

The event June 19-27, begun four years ago by city, Chamber and community leaders, has achieved an amazing grass roots popularity. The event, originally planned as week-long party built around the Fort and the river, has been enlarged to include something for each taste. Billed as a heritage festival, this year's Fiesta will satisfy everyone's taste for nostalgia with such events as an antique car show and parade, a tour of San Angelo's historic old homes, as well as arts and crafts.
