YFZ Ranch sold to Texan Heritage trust Property tax exemption sought for temple and nearby print shop

The YFZ Ranch officially changed ownership on December 31st

of last year, according to documents filed April 23rd in the Schleicher County Clerk's office. The 1,691 acre ranch is now owned by Texan Heritage, a trust established December 31, 2008.

Jim Jessop, listed on the trust documents as James Jerry Jessop, signed as the organization's president. Other officers include Isaac S. Jeffs and Keith W. Dutson, Sr.

The men are all believed to be loyal followers of Warren Jeffs, the jailed prophet of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Lat-

Trust documents state, "Texas Heritage is to assist the living of the Holy United Order. It exists to preserve and advance the religious doctrines and goals of the United Order of Texas, a common law trust (hereinafter referred to as the "Church"), having its principal office in Eldorado, Texas. The Church hereby ratifies this Declaration of Trust. The doctrines and laws of the Holy United Order are found in the Book of Mormon, the Doctrine and Covenants, the Pearl of Great Price, and the Holy Bible; and are the guiding tenets by which the Trustees of Texan Heritage shall act."

Membership in the Texan Heritage trust is strictly by invitation, according to the Declaration of Trust. The document goes on to say that membership is granted and may be revoked at any time by the trust's board of trustees. "They must consecrate their lives, times, talents and resources to the building and establishment of the Kingdom of God on Earth under the direction of the Church and its appointed officers. They must act in the spirit of charity."

Trustee Isaac S. Jeffs was designated as vice-president of Western Heritage and Keith W. Dutson, Jr. will serve as its secretary while trustee and president James Jerry Jessop will also serve as the trust's

All 1,691 acres of land at the YFZ Ranch, along with improvements were assigned to the trust.

County Attorney Clint Griffin explains that trusts are legal entities, similar to a corporation in that they are overseen by a board

of directors. He notes that trusts are governed by the declaration of trust that creates the entity which then functions much like an individual. Trusts must file tax returns and may sue and be sued in a court of law. Any disputes within the trust are to be settled by the original declaration of trust. But, unlike corporations, trusts need not be filed with the Texas Secretary of State's office.

Property Tax Exemption Sought


In a related move, ranch personnel filed papers last week with chief appraiser Jani Mitchell seeking a property tax exemption on the FLDS church's large temple, an attached annex building and a nearby print shop, which the application refers to as a meeting house. The three buildings, clad in white limestone, dominate the landscape at the center of the YFZ Ranch.

The three-page application seeks a religious designation for the buildings and asks that they be exempted from the collection of property taxes. In the past, the temple alone has been valued in excess of \$8.7 million. The print shop building which stands directly in front of the temple was valued at more than \$3.2 million.

Church members have publicly stated since the raid that the temple was desecrated when non-members entered the building during

It is interesting that the application for tax exemption includes the print shop and lists it as a meeting hall. The application notes that both the temple and print shop are places where worship services are regularly held.

One of Warren Jeffs jailhouse dictations from June 1, 2007 referred to the building in front of the temple as a print shop. He then described how it was to be built. "The Lord directs that a white cement wall be built around this entire lot of the 'Printing Establishment' by September 15th as part of the completion of the project. It should be 10 feet high of cement, with a 2 foot high metal railing SEE YFZ ON PAGE 5



Six EHS grads gather to unearth time capsule

A chance for a look back in time brought six former EHS graduates together Saturday in the courtyard at Eldorado Middle School where 20 years earlier they had buried a time capsule beneath a gray granite marker.

The dark and overcast sky failed to dampen the enthusiasm of on-lookers as a crowd of teachers, former teachers, parents, friends and current middle school students gathered to watch as Pepper Nix, Farley Dakan and Reagan Bownds removed an engraved granite marker only to discover that at least 8 inches of concrete now covered the capsule. Each of the men took turns as they hamered and chiseled their way through the concrete. Their former classmates, Shanna Edmiston Nail, Lindsay Johnson Cranek and Caty McGregor Pickett, dodged flying rock chips as they watched the progress. Eventually, a sealed PVC tube was pried from the earth for the first time in two

The plastic pipe was the time capsule buried by the six students back in 1989 when they were the only six members of Martha Spinks' 6th and 7th grade Gifted and Talented class. At that time, the young students placed personal letters

and items they deemed to be important within the capsule...items that wouldn't see the light of day for twenty years.

