





15. Ferilize Azaleas as they finish blooming. It is best to use one of the special blends of Azalea fertilizers and apply according to manufacturer's directions. Because of their shallow root system, it is

best to make several light applications rather than all at one time. Be sure soil is moist before spraying fertilizer, and water thoroughly after it has been applied.

16. April is an excellent time to sow lawn grass seed and to sprig or plug St. Augustine grass.

17. Investigate the source of any topsoil purchased for raising flower beds, filling low spots in the lawn or for use in tubs and planter For County and District Clerk: boxes. Wild garlic, nutgrass and other hard-to-kill 'weeds are frequently introduced this way.

## AMERICA ENTERS 200TH YEAR OF INDEPENDENCE

Although most people think ited Nations could take in favor of American independence as of world peace. having been declared in 1776, since July 4th of that year is the all the world is aware that date marked on our Declarathere can be no political stabiltion of Independence, the surity without economic stability prising facts are that:

1. The Revolutionary War broke out at Lexington and Concord on April 19, 1775.

2. Congress, on December 6, 1775, formally disavowed allegiance to Parliament, which in effect declared American independence.

3. This year, therefore, marks the beginning of our 200th year of independence.

It may also mark the very first year of worldwide freedom under the "Economic Declaration of Human Rights." That document, more formally known as the "Charter of Duties and Economic Rights of Nations," has been proposed by Mexico's President Luis Echeverria.

A committee of representatives from 40 nations is now preparing the final text of the charter. According to Kurt Waldheim, Secretary General of the United Nations, the document has a good chance of being approved by the General Assembly next autumn.

The Austrian diplomat visited President Echeverria to express his support for the Mexican initiative.

"It is very necessary that all countries-large and small, rich and poor-accept a series of rights and obligations in the economic field," Waldheim asserted.

Waldheim, also presented President Echeverria the United Nations' Gold Medal of Peace, which is bestowed on heads of state and other world figures who make notable contributions to peace and the U.N. programs.

The diplomat said that adoption of the Economic Charter would represent one of the greatest steps which the Un-
