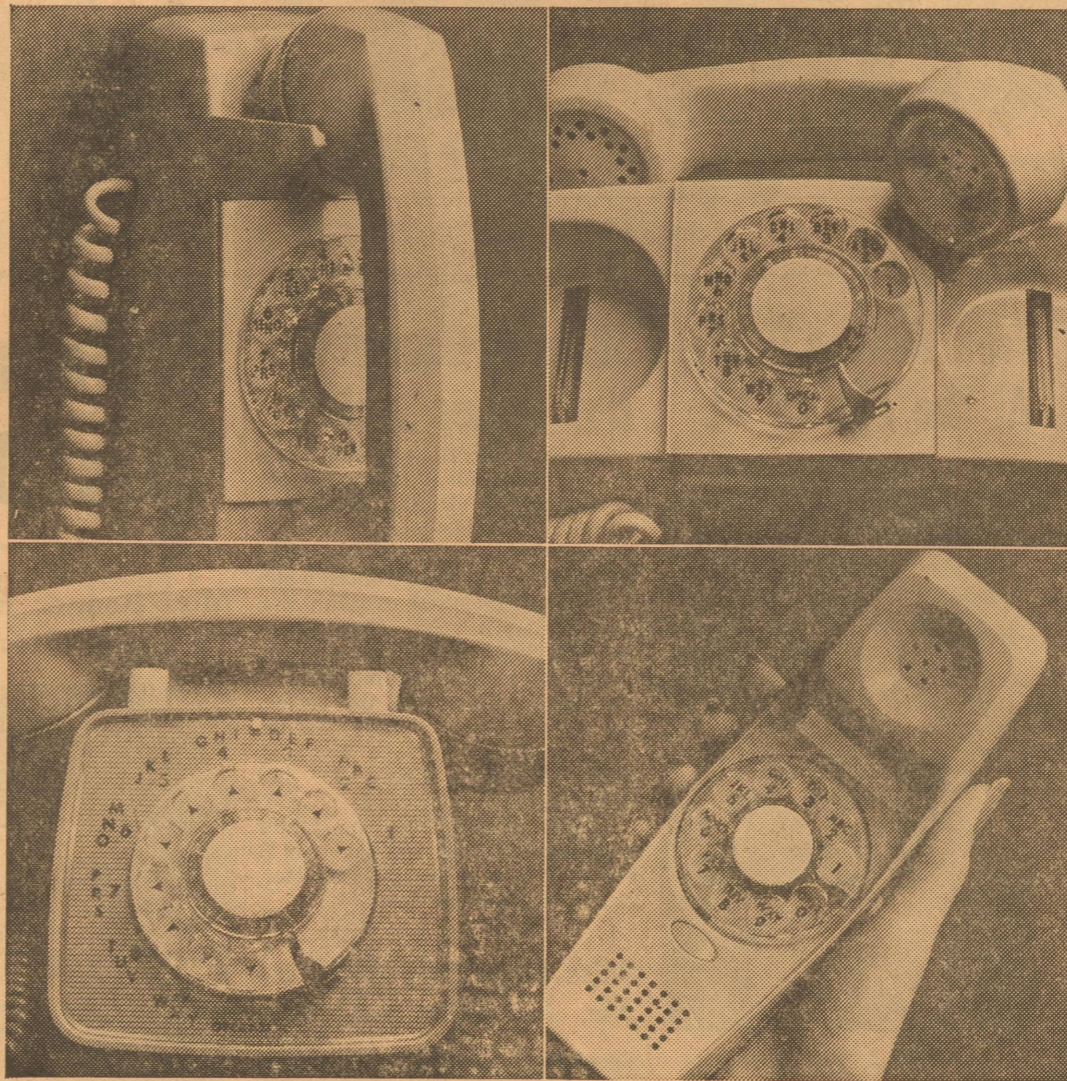

### - STATE CAPITOL -

Austin, Tex.—Major presidential candidates are making last minute appeals for support of Texas voters in the May 1 primary of both Democratic and Republican parties.

President Ford budgeted three days and a night to the Texas GOP primary battle with Ronald Reagan. Counting his two earlier days of campaigning, the president will have spent more time in Texas than any primary state this year.

