**LOOKING BACK—**

**Hattie Blaylock**

Harriet Jane Smith and Robert H. Blaylock were married December 23, 1893 in Ballinger, Texas. They had gone to Ballinger in a one-horse buggy from Eden and were married by a Justice of Peace in the court house.

To this union were born nine children: William, of Eldorado; Mrs. C. C. (Fannie) Gilbert, of Santa Anna; Mrs. Ira (Cornelia) Coppie of Uvalde, Mrs. A. T. (Lucille) Nixon, of Buchanan Lake Village; Mrs. L. L. (Vera) Bledsoe of Santa Anna; Bert of San Angelo; Mrs. J. (Lorena) Hoffman of Eldorado; R. H. Blaylock Jr. deceased, and Loyce Brink of California.

They first moved to Schidicher county in 1909 moving here from Merton. Robert Blaylock had bought some acreage in what was then the Vermont community. There was a little one room house on the place. They came to this little home in a covered wagon, with four small children and all their possessions loaded on, and lived in the one room until Robert found time to build a larger room. This new room served as bedroom and living combined, and the old part was used as kitchen and dining room. A big rock was hauled up and laid down as the front door step to the new room. Lucille who was only 18 months old at the time, fell out the door and broke her front tooth out on the rock. She had to go with the gap in her teeth until she was seven when her permanent teeth came in.

Robert helped drill a water well on the place and during the drilling, Cornelia, 4 years old was hit on the head with a crank on the big engine when she wandered too close. They thought she was killed by the blow, as blood was all over her head and face and she was unconscious for several minutes. Hattie had to cut all Cornelia's hair off real short in order to clean the wound and apply medication. Getting a doctor to come out so far was almost impossible and Hattie sat up many a long night nursing her children back to health. Lots of times it seemed one wouldn't live through the night and Hattie would pray and ask God to help him or her get well if it was his will, and miraculously the next morning would find him better. Robert and Hattie did manage to get Dr. Patton to come way out to the little place when Vera was born. Robert rode horseback all the way into Eldorado to get Dr. Patton to come, then the doctor had to whip his horse along as fast as he could go pulling the buggy in order to get there in time.

When the children were old enough to go to school, Robert and Hattie moved to the Cobb place to be near enough for the two eldest to walk to school. They went to the Vermont school, a little one room school house, and Mr. Cobb was the teacher.

Several years later Robert took a job as a Government Trapper and was gone from home months at a time. Hattie had a hard struggle raising her big family of children all alone. They lived in several different places in Schleicher county, finally settling in the Keffir community where Hattie's father had operated the Keffir post office and grocery store. They lived at Kaffir until most of the children were grown and married, then Robert and Hattie moved from Coke county. Mr. Blaylock passed away while they were living at this place in 1948. Hattie then moved back to her home in Eldorado where she resided until she moved into the nursing home in 1972.

Mrs. Hattie Blaylock is quite a lady with a fun loving personality and we all enjoy her here at the nursing home. A thank you goes to Fannie Gilbert and Vera Bledsoe who wrote this article for me. — Ruthie Dacy A. D.

During the middle ages, the date was March 25. Once the date was about June 21, the summer solstice, and again about September 21st, the autumnal equinox.

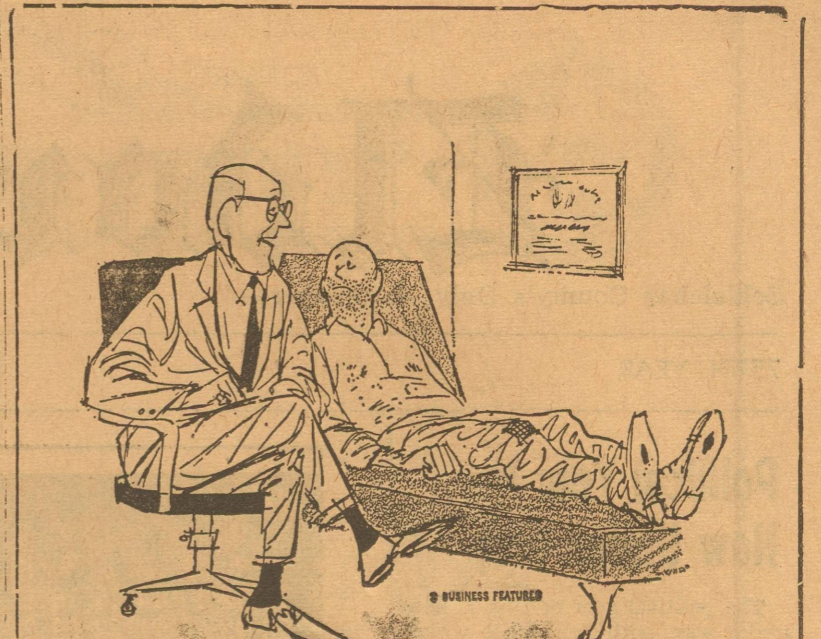
Jewish people have celebrated their New Year late in September or early October. The special occasion is called Rosh Hashanah, which means "The Feast of the Trumpets."

**EPIPHANY  
AFTER THE NEW YEAR**



Christmas really ends after the New Year has arrived. Twelfth Night or Epiphany—January 6—is the traditional end of the Christmas season.

Long before Christmas was observed on December 25, Epiphany was widely recognized as the time to observe the memory of the baptism of Jesus. Epiphany was mentioned as early as A.D. 194, was widely observed by the 4th century.

England's King Alfred decreed in the 9th century that the Christmas season would include Christmas and the 12 days thereafter. Charles II promoted the customs of the Twelfth Night cake and the burning of Christmas greenery.

In Syria Some legends, like one from

Syria, hold that wild animals remain in their caves on Epiphany Eve, that trees kneel in adoration at midnight.

Latin peoples consider Epiphany a solemn religious festival and the beginning of the pre-Lenten carnival season. In Mexico, Epiphany marks a pilgrimage of the devout to the shrine of the miraculous Lord of Chalma near Mexico City.

For many Christians, Epiphany has a threefold meaning: the visit of the Three Wise Men to Jesus; his baptism; and Jesus's changing of water to wine, the first miracle at Cana. Supposedly, the events occurred on the same date, though in different years.

The Greek meaning of Epiphany is "appearance."

1976**



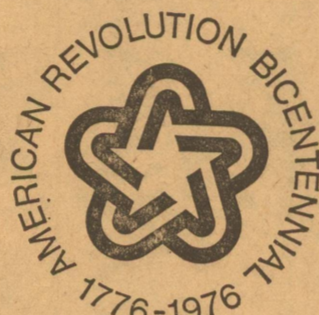
