



Savor Asparagus in Cream Soup

Bunches of fresh asparagus in the market are always a signal for rejoicing for all lovers of this very special vegetable. Serve it often while it is in season. Before cooking, wash in cold water to remove any sand that may be clinging to the stalks or hidden under the scales. Then cook just until tender, 10 to 15 minutes, preferably in a covered tall pot with about 2 inches of salted water. Dress it with Hollandaise or Cheese Sauce—or make Cream of Asparagus Soup. Making your soup from the fresh vegetable is very simple and it will have real gourmet flavor. Thicken it delicately with Argo corn starch and add just enough nutmeg for seasoning. enough nutmeg for seasoning.

#### **Cream of Asparagus Soup**

2 tablespoons margarine 2 cups milk 2 tablespoons corn starch 1/2 cup asparagus broth 1 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon pepper

11/3 cups cooked, chopped asparagus 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg

Melt margarine in 2-quart heavy saucepan. Add corn starch, salt and pepper and mix well. Remove from heat, gradually, add milk and ½ cup of the broth left from cooking asparagus, mixing until smooth. Cook over medium heat, stirring con-stantly, until mixture thickens, comes to boil and boils 1 min-ute. Stir in asparagus and nutmeg. Makes about 1 quart.


aterials. And, by using recycled products, we prolong the life of our natural resources, re-duce our dependence on im-ported raw materials, and slow the accumulations of solid waste now seriously threatening towns and cities throughout the country.

#### HOW RECYCLING WORKS

Today, waste paper proces-sors throughout the country collect, sort, grade, process and bale waste paper into pa-per stock suitable as new raw material for a number of pa-per products. Then this prepared paper stock is shipped to paper and paperboard man-ufacturing mills, where it is fabricated into new cartons boxes, newsprint, writing and printing paper, toweling and tissue, and even insulation paper and construction wall-

Over 12 million tons of pa-per stock are recycled this way every year. Impressive as way every year. Impressive as this figure is, the 12 million tons account for less than 20 per cent of the paper and pa-perboard produced in the country annually. Each ton of paper stock re-cycled directly reduces the mountains of solid waste that must otherwise be incinerated

must otherwise be incinerated, thus adding to pollution, or buried in dumps or carted to our limited landfill sites. Presently, about half of all solid waste collected is paper and the cost of collecting and disposing of solid wastes costs taxpayers about \$6 billion a year. By 1980, the cost of dis-posing of solid waste will rise to about \$10 billion.







In Holland, stale bread was at one time placed in babies' cradles to ward off diseases. This didn't work if the baby ate the bread!

The man who prays can hear the prayers of others . . . especially when he prays for those human needs which are common to all men.

But even when he prays for needs that are solely his own, he knows that those who care for him are joining their prayers with his.


And God's answers come back along the party line.
