Minister Shows Arab Gun Emplacement From Afar

Forty one condemnation actions have been filed by American Natural Gas on easements for right-of-way in Bailey County.

The Company is in the process of laying a line from the southwest to the northeast across the county.

Would you have thought that a Texan from the neighboring town of Sudan and the fact that he was color-blind figured into the Arab-Israeli war?

Surprisingly enough he did... as a civilian. The story goes that although no Americans were needed or helped with the war proper, the Israeli troops found Rev. Vendyl Jones and his color-blindness vital to them.

As reported in Time magazine Rev. Vendyl Jones, a Baptist minister, became engaged in a conversation with an Israeli commander who discovered that the minister possessed a rare skill through being color-blind.

He learned that Synthetic dyes used in camouflage fabric "shone like new money" to his sensitive eyes.

The minister was given a pair of binoculars and he soon spotted a neatly concealed Jordanian gun emplacement many miles away....

The Israeli troops knocked off the guns and the march which they began that day ended some 36 hours later in the capture of Jerusalem's Old City.

"He is a man, once given a job to do will do it to the best of his ability and his abilities have always seemed unlimited," Joe Salem, Sudan, a life-long acquaintance of the minister said.

"Rev. Jones is a self-made man," Salem continued. He worked his way through high school and colleges and is highly educated. He diligently studied the Hebrew language and is a real scholar in the scriptures of the Old Testament.

"My family became acquainted with Rev. Jones when we first moved to Sudan many years ago. We operated a dry goods store and lived in the back of the store. His father, the late V. M. Jones, operated a barber shop next door. Vendyl and his brother and our two children, Betty and Bob lived together in our back yard.

Mosquito Control Now in Progress

Spraying operations for mosquitoes began here Tuesday night, city manager Albert Field said.

The 'fogging' of alleys and weeded areas is being done now with ground rig type sprayers and the low cost operation is to continue unless the mosquito population increases to the extent that aerial application is required to protect the citizens from the pests.

Aerial spraying became necessary rather quickly after the mosquitoes moved into the city. Ground rigs rapidly became inadequate to take care of the situation and Morgan Locker began aerial dusting of the city early Friday morning until wind halted the operation and rigs continued to work. Aerial application was resumed early Saturday morning.

The aerial operation began after complaints began rolling into City Hall concerning the mosquito infestation.

The primary target in the program is the control of the Culex tarsalis mosquito, believed to be the transmitter of Western encephalitis.

Woman Killed Muleshoe Men Injured

A Muleshoe man has been charged with involuntary manslaughter in the death of 43-year-old Texaco woman, who became the first 1967 traffic fatality in Curry County Thursday.

Mrs. Roy Lovett of Route Two Texico, died about 5 p.m. Thursday, in a grinding two car collision about five miles north of Clovis on N.M. 18 when the car she was driving and a pickup driven by a Muleshoe man collided.

Driver of the pickup was Sidney Slim Sliker, Sr., 59, of Muleshoe. His son, Bommy Sliker, Jr., 25, was a passenger in the vehicle.

According to State Police who investigated the accident, both vehicles were demolished in the collision. Mrs. Lovett was trapped in her automobile for more than an hour as fireman, city police, state police and sheriff's officers attempted to cut away the wreckage which pinned the body behind the car's dash.

State police said death was apparently instantaneous. The two men in the pickup were taken to the hospital.

CLEANING STRETCHER CARPET LIFE

The beauty and durability of rugs and carpets depend on their basic structure and regular care. Dirt is the greatest enemy of rugs and carpets. Fortunately, most of it can be removed by home methods as long as it remains on or near the surface. However, when the dirt has worked down into the pile, professional carpet cleaners are necessary.

A daily "once-over" lightly with the vacuum cleaner, using around three strokes over each area, will remove loose dirt, lint, and litter. Thorough vacuuming at least once (preferably twice) a week not only burshes and freshens carpets and rugs, but prevents the dirt from sifting into the pile. When dirt filters down, it chops and cuts the pile and backing. Severe streaks over each area should prevent this.

Even though the vacuum cleaner is used regularly, the surface of carpets and rugs often becomes soiled and dull. Two methods of cleaning help to correct this condition, but even these cannot replace professional cleaning at regular intervals.

Dry cleaning is the use of solvent-saturated, inert material sprinkled liberally over a large area and brushed in slightly. Directions should be carefully followed. Avoid letting

the cleaner get down to the backing if it is made latex because solvents degrade rubber.

Wet cleaning is suitable for all carpets and rugs. A non-alkaline synthetic detergent with water is safe cleaning solution. It should be applied sparingly with a sponge or cloth, wetting only the surface with a gentle motion. Then remove as much of the solution as possible with a shampoo machine, cloth, or sponge rinsed in clear water. Always allow the carpet to dry quickly. Too frequent use of the solution may cause more rapid soiling since carpets cannot be rinsed thoroughly on the floor.

What's new in carpet backing? One of the fastest growing backings fibers for today's carpets is polypropylene.

Many carpet manufacturers are praising the advantages of the new fabric, adding that it may be the future replacement of the now-popular jute backing.

A few of the advantages of polypropylene include its resiliency, high stain resistance, lightness of weight; it is non-water absorbent and has no dust. The end product is a more disciplined carpet. The efficiencies such as better dimensional stability and firmer tuft anchorage during tufting.

The backing is woven on a modified loom of primarily monofilament ribbon yarns, but

some manufacturers use multi-filament fillings. A plain weave produces the best results since the dye can be extruded into the yarn as it is made. Because of its non-absorbency, the backing does not affect the dye bath or stain the finished carpet as some types of backing do.

A secondary fabric backing is not necessary when the polypropylene is used. The latex foam is poured directly onto the primary backing fabric. This means that bowing of carpets caused by drying and back-sizing is eliminated.

According to leading tufted carpet manufacturers, the primary polypropylene backings will be appearing more and more on carpets of the future.



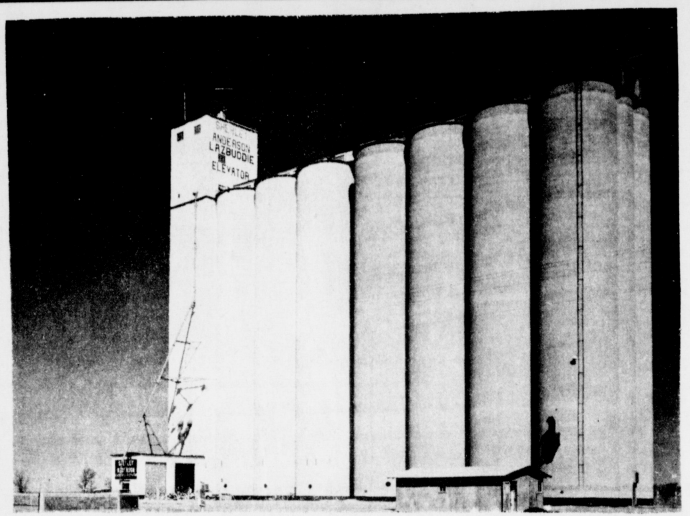
