Garden Check List For March

Prepare beds for planting flowers and vegetables. You may want to consider renting or buying a garden tiller to speed up the process; however, a strong back and a garden fork will still do an excellent job.

For every 100 square feet of bed area work in a two or three inch layer of either compost, pine bark, or sphagnum peat moss, plus five pounds of superphosphate and 8 pounds of gypsum if available.

Check with your local county agent for the average last killing freeze date in your area. Killing freezes can occur after this date but seldom do.

After danger of frost is past set out those plants you started in January and February. If they don't grow, you can always obtain others from your local nursery or garden center.

Get those hanging baskets started this month. The variety of plants that can be used is limited only by your imagination and your knowledge of plant growth habits.

Aphids are multiplying rapidly on young tender vegetation. Use malathion or diazinon to control.

Cut St. Augustine as low as possible, rake up, and place all grass clippings, leaves and other organic matter in the compost bin. Be sure to wet the material thoroughly as you pile it up. Dry organic matter will not decompose properly.

After cutting back the lawn apply a complete fertilizer as per instructions on the bag or use 25 pounds of an 8-8-8 or similar analysis per 1000 square feet. Water in the fertilizer thoroughly.

Check mulch on azalea and camellia beds and add where needed.

Be selective in planting annuals and bedding plants. Set out no more than you can maintain. A small well cared for bed is much better than a large poorly-maintained weed patch.

Pruning of evergreens and summer flowering trees and shrubs should be completed in early March. Prune spring flowering trees and shrubs as soon as they finish blooming.

Select and order caladium tubers as well as geranium and coleus plants for late April and early May planting. Don't plant caladiums until soil temperature reaches 70 degrees.

Better check your mower after scalping the lawn. It may need sharpening to do a good job of cutting those new tender blades of grass.

Begin disease prevention program on roses and continue every week to 10 days throughout the growing season. Consult L-878 "Roses: Summer Care" for best controls.

Cut back and clean out old mums plantings to encourage new growth.

Allow foliage to die back on spring flowering bulbs before removing to allow bulbs to mature and store energy for next spring's growth.

Check lawn area carefully before mowing the first time. Potentially dangerous objects may be hidden in the turf which can be turned into lethal weapons by a rotary mower.

Some Ornamentals May Need Pruning

Now is the time to inspect woody ornamentals for needed pruning.

Prune only if you can justify removing a limb or branch. Don't prune just because it's the correct season and you need some exercise.

Diseased or insect-injured wood, dead wood and storm or accident-damaged wood should be removed as soon as possible. Older shrubs can be rejuvenated by removing the older branches at the base.

Pruning can also help develop a desired shape or size as well as aid in producing better flowers and fruit.

When setting out new plants, pruning can help balance the top with the root system.

Severe pruning should be avoided if possible. It is better to prune lightly and more often to prevent sunscald to the sensitive inner branches.


Never leave shrubs that invite insects and disease. Be sure to paint all cuts over three-quarters of an inch in diameter with a wound dressing. Wound dressings can be obtained from any nursery or garden center. Common orange shellac makes a good temporary dressing when a regular dressing is not available.

Plants that bloom in early spring with the appearance of new leaves should be pruned after they flower while those blooming later should be pruned during dormancy.

Tickets On Sale For San Angelo Rodeo

San Angelo, Tex.—West Texans know for sure that Spring is almost here—because ticket sales for the 41st annual San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo began Monday, Feb. 18.

"We're taking just a slightly different approach on ticket sales this year," said George H. Crownover, president of the 1974 Stock Show and Rodeo Association. "In order to make ticket purchases easier, we have set up our ticket office on the second floor of the downtown Hemphill-Wells Co. This more central location in downtown San Angelo should make rodeo tickets more accessible to everyone."

First performance of the rodeo is scheduled for Thursday, March 7, at 8:00 p.m. As in the past, there will be a total of six performances: 8 p.m. evening performances Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 7-9, and 2 p.m. matinee performances on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, March 8-10.

According to Crownover, the rodeo ticket offices will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. daily, observing the same hours as the Hemphill-Wells store. Rodeo fans can take either the elevator or escalator to the second floor.

"Of course, tickets may be ordered by either mail or by telephone," he continued. The rodeo ticket office has a special direct line, 655-5811, to facilitate ticket orders. "Those needing ticket information, or desiring to order tickets, should call only this number," said Crownover, indicating that the Hemphill-Wells switchboard cannot transfer calls to the rodeo ticket office.

"We have an entertainment lineup West Texans should enjoy," commented Crownover. "Grandpa Jones, who is better known for his appearance with Roy Clark on the Television series, Hee-Haw, is a very fine entertainer. Grandpa's brother, Dr. Eugene Jones, is the head of the Angelo State University History Department.


"To give rodeo spectators even more for their money, we have also contracted Joe and Rose Lee Maphis who are known as 'Mr. and Mrs. Country Music,'" said Crownover.

Ticket prices remain at \$2.50, \$3.00, \$3.50 and \$4.00, the same price they have been for several years.

All seats are reserved for every performance with the exception of the Friday matinee which is traditionally "Kids' Day" at the rodeo.

Other activities of the annual event will begin on Wednesday, March 6, when Stock Show activities begin. The stock show phase will close on Saturday, March 9, with a commercial sale and the sale of prize-winning animals.

LEMON CRACKER SQUARES


<p>1 cup granulated sugar 2 tablespoons cornstarch 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup cold water 2 eggs, beaten 3/4 cup butter or margarine 1/2 cup lemon juice</p>	<p>1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract 30 PREMIUM Saltine Crackers, finely rolled (about 1 cup crumbs) 3/4 cup all-purpose flour 3/4 cup flaked coconut 3/4 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed</p>

In top of double boiler combine sugar, cornstarch and salt; stir in water. Cook over low heat, stirring gently, until thickened. Place over boiling water. Cover and cook 10 to 12 minutes, stirring occasionally. Slowly stir into eggs; return to double boiler. Cook, stirring constantly, 4 to 5 minutes longer. Remove from heat. Stir in 1/4 cup butter or margarine, lemon juice and vanilla extract. (Mixture will be thinner). Strain into a bowl. Let cool while making crust. Combine cracker crumbs,

flour, coconut and brown sugar. Cut in remaining 1/2 cup butter or margarine until evenly mixed. Sprinkle 2/3 mixture over bottom of buttered 9x9x2-inch baking pan. Pour filling over; sprinkle with remaining crumbs; press lightly. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350°F.) 20 to 25 minutes until browned. Cool at room temperature. Serve cut in squares, topped with whipped cream, for dessert (as pictured); or cut in bars. Makes 9 (3-inch) squares or 18 (3 x 1 1/2-inch) bars.
