Creek, representing the Schleicher Coun-

ty Community Network met with the Hospital Board at a specially called meeting last Thursday. The women explained that a half-million dollar grant is available to help bring high-speed internet access to Eldorado. Also, that the grant will pay to make computers and internet access available to people who can't currently afford either.
 Griffin explained that Schleicher County ISD, had already applied for and received a \$25,000.00 planning grant, in order to help carry out the formal application process. She explained that there are currently sixty-one communities applying for TIF grants and added that

forty-eight of the applicants will receive grants, provided each of them grants is funded at the half-million dollar level. If some apply for and receive less money, then more of the applicants will be successful, Griffin said.
 After discussing the matter at length, the hospital trustees voted in favor of contributing to the project. They also agreed to allow the hospital to act as fiscal agent for the grant, if it is received.
 Griffin then met with the Eldorado City Council at their regular monthly meeting Monday night. Also present were Hospital Administrator Ann Fagan-Cook and the hospital's accounts receivable manager, Phillip Sharp.
 Griffin repeated the pitch she had made to the hospital board. She also explained that the hospital is considering keeping the project alive, once the term of the grant expires. In the end, the council voted unanimously to contribute \$10,000.00 to the project.
 Griffin said she plans to seek donations from Schleicher County as well as the school district. Local businesses and organizations will also be asked to contribute.
 Word should come quickly as to whether or not the local effort is successful. Griffin explained that grant awards are scheduled to be made by the end of February. However, she said she really doesn't expect that to happen before April.

Morales surprises observers by filing for governor

AUSTIN — Talk about dropping a big blob of onion dip in the old fruit punch bowl.

Everyone, both Democrats and Republicans, expected former state attorney general Dan Morales to follow through with his publicly stated intention to run for the U.S. Senate. No one seems to have had any warning that he was going to engage in an electoral catfight with another Democrat in the gubernatorial race.

But on the last day it was possible, Morales sent someone to the state Democratic headquarters in Austin to hand over the paperwork to get him on the ballot against Laredo oilman Tony Sanchez in

the March 12 primary.

"It's a surprise, but it's not cataclysmic," assesses one Democratic Party partisan.

But Gov. Rick Perry, the Republican candidate, can only view it as good news.

"There will be some defections (from Sanchez supporters to Morales), that's only human nature," the Democratic observer said.

"But it's important to remember that only the activists vote in the primaries—the extreme right and the extreme liberal," he added.

In other words, the mainstream of both parties will be saving their vote until November, when it counts most.

Having two heavy-hitter Democrats slugging it out in the primary race is actually a good thing, at least in the opinion of this particular Democrat insider.

"Competition's good," he said. "It sharpens everyone up."

So why did Morales opt for a shot at the Governor's Mansion instead of the U.S. Capitol?

Consensus seems to be that he must have decided he couldn't win the Senate race. Another important factor is money. State campaign spending laws are a lot more candidate-friendly than federal law.

This was not the first time Morales has surprised that august Austin crowd referred to as "political observers."

The first time was in 1990, when as a House member he decided for a statewide race for attorney general.

No one really thought he'd pull it off, but he did. He served for the next eight years.

Another surprise came in 1998, when he announced he would not seek a third term as the state's top civil lawyer.

Some thought Morales' next political surprise would be not running for the Senate seat being vacated by Phil Gramm. They were right, but only half right.

Also on the dance card

Though the Democrats will now have to fight among themselves before turning to Perry in

the governor's race, there are other races.

For lieutenant governor, the filing deadline brought no surprises: It's Democrat John Sharp with no primary competition facing two Republicans, Land Commissioner David Dewhurst and Tom Kelly of Galveston.

In the attorney general's race, it will be Austin Democrat Kirk Watson against Republican Greg Abbot with neither having a primary opponent.

Another race with no primary problems for either candidate will be incumbent Republican Carol Rylander's bid to keep her job as comptroller in a race against Democrat Marty Akins of Marble Falls.

Republican Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs faces either Ernest De Leon of Brownsville or Tom Ramsay of Mount Vernon, who have to duke it out in the primary.

For land commissioner, its Republicans Kenn George of Dallas and Jerry Patterson of Austin against either David Bensen of Beaumont or Ray Madrigal of Corpus Christi, the Democratic contenders.



Alley Oop Land

Iraan is in that area of Texas that people drive right on through without stopping. They think about the only interesting things to see there are catclaw, yucca and greasewood bushes. Funny thing. The people of Iraan think the same thing. But there is one big difference in the people who live in Iraan and those just passing through: the people in Iraan love the place.

Iraan was named for Ira and Ann Yates, a ranching couple who became wealthy when oil was discovered on their land in 1926. The Yates Field was the biggest oil find in Texas. It ranks third in production in the USA behind the Prudhoe Bay and Kuparuk fields in Alaska. More than one thousand producing wells are located in a 26,000 acre area. The field continues to produce 25,000 barrels of oil per day. The first place of business in Iraan was a filing station. Seems only right.

