## Court hearing on evidence from YFZ raid slated for Wednesday

District Judge Barbara Walther is scheduled to hear arguments Wednes day as several YFZ Ranch defendants challenge the legality of search warrants served at the ranch last April and the ad missibility of evidence seized during the subsequent 6 -day-long raid.
The hearing is slated to be held in Schleicher County. If that is the case, it will likely be held in the Memorial Building.
There is some speculation, however, that attorneys for both sides are wanting the hearing moved to San Angelo. If that happens, the hearing will be held in the Tom Green County courthouse.
Lawyers representing 10 YFZ defen dants filed identical motions to suppress ahead of an April 15 deadline. Each of the motions consists of more than 300 pages, including the formal motion and
supporting exhibits
Among the exhibits are sworn depositions given by Texas Ranger Brooks Long and Schleicher County Sheriff David Doran. The depositions were originally taken as evidence in an Arizona case, but
were offered as supporting evidence in the 10 motions to supress evidence in the YFZ Ranch cases.
Sheriff Doran's deposition includes a passage where he describes the initial at tempt by Texas child welfare authorities and law enforcement offices to enter the YFZ Ranch on the evening of April 3 2008.

The sheriff notes that at that particular point in the raid officials were primarily interested in locating an undet age girl named Sarah Jessop Barlow and her alleged husband, a man named Dale SEE COURT ON PAGE 5

The debate over the just-released Justice Departended as soon as they were dubbed the "torture memos." Forevermore, they will be remembered as the legal lowlights of a " "dark and painful chapter
history," as President Barack Obama put it.

Rightly considered, the memos should be a source of pride. They represent a nation of laws struggling
to defend itself against a savage, lawless enemy while defend itself against a savage, lawless enemy while
adhering to its legal adhering to its legal
commitments and norms. Most societnorms. Most societ
ies throughout human history wouldn't have history wou bothered.
The memos cite conduct that is indiscourt case involving Serbs abusing Muslims in Bosnia: "severe beatings to the genitals, head, and other parts of the body with metal pipes and various other
items; removal of teeth with pliers; kicking in the face and ribs; breaking of bones and ribs and dislocation of fingers; cutting a figure into the victim's forehead; hanging the victim and beating him; extreme limitations of food and water; and subjection to games of 'Russian roulette.'" niques to ensure it wouldn't cause "severe physical or mental pain or suffering." This touchingly legalistic mental pain or suffering. This touchingy. legalistic
exercise at times took on a comic aspect. Several of the harshest methods -- sleep deprivation, stress positions and waterboarding -- could eas ily constitute torture, depending on their applica tion. The tone of the press coverage makes the very act of subjecting these methods to close legal analysis seem dirty, as if the Justice Department should have
come down with a case of the vapors when asked for guidance.
But there is a line somewhere between the high y restricted methods approved in the Army Field Manual for interrogation of enemy soldiers and ille gal torture. The only way to find and honor that line is by lots of lawyerly analysis of practices that -- in
the words of Director of National Intelligence Den the words of Director of National Intelligence Den-
nis Blair -- "read on a bright, sunny, safe day in April 2009 , appear graphic and disturbing.'
Reasonable people can disagree about whethe the Bush administration succeeded in its balancing act. Waterboarding has always been the most contro versial method, and it was used 183 times -- in short bursts not exceeding 40 seconds -- against top al-
Qaida captive Khalid Sheikh Muhammad in March Qaida captive Khalid Sheikh Muhammad in March
2003. Were intelligence benefits gained commensuate with the frequent resort to this method?
If we had a more mature political culture, this and other questions could be thoroughly examined by a special congressional committee. (As it happens, the CIA produced a memo on the benefits of the inter-
rogation program that has never been released.) But rogation program that has never been released.) But
such an inquiry would inevitably descend into a hysuch an inquiry would inevitably descend into a hyperpoliticized takedown of the CIA and the Bush
Justice Department for "war crimes." The frenzied re ception of the "torture memos" is just a preview.