Reagan also will make his third appearance in the state two days before the primary.

Democrat front-running Jimmy Carter will be back April 30. He made a fast trip to Houston on April 20th.

U. S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen is on the scene every day, combining his re-election and favorite son campaigns.

Alabama Gov. George Wallace, faltering as a national contender, was in Texas for a second wide-ranging swing last week to keep

his potential delegates in line.

In addition to the presidential preference primary and the Senate fight, the May 1 Democratic ballot offers a hot contest for Railroad Commissioner and the three state-wide appellate court races. One of the latter is for the State Supreme Court and two for the Court of Criminal Appeals.

#### \$50 Million "Wasted"

Unwise and outdated investment policies have cost the state at least \$50 million over the last five years, Comptroller Bob Bullock claimed.

Bullock said a six-months study of state money management practices by his planning and research staff showed Texas has the worst problem with idle funds earning no interest of any state in the nation.

Most idle state money is kept in big city banks, with four banks alone keeping an average of \$175 million and earning \$10 million last year off the state deposits, the comptroller stated.

Texas, according to Bullock, has an average balance of more than \$300 million in checking accounts earning no interest. He argued that 75% of that money could be in

time accounts drawing interest.

#### Allowable Set

Texas Railroad Commission for the 50th consecutive month set the state's oil allowable for May at 100%. While the allowable permits 3,931,778 barrels daily, estimated production actually is only about 3,207,000.

Once again, the commission restricted the East Texas field and the Kelly Snyder field in Scurry County to an 86% allowable.

Nominations by crude oil buyers declined by 16,368 barrels a day from the previous month.

The four-week average of crude oil imports, meanwhile, increased 458,000 barrels from the January 2 average and 1.3 million barrels from January 3, 1975.

#### Short Snorts . . .

Texas' unemployment rate dropped three-tenths of 1% in March—to 5.1%, one of the lowest rates in the nation.

Agricultural prospects brighten-

ed with rains, but more moisture is still needed in East and West Texas, Agriculture Commissioner John White said.

A big majority (almost two-thirds) of House of R representatives members who answered a questionnaire said they favor a special legislative session on utility rates.

Republican voters May 1 will ballot in a non-binding referendum on wire tapping, non-parolable prison sentences, forced busing, use of oral confessions in trials and denial of bail for repeat offenders awaiting trial.

The South Texas cotton planting deadline has been extended to May 1 due to weather problems.

### Fiesta del Concho Events Set For June 19 To 27

Horse races, a rock concert, a motorcycle jump over the Concho River and a western dance at old Fort Concho are some of the events which will headline a community party that San Angelo is inviting the state to attend, announced Tucker Sutherland, general chairman of the Fiesta del Concho at a recent press conference. The event June 19-27, begun four years ago by city, Chamber and community leaders, has achieved an amazing grass roots popularity. Sutherland further stated that as many as 500 people are working on the 1976 event.

The event, originally planned as a week-long party built around the Fort and the river, has been enlarged to include something for each taste. Billed as a heritage festival, this year's Fiesta will satisfy everyone's taste for nostalgia with such events as an antique car show and parade, a tour of San Angelo's historic old homes, as well as arts and crafts.

For those with a sense of the dramatic, many will be watching to see whether the motorcycle jump over the Concho River is successful, according to John Gill, who is responsible for staging this year's event. The motorcyclist fortunately escaped major injury.

A popular event of Fiesta will be horse races to be held at Wilke Downs, Saturday, June 19 and Sunday, June 20. Aubrey Stokes, chairman of the event, announced that a purse is being gotten together to motivate owners throughout the state to send their best horses.

The Fort Hood Cavalry will be on hand for the opening ceremonies. This group, which will be dressed in western cavalry uniforms, will take the city back to the days when old Fort Concho was the hub of community affairs.

"We want Fiesta to be the most fun event of West Texas," Barbara Rowland, chairman of the publicity committee, stated. She announced that several bands will be playing for Fiesta events. Johnny Paycheck will play for the Western Dance on Saturday, June 19 at the San Angelo Coliseum. The Tortilla Factory will provide music for the "Baille de la Fiesta" on Saturday, June 26, also at the Coliseum.
