The Commodity Food Program Eldorado: will cease operation and the Food Stamp Program will begin issuance November 1. Only families certified as eligible will be issued stamps. Certified families will receive an ATP Card, Authorization to Purchase, in the mail. The ATP Card will have four purchase options cash required and the amount of stamps allotted) for the client to choose from. The food stamp recipient will choose his option and sign the ATP card in the presence of the postal clerk.





Austin, Tex.—Some 230,000 aged, blind and disabled receiving state aid are being notified they will get final welfare checks from the State Welfare Department in December.

The federal governmnt assumes responsibility for their assistance January 1, under the new Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program administered by the Social Security Administration.

Medical and social services and food stamps for eligible persons will remain the responsibility of the state welfare agency.

The elderly who get Social Security checks will continue to receive them along with a second check from SSI if they qualify under the federal program.

Most recipients will get higher assistance payments under SSI. Some, however, will receive less. Residents of nursing homes or institutions will remain eligible for medical assistance.

The State Welfare Department will continue to furnish the needy with glasses, dentures, hearing aids, prescribed drugs, medical services and food stamps if they qua-

Eighty-four per cent will receive more money; 2% will lose assistance altogether; reductions can be expected by 9% and 5% will get about the same amount.

In most cases of loss or reduction, benefits will be compensated through state-administered social services programs like foster care

SSI recipients can get food stamps greater than the amount of welfare grants added to the amount of the food stamp bonus coupons they are ligible for in Provents.





Tested Tips To Help You

#### TIPS ON TUBS Making an old fiber glass

bathtub or shower stall look like new can be as easy as polishing furniture.

Start by removing built up dirt and grime with any popular liquid detergent-full strength from the bottle -rubbing with a sponge. Nonabrasive scouring pads made of nylon, saran or polyethylene can be used sparingly for hard-to-remove stains.



As a last resort, turpentine or paint thinner should remove persistent spots. Be sure to follow safety directions on the container and use these volatile materials only in well ventilated areas away from open flame.

Never use metal scouring pads or abrasive powders. They will remove the protective coating on fiber glass

fixtures. Once the surface is thoroughly clean, the original luster of fiber glass can be restored with a light application of automobile wax, liquid or paste. Since a waxed surface can be slippery when wet, do not wax areas used for standing.

To maintain the luster of a new or restored fiber glass bathtub, never use anything stronger than a mild liquid

With every American consumer being rudely awakened by just what inflation means to the family budget, it is welcome news to hear that there has been an abrupt turn around in our balance of payments with Japan. As her principal customer and major supplier, this situation should



prove healthy for our export industries at the same time that quality Japanese merchandise continues to be marketed here at reasonable prices.

In the first half of 1973, our exports to Japan rose a whopping 48.6 percent, meaning more jobs and money for American workers. During the same period, Japan sent us 7.8 percent more goods, increasing the flow of merchandise to the American consumer.

Other good news for American consumers (and there isn't much of that around these days) is that the House Ways and Means Committee has defeated a move to include mandatory import quotas in the administration trade bill. Consumers who are faced with skyrocketing prices would surely have felt the impact of this amendment which would have triggered automatic quotas whenever imports amounted to 15 percent of the U.S. market.

What the American market (which means the American consumer) needs right now is a sufficient amount of goods available to stem the rising cost of merchandise which systematically follows a tight supply. While we reel from the soaring costs of most things, many hope that radios, television sets, automobiles and other Japanese consumer goods which are now a part of our daily lives will not be restricted through shortsighted actions by a few nonthinking politicians.