Retired high school shop teacher George Sprinks told with pride how the young students had sand blasted the letters into the granite stone that marked the time capsule's temporary resting place. His wife, Martha, the GT class sponsor, beamed as the six former students began pulling items out of the newly opened capsule.

Court hearing on evidence from YFZ raid slated for Wednesday

District Judge Barbara Walther is scheduled to hear arguments Wednesday as several YFZ Ranch defendants challenge the legality of search warrants served at the ranch last April and the admissibility of evidence seized during the subsequent 6-day-long raid.

The hearing is slated to be held in Schleicher County. If that is the case, it will likely be held in the Memorial

There is some speculation, however, that attorneys for both sides are wanting the hearing moved to San Angelo. If that happens, the hearing will be held in the Tom Green County courthouse.

Lawyers representing 10 YFZ defendants filed identical motions to suppress ahead of an April 15 deadline. Each of the motions consists of more than 300 pages, including the formal motion and

supporting exhibits.

Among the exhibits are sworn depositions given by Texas Ranger Brooks Long and Schleicher County Sheriff David Doran. The depositions were originally taken as evidence in an Arizona case, but were offered as supporting evidence in the 10 motions to supress evidence in the YFZ Ranch cases.

Sheriff Doran's deposition includes a passage where he describes the initial attempt by Texas child welfare authorities and law enforcement offices to enter the YFZ Ranch on the evening of April 3,

The sheriff notes that at that particular point in the raid officials were primarily interested in locating an underage girl named Sarah Jessop Barlow and her alleged husband, a man named Dale

The Case for the 'Torture Memos'

The debate over the just-released Justice Department memorandums on interrogation techniques ended as soon as they were dubbed the "torture memos." Forevermore, they will be remembered as the legal lowlights of a "dark and painful chapter in our history," as President Barack Obama put it.

Rightly considered, the memos should be a source of pride. They represent a nation of laws struggling to defend itself against a savage, lawless enemy while



adhering to its legal commitments and norms. Most societies throughout human history wouldn't have bothered.

The memos cite conduct that is indisputably torture from a

court case involving Serbs abusing Muslims in Bosnia: "severe beatings to the genitals, head, and other parts of the body with metal pipes and various other items; removal of teeth with pliers; kicking in the face and ribs; breaking of bones and ribs and dislocation of fingers; cutting a figure into the victim's forehead; hanging the victim and beating him; extreme limitations of food and water; and subjection to games of 'Russian roulette.'"

In contrast, we carefully parsed each of our techniques to ensure it wouldn't cause "severe physical or mental pain or suffering." This touchingly legalistic exercise at times took on a comic aspect. We could put a caterpillar in a box with a detainee afraid of stinging insects, Abu Zubaydah, so long as we didn't falsely tell him the caterpillar was a threat to sting. We could put detainees in diapers so long as "the diaper is checked regularly and changed as needed to prevent skin irritation."

Several of the harshest methods -- sleep deprivation, stress positions and waterboarding -- could easily constitute torture, depending on their application. The tone of the press coverage makes the very act of subjecting these methods to close legal analysis seem dirty, as if the Justice Department should have come down with a case of the vapors when asked for guidance.

But there is a line somewhere between the highly restricted methods approved in the Army Field Manual for interrogation of enemy soldiers and illegal torture. The only way to find and honor that line is by lots of lawyerly analysis of practices that — in the words of Director of National Intelligence Dennis Blair — "read on a bright, sunny, safe day in April 2009, appear graphic and disturbing."

Reasonable people can disagree about whether the Bush administration succeeded in its balancing act. Waterboarding has always been the most controversial method, and it was used 183 times -- in short bursts not exceeding 40 seconds -- against top al-Qaida captive Khalid Sheikh Muhammad in March 2003. Were intelligence benefits gained commensurate with the frequent resort to this method?

If we had a more mature political culture, this and other questions could be thoroughly examined by a special congressional committee. (As it happens, the CIA produced a memo on the benefits of the interrogation program that has never been released.) But such an inquiry would inevitably descend into a hyperpoliticized takedown of the CIA and the Bush Justice Department for "war crimes." The frenzied reception of the "torture memos" is just a preview.

Benedict Arlen Specter and his improbable Magic Bullet Theory

Arlen Specter, the once and future Democrat, is returning to his roots.

The Pennsylvania senator announced last week that he was crossing the aisle to join the Democratic majority, effectively ending a four decade-long love/hate relationship with the Republican Party.

The 79-year-old Specter said he found himself increasingly at odds with conservative Republican philosophy.


There are many Republicans who no doubt felt the same way about Specter.