The Yates family acquired the land in 1915 by trading a grocery store in Rankin, Texas. He lost everything twice and took a job as a street grader in San Angelo. By the fall of 1926, cattle prices were down and the ranch was in serious financial trouble. Yates was sitting on his porch, worrying, the night before his 67th birthday when word reached him that the well had come in. He said he would see about it the next morning and went to bed.

The area around ranch headquarters became a boomtown. Yates converted a barn into a hotel and the area became known as the Red Barn community. It sup-

plied groceries, work clothes and other essentials to oil field workers.

A town named Grube sprang up across the Pecos river in Crockett county. It was named for a man who started selling bootleg whiskey in a small tent on the riverbank opposite the Yates field. Soon the traffic over the rickety bridge became so steady that more businesses started. Grube was for entertainment and featured dance halls, saloons and gambling joints. The dance band in one place had two fiddlers, a piano player and a guitarist. When the group added a trombone player, the customers became so annoyed with the sounds they chased the trombone player across the river with gunfire.

When a saloon owner tried to overcharge the oil field hands, they fastened a winch line around the saloon and pulled it off the foundation. Texas Rangers raided the town frequently and finally it shut down.

V. T. Hamlin, an artist and writer doing some work for an oil company, went to Iraan, became fascinated with the geology and history of the area and started a comic strip about cavemen entitled Alley Oop. It featured the antics of Alley Oop, Dinny, Oola, Dr. Womnung, the Grand Wizer, King Guz and Foozy. The strip is still carried by some newspapers.

A large likeness of Alley Oop is in a park in Iraan and one of the city's big events is a celebration called Alley Oop Days. It features a mule race, golf cart polo and goat sacking. Queen Oola and Miss Pebbles rule over the festivities.





Dallas Cowboys invite Jody Jones to tryout



Eldorado City Council holds regular monthly meeting

The Eldorado City Council voted Monday night to participate with other local jurisdictions in an application for a Texas Telecommunication Fund (TIF) grant. For their part, the council voted unanimously to contribute \$10,000.00 toward the "matching funds" portion of the grant. Eldorado High School librarian Debbie Griffin met with the council and explained that it is possible that the community could receive a half-million dollar grant with which to fund high-speed internet access for the community. (See related story on Page 1)

On hand for the meeting were Mayor Nikolauk and council members Richard Mendez, Dora Bosman, Tommy Minor and Toni Sudduth. Councilman Robert Bybee was absent. Among other business the group discussed damage to a gas meter at a local residence. It was explained that a contractor, working on the private gas lines at the residence, had disconnected the meter. The city was later notified to reconnect the gas and city personnel found the meter was

damaged. After discussing the matter the council chose stand by its long-standing policy that only city crews may connect or disconnect a meter and ordered the contractor to pay for the damage. They further noted that it is a felony for individuals or contractors to alter city utility connections without prior authorization.

Next, the council voted to hire the engineering firm of Hibbs and Todd to carry out work on a water system improvement project in the southern portion of town. It was noted that ninety percent of the work is being paid for by a grant through the Texas Community Development Program. The council also voted to contract with A & J Howoco of Lubbock to serve as grant administrator.

The council then approved the minutes of the December 10 meeting. They also reviewed and approved the city's financial reports and okayed the payment of monthly bills. A tax report and investment report were also reviewed.

City Superintendent Jack Dean then updated the council on work

that is underway to repair a water leak at the County Golf Course. He also expressed his concern about citizens who stop city employees on the street to request repairs. Dean noted that city personnel work in several different departments and therefore have different responsibilities. He said that citizens should make work requests at City Hall so that the appropriate personnel can be assigned.

Dean further reported that on work that will begin soon at the wastewater treatment plant. He also noted that contractors for Broadwing, the company that is laying fiber optic cable through the county cut through a private gas line serving two residences on the rural gas pipeline. He noted that temporary repairs had been made to the line and that the individuals who own the line will complete permanent repairs within the week.

Next, City Administrator Randy Mankin reported that the city landfill had received 19.99 tons of trash per day during the calendar year 2001. That compares to the 20 tons per day that is allowed under the city's permit from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. Seventy-five percent of the waste was brought to the site from other towns. This resulted in revenues to the city totaling \$192,453.98.

A revised Animal Control Ordinance was tabled until the February meeting and an invoice from the "Ports to Plains" highway coalition was held from payment awaiting a progress report from the coalition.

Mankin then reported that natural gas rates are beginning to climb, but not nearly as high as last year. He noted, however, that Conoco's billings always come in after the city has sold the gas to its customers, making it difficult to set a gas rate, especially when gas rates start going up.

Mankin then discussed changing the city payroll policy. He noted that for years city employees have received their pay checks at noon on Friday, although the work week, which ends at 5:00 p.m. on Friday is not yet complete. He said that problems have occurred when an employee takes vacation time, or sick leave time on Friday afternoon, after the payroll has already gone out. With the council's permission, Mankin said he would change the policy so that the work week is completed before pay checks are issued.

Before adjourning, the council voted unanimously to call for bids for repairs at the wastewater treatment plant. There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 8:20 p.m.
