



Use Care Selecting A Mover For Goods

by John L. Hill, Attorney General

Austin, Tex.—Many people who plan to move do so in the summer. if you're one of those who will be packing up and heading for new territory soon, be sure you select a reliable moving company to

transport your belongings. Because whether it's a cut-glass punch bowl or a well-used tricycle, your household goods probably would be hard to replace.

Attorneys in our Consumer Protection Division warn that some "hot haulers," or illegal moving companies, are in operation and Kemp was called to the scene and that dealing with them could result in some problems.

For one thing, many of the ille-

gal movers cannot or do not offer

proper insurance for your goods. For another thing, consumers who unwittingly deal with a bootleg moving company could possibly he liable for prosecution under the Motor Carrier Act, enforced by the Texas Department of Public Safety. There are three classes of moving companies: (1) unregulated ones that can move goods from their base city to another; (2) companies licensed by the Texas Railroad Commission to move goods anywhere within the state; and (3)

move goods between states. Spokesmen for the Railroad Commovers have Texas representatives who are also licensed as intrastate

state Commerce Commission

movers themselves. If you plan to move from Wichita E. Heaner of Baytown, Falls to El Paso, for example, you will need a company licensed by Methodist church from 1956 to '60. the Railroad Ctmmission as an intrastate carrier. Picking a company from the telephone book, as many people do, is no guarantee that you'll get a properly licensed

The best way is to check with the Railroad Commission to see if the movrs you are interested in are listed as certified companies or as designated agents for such companies.

In order for a company to be certified, it must prove the need for increased service. Public hearings are held and, if the need is demonstrated, a permit can be granted by the Railroad Ctmmis-

Specialized carriers holding certificates or permits for the transportation of household goods must

adhere to certain requirements. If a mover says offhandedly, "I'll move you to Dallts for \$200," beware. He's not a licensed mover. If he were, he would have to take a look at your goods, give you a written estimate of the moving cost, weigh his truck both before and after loading your goods, and check the weight against a fixed tariff rate to determine the actual

He would also have to notify you estimate by 10% or \$25, whichever s greater. And, in addition, he would have to inventory all of your belongings and give you a copy of the inventory.

Certified intrastate moving companies must also be bonded, carry insurance, pay a licensing fee, and pay transportation taxes. Individuals employing such movers can also take out additional insurance on their goods, if desired,

If you want to lease a truck and move your own goods, be sure you choose a reputable company for that, too. There are statutes that prohibit the leasing of a truck by one individual to another for a move if requirements regarding such things as proper insurance have not been met.

Any questions about regulations involving a moving company can be answered by the Railroad Com-

mission, the Department of Public Safety, or the Attorney General's Transportation Division. For assistance with other consumer problems, call our Consumer Protection Division, your district or county attorney, or your local Better Business Bureau.







REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.

DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.

DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.

ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position. WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.

WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker

panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.

TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash. TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.

CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones

LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls - on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.

AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.





Avoid These Well-Intentioned Boners



Some people who visit hospitalized friends and relatives, while hoping to help the patients get well, may make them worse--without

knowing it! Here are a few things you should NOT do:

1. Don't bring exotic things to eat or drink unless you've first asked the hospital or doctor. They know what and when a patient should be fed while he's off his feed.

2. Don't go in to see someone if he already has several visitors. Wait for some of them to leave. Too large a crowd can be very tiring for sick people.

3. Don't be embarrassed about bringing flowers to men as well as women patients. Many hospital staffs have long known that the beauty and vitality of flowers have a positive psychological effect on the morale of many patients that sometimes helps speed recovery.

4. Don't touch a patient's oxygen, intravenous, Miller-Abbot tubes, etc. If this kind of equipment needs adjusting, ask the nurse, who is equipped to handle them.

5. Don't bring any medicines to a hospital patient, not even aspirin or vitamins or the pills he took at home, unless requested to by his doctor or the hospital. You can usually depend on the hospital staff to see that he gets the right medication.

6. Don't visit a hospital patient if you have a cold. His resistance to germs is likely to be low, and he could catch your disease. Instead, send flowers to show you care.

7. Don't bring patients large heavy books. He may be unable to hold them and therefore can't read them until he's recovered!

If you avoid these inhospitable in-hospital errors, the patient is much less likely to get sick of seeing you!

produce this record. There has been another change in the health field in the direction of prevention. This is in the field of epidemiology. To the layman, an epidemiologist can best be described as a disease detective. Major concerns of epidemiology are discovery of factors essential to or contributing to disease occurrence, and developmnts of methods for disease prevention.

Historically, epidemiology had its birth in relation to the study of the great epidemic diseases such as cholera, plague, smallpox, yellow fever and typhus. Until the 20th Century, these epidemic diseases were the most important threat to human life and health.

The so-called new epidemiology has extended the concept of public health control to encompass all causes of illness, disability and death. The Health Department's Divisions of Occupational Safety and Occupational Health and Radiation Control are. in a large sense, practicing preventive medicine by finding and eliminating circumstances which effect the health of

workers in Texas. So it is that the State Health Department, through its many different offices, is taking the lead in helping prevent disease and disa-