In fact, Specter has long been identified in Washington circles as a RINO, or Republican in Name Only, as he found himself voting more with his Democratic colleagues than with the members of his own party.

Specter noted this last week when he announced his switch. He also acknowledged that there is an abundance of polling data that indicates he was likely to lose next year's Republican primary to a conservative challenger.

And, there was no shortage of would-be challengers waiting in the wings. One potential opponent was former Pennsylvania Governor and Homeland Security Director Tom Ridge. Another was former U.S. Representative Pat Toomey, who narrowly lost to Specter in the 2004 primary.

Switching parties is nothing new



to Arlen Specter. He did it before, way back in 1966 when he left the Democratic Party to run for and win the post of District Attorney.

At that time, Specter said he was leaving the Democratic Party because it had swung too far to the left. He also pointed to rampant corruption in Harrisburg, the Pennsylvania state capital, and decried what he called a bloated and entrenched bureaucracy concerned only with its own self-interests.

Perhaps Specter honestly believes that today's Democratic Party is less liberal than it was in 1966, but I doubt it

More likely, I think, is the possibility that Specter has grown accustomed to the perks associated with his senate office and is presently guided by his own self-interest.

Specter first gained national attention as a staff attorney for the Warren Commission which investigated the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

In fact, it was Specter who came

up with the single-bullet theory, a theory so far-fetched and unlikely that it became known as the Magic Bullet Theory.


According to Specter's theory, a single bullet fired by Lee Harvey Oswald, passed through President Kennedy's upper back and neck, went out through the knot on his necktie, then changed direction . . . twice, and entered Texas Governor John Connally's back. The bullet then pulverized 7 inches of rib bone and exited his chest, slammed through the governor's wrist where it shattered the radius bone, before embedding itself in Connally's right thigh.

The nearly pristine bullet was then found lying on a stretcher recently occupied by Governor Connally. The stretcher was sitting along a wall in a busy corridor outside the emergency room at Parkland Hospital.

Coincidentally, a forensic examination found that the magic bullet matched perfectly the rifle allegedly used by Oswald.

At the time, Specter said the single, or magic bullet theory, was the best possible explanation for how Oswald could have inflicted all the wounds attributed to him.

Hey . . . it could happen! Anything is possible, I suppose, even the possibility that Senator Specter is now motivated only by his concerns for the citizens of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania.



Elementary School Kids Learn to Garden

I visited a classroom at Stone-wall Jackson Elementary School in Dallas the other day and heard Mark Painter talk to his gardening class. He asked some difficult questions, but the students were ready with the answers. Mark and the students maintain a half-acre garden on school property (stonewall-gardens.com).

"We have three crops a year basically," says Mark. "At the beginning of school in August we plant cold crops. We harvest those around Christmas, then start putting in potatoes, carrots and onions. We harvest those in May. Then we plant soybeans, black-eyed peas and okra, crops that go through the summer. When the kids come back in the fall, they get to harvest those."

The garden has a row for every class. Every student has a plant. The garden has a large wildflower area. Mark says the kids get to take the crops home or they sell some of it. "We have plant sales, sell wildflower seeds and wildflowers. We've taken produce down to Whole Foods where they let us set up stands outside the store. We're trying to get kids to understand all



the commerce that goes along with gardening."

The garden has a greenhouse, tool shed, a pond and a rock garden. Mark makes sure good tools are on hand for the kids to use. He acquired a kiln from another school to show how ceramics relate to the soil.

Growing up, Mark always wanted to be a teacher. After college, he took a teaching job, but found out he didn't really like the classroom that much. So he went into the construction business, which his family had been involved with for years.

"It took me about thirty years to find this little gig," says Mark. "I started out here as a volunteer, putting in a garden. My wife teaches here and I put in a little garden for her class. And that little garden just kept growing and the volunteer position ended up as a unique job that you wouldn't find anywhere else in

Texas."

Last fall, when the Dallas school district did some severe cutting back due to financial problems, Mark lost his job. But the school's PTA didn't want the gardening program to end and brought Mark back on a part time basis. He also works for an organization in Fort Worth, Real School Gardens, which puts gardens in schools.

Students in kindergarten through fifth grade go to the garden once a week. The kids even grow a small cotton crop every year. While the fall plants are maturing, cabbage and broccoli are growing in little pots in the greenhouse. They will go into the ground in October. Mark says it's a year-round business, but he is passionate about gardening.