## Benedict Arlen Specter and his improbable Magic Bullet Theory

Arlen Specter, the once and futus
Democrat, is returning to his roots. The Pennsylvania senator an nounced last week that he was cross ing the aisle to join the Democratic
majority, effectively ending a four decade-long love/hate relationship with the Republican Party
The 79 -year-old Specter said he found himself increasingly at odds with conservative Republican philosophy.

There are many Republicans who no doubt felt the same way about Specter.
In fact, Specter has long been identified in Washington circles as a RINO, or Republican in Name Only, as he found himself voting more with his Democratic colleagues than with the members of his own party.
Specter noted this last week when he announced his switch. He also acknowledged that there is an abundance of polling data that indicates he was likely to lose next year's Republican primary to a conservative challenger.

And, there was no shortage of would-be challengers waiting in the wings. One potential opponent was former Pennsylvania Governor and Homeland Security Director Tom Ridge. Another was former U.S. Representative Pat Toomey, who narrowly lost to Specter in the 2004 primary.

to Arlen Specter. He did it before, way back in 1966 when he left the Democratic Party to run for and win the post of District Attorney.
At that time, Specter said he was eaving the Democratic Party be cause it had swung too far to the left. He also pointed to rampant corrup tion in Harrisburg, the Pennsylva nia state capital, and decried what he called a bloated and entrenched bureaucracy concerned only with its wn self-interests.
Perhaps Specter honestly believes that today's Democratic Party is les liberal than it was in 1966, but I doubt it.
More likely, I think, is the possibility that Specter has grown accus tomed to the perks associated with his senate office and is presently guided by his own self-interest.
Specter first gained national a rention as a staff attorney for the Warren Commission which investigated the assassination of Presiden John F. Kennedy.
In fact, it was Specter who came

that it became known as the Magic that it became
Bullet Theory. Bullet Theory.
According to Specter's theory, a single bullet fired by Lee Harvey Os wald, passed through President Ken nedy's upper back and neck, went out through the knot on his necktie, then changed direction . . . twice, and en tered Texas Governor John Connal ly's back. The bullet then pulverized 7 inches of rib bone and exited his chest, slammed through the goverdius bone, before embedding itself in Connally's right thigh.

The nearly pristine bullet was then found lying on a stretcher recently oc cupied by Governor Connally. The stretcher was sitting along a wall in a busy corridor outside the emergency room at Parkland Hospital. Coincidentally, a forensic exam ination found that the magic bullet matched perfectly the rifle allegedly used by Oswald.
At the time, Specter said the sin gle, or magic bullet theory, was the best possible explanation for how Oswald could have inflicted all the wounds attributed to him.
Hey . . . it could happen! Anything is possible, I suppose, even the possibility that Senator Specter is now motivated only by his concerns for the citizens of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania.


Elementary School Kids Learn to Garden
I visited a classroom at Stonewall Jackson Elementary School in Dallas the other day and heard Mark Painter talk to his gardening class. He asked some difficult ques-
tions, but the students were ready with the answers. Mark and the with the answers. Mark and the
students maintain a half-acre students maintain a half-acre gargardens.com).
"We have three crops a year basically," says Mark. "At the beginning of school in August we plan Chis. We harvast wose around Christmas, then start putting in potatoes, carrots and onions. We harvest those in May. Then we plant soybeans, black-eyed peas and okra, crops that go through the summer. When the kids come back in the fall, they get to harvest. those.
The garden has a row for every class. Every student has a plant. The garden has a large wildflower area. Mark says the kids get to take the crops home or they sell sell wildflower seeds and wildflowers. We've taken produce down to Whole Foods where they let us set up stands outside the store. We're trying to get kids to understand all

the commerce that goes along with gardening."
has a greenhouse ool shed, a pond and a rock gar den. Mark makes sure good tools are on hand for the kids to use. He acquired a kiln from another school to show how ceramics relate to the to sho
soil.
Growing up, Mark always wanted to be a teacher. After college, he took a teaching job, but found out he didn't really like the classroom that much. So he went into the con struction business, which his family had been involved with for years. "It took me about thirty years to find this little gig," says Mark. " started out here as a volunteer, put ting in a garden. My wife teaches here and I put in a little garden for her class. And that little garden jus kept growing and the volunteer p sition ended up as a unique job tha you wouldn't find anywhere else in