"We are really losing that knowledge about how we get our food. I think it's extremely important that kids understand that it's grown right out there on the ground. Most people, I think, know it comes from the ground, but don't know how it's done or the length of time it takes to grow it. They don't understand the energy input or environmental factors involved."

Legislators move toward reshaping focus of education

AUSTIN — The Texas House and Senate on April 30 passed legislation

to revise the accountability system for public schools.

The legisla-

The legislation, SB 3 by Senate Education Committee chair Florence Shapiro, R-Plano, and



HB 3 by House Public Education Committee chair Rob Eissler, R-The Woodlands, have long lists of amendments that must be agreed upon or discarded as the process moves forward.

Under both bills, the education system would be changed to focus on students' readiness for post-secondary education that could be college or other forms of training.

Shapiro said Texas' current accountability system has created an illusion of progress. "The passing standards on the assessments lack any link to success after graduation. The world today requires sound preparation. All students must be prepared for post-secondary education."

SB 3 and HB 3 update curriculum requirements for high school students. They'll take four years of math, science, social studies and English, two years in the same foreign language, and eight electives that could include fine arts, or career-in-technology education that gives students who don't plan on going to college workforce training.

In addition, school districts would have new accountability standards. Accreditation and performance ratings would be based not only on passing standards, but also on how students score on college readiness standards. Schools could receive recognition in more areas, for success in 21st century workforce development, fine arts, secondary languages, PE, and academic excellence.

Speaker names budget conferees

The primary task of the Texas Legislature is to produce a budget for fiscal years 2010-2011.

The House and Senate versions of the \$180 billion (give or take) budget don't match, so the two bodies are going to have to compromise.

House Speaker Joe Straus on April 27 announced the following appointees to the Conference Committee on SB 1, the state's biennial budget for 2010-2011:

House Appropriations Committee chair Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, and vice chair Richard Raymond, D-Laredo; Ruth Jones McClendon, D-San Antonio; John Otto, R-Dayton, and John Zerwas, R-Katy.

The five House members will work with five Senate members named earlier by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst. They are:

Senate Finance Committee chair Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, and vice chair Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, Shapiro, Senate Intergovernmental Relations chair Royce West, D-Dallas, and Senate Administration Committee chair Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands.

June 1 is the last day of the 81st regular session of the Texas Legislature, so the pressure is on to wrap up the budget and get it to the governor.

40 cases of Swine Flu confirmed in Texas

As of May 4, 2009, 40 confirmed human cases of Swine Flu (H1N1) and one death have been determined in the State of Texas. This rapidly evolving situation has providers aggressively testing symptomatic patients.


Testing is performed on all patients with flu like illness (fever > 101° and cough and / or sore throat). Testing will be performed on all patients with acute respiratory illness with a recent onset of at least two of the following

symptoms: rhinorrhea (runny nose) or nasal congestion, sore throat, cough, and meet one of the following criterion: a history of recent travel to Mexico (within 7 days of illness) or contact with anyone who has been diagnosed with Influenza A.

If you are exhibiting signs of illness the testing is simple and treatment is available. You can obtain more information by calling Schleicher County Family at 853-3137. Precautions remain the same for any illness and include: stay home when you are sick to avoid spreading illness to others, cough

or sneeze into the crook of your elbow or a tissue and properly dispose of used tissues, wash hands frequently and thoroughly with warm soap and water or use an alcohol based hand sanitizer.



DPS notes May is Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month

In 2008, the DPS Motorcycle Operator Training Program trained a record-number 41,000 motorcycle operators, up from 33,697 in 2007. But all that training isn't enough to ensure the safety of motorcycle operators. Drivers of other vehicles, who share Texas roadways with 908,665 licensed motorcyclists, must make a conscious effort to look for motorcyclists.

Almost 400 motorcyclists were killed in crashes in 2007; preliminary fatality reports for 2008 also indicate an increase in fatalities. A high percentage of those crashes involved other vehicles. Most motorcycle crashes occur near

intersections, largely because inattentive vehicle drivers fail to see the motorcyclist and give them the right-of way.

"Because of its small size, a motorcycle can be easily hidden in a car's blind spots such as the door or roof pillars, or masked by objects or backgrounds outside a car such as bushes, fences and bridges," said John G. Young, coordinator of the DPS Motorcycle Safety Unit. "Take an extra moment to look for motorcycles, whether you're changing lanes or turning at intersections."

To address the increase of car and motorcycle

crashes on a local level, some Texas cities such as Arlington have began local public awareness events. The City of Austin has a motorcycle safety fair scheduled for May 9 to increase public awareness and remind drivers to look for






