DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION.

The Democratic County Convention of Schleicher County, Texas, met at the Court House, in Eldorado, August 1st, 1908, and the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

The Convention went into temporary organization with J. H. Jackson as Chairman, and W. O. Alexander Secretary.

Motion made and carried that the report of the executive committee on delegates nomination to the County Convention be read. The report is as follows:

Precinct No. 1, Six votes.

Joab Campbell,
T. W. Palmer,
J. B. Christian,
M. B. McKnight,
Clarence Miller,
W. O. Alexander,

Precinct No. 2, Two votes;

A. H. Schuessler,
S. E. Jones,

Precinct No. 3, Two votes;

J. H. Jackson.

Precinct No. 4, Two votes;

A. Oliver.

It was decided on motion that we vote by precinct, each precinct having its required number of votes even though all delegates are not present.

Motion carried, that the vote of each precinct be cast as a whole, according to the will of the majority. The vote by precincts on this question being as follows:

Precinct No. 1; For the motion, 5 votes,

Precinct No. 2; For the motion, 2 votes,

Precinct No. 3; Against the motion, 2 votes,

Precinct No. 4; Against the motion, 2 votes,

Majority for the motion, 3 votes. M. B. McKnight was selected by Precinct No. 1 to cast its votes, and S. E. Jones was selected to cast the votes of Precinct No. 3.

On motion the convention went into permanent organization, retaining as officers those elected for the temporary organization.

Tom W. Palmer was unanimously elected as delegate to the State Convention to be held in San Antonio.

Motion made and carried that any delegate elected at this Convention to attend any other Convention shall have the right to appoint some one to act in his place in case he, himself, cannot act.

Joab Campbell was unanimously elected to represent us in San Antonio in the election of Associate Justice Court of Civil Appeals, 4th District.

J. H. Jackson, A. Oliver and W. F. Ford were nominated as the vote resulting as follows: Precinct No. 1, J. H. Jackson, 6 votes.

Precinct No. 2, W. F. Ford, 2 votes.

Precinct No. 3, A. Oliver, 2 votes.

Precinct No. 4, W. F. Ford, 2 votes.

J. H. Jackson having received the greatest number of votes, was declared elected as such delegate.

W. B. Silliman was unanimously elected as delegate to the Representative Convention to be held in San Angelo.

Motion made and carried that a resolution Committee, composed of one delegate from each Precinct, be appointed by the chairman, said committee to report in one hour. The following named delegates were appointed as such committee.

Precinct No. 1, Joab Campbell. Precinct No. 2, A. H. Schuessler. Precinct No. 3, J. H. Jackson. Precinct No. 4, A. Oliver.

On motion Convention adjourned to meet again at 4:20 p. m.

The Convention was called to order by the Chairman, and the following majority report of committee on resolutions was unanimously adopted:

Be it resolved by the democrats

of Schleicher County, in Convention assembled;

1st, That we unqualifiedly endorse the action of our National Convention in the nomination of that able and patriotic statesman, William Jennings Bryan, for President of the United States,

2nd, That we hereby endorse the present state administration, and especially do we endorse the able and efficient service of Governor T. M. Campbell and Attorney General R. V. Davidson;

3rd, That we express ourselves as being unalterably opposed to public servants accepting fees, or serving favor-seeking corporations and trusts. We further request our representative to use his utmost influence to pass a law prohibiting such practice within the State of Texas.

4th, That we are opposed to any further investigation of the "Bailey question" by the next legislature and request our representative to so vote that further agitation be avoided.

5th, That we hereby urge our representative to the State Legislature to use his influence and vote to further the submission of a Constitutional Amendment prohibiting the sale of intoxicating beverages or drinks within the State of Texas.

The following minority report submitted by Mr. Oliver was also unanimously adopted:

6th, That County school lands, and lands belonging to the various State Universities should bear their just proportion of taxes.

7th, That it is the sense of this convention that Court Houses were built for the public and public servants, and that it is the sense of this convention that the County officials should maintain their offices in the Court House, and further that they devote their full time and services to the people.

8th, Be it further resolved that

we request the Commissioners

Court in expenditure of the Road and Bridge Funds, that it be expended in proportion to the length of the road and the population served.

Moved and carried that the various delegates elected at this Convention today, be governed by the will of the Convention as expressed above.

On motion it was decided to furnish the Eldorado SUCCESS with a copy of the above resolutions.

There being no further business the convention adjourned.

Letter to I. H. ELDER Eldorado, Texas.

TO VOTE FOR SUBMISSION.

Hon. Brown F. Lee is Bowed by the Primary Results.

When questioned Monday night on the subject, Hon. Brown F. Lee, 'who was nominated for Representative in the Thirtyfirst legislature from the 402 district without opposition, stated that if submission had received a majority of the votes cast in the district he would certainly vote to submit a prohibition amendment to the constitution.

Although an anti, Mr. Lee stated when he announced, and even before that time if a majority of the democratic voters of the district desired to vote on the question of state wide prohibition, and so declared by their ballot in the July primary, he would feel honor bound to obey their instructions and cast his vote in the legislature for submission.

He stated in a brief conversation Monday night that that is exactly the position he maintains at this time. If a majority vote has been in favor of submission he will so vote, whether the state convention declares in favor of submission or not.

And Brown F. Lee can be depended on to do what he says he will anytime. — San Angelo Press-News.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing the Compensation of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor.

Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Sections 5 and 17 of said article 4 so as to fix the compensation of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8000) dollars per annum in addition to the use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, and the compensation of the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars per annum.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to provide that the Governor of the State shall receive as compensation for his services, an annual salary of eight thousand (\$8000) dollars and with the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, said Section 5 as amended, to read as follows:

Section 5. He shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars, and no more and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

That Section 17 be so amended as to read as follows:

Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve or be removed from office or be unable to serve or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall in like manner administer the government until he shall be succeeded by a governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall receive an annual salary of twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars per year, and no more. During the time he administers the government as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would receive had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, during the time he administers the government, receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received, had he been employed in the duties of his office.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this resolution to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas, as an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be voted upon on the day of the next general election of the State of Texas, which will be held on the day fixed by law therefor. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars per annum." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "Against the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars per annum." Section 3. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 3. One fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of \$1 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed twenty cents on the \$100 valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts within all or any of the counties of this State by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be collected within such school districts for the further maintenance of public free school, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein, provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year 50 cents on the \$100 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election, or at a special election called by the Governor and the sum of four thousand (\$4,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any money not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publication of such proclamation. At such election the qualified electors voting and favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "For amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State, relating to public free schools." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State, relating to public free schools."

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Relating to Commissioners' Precincts.

Joint Resolution to amend Section 18, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for subsequent redistricting of a county into commissioners' precincts, defining the manner thereof; for submitting same to the electors of the State, and making an appropriation therefor. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 18, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Each organized county in the State, now or hereafter existing, shall be divided from time to time, for the convenience of the people, into justice precincts, not less than four and not more than twelve. The present county courts shall make the first division. Subsequent divisions shall be made by the commissioners' court provided for by this Constitution. In each such precinct there shall be elected, at each biennial election one justice of the peace and one constable, each of whom shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified; provided, that in any precinct in which there may be a city of eight thousand or more inhabitants, there shall be elected two justices of the peace. Each county shall in like manner and in the first instance, be divided into four commissioners' precincts, in each of which there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof one county commissioner, who shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. Subsequent divisions of a county into commissioners' precincts shall be made as is now or hereafter may be provided by law. The county commissioners so chosen, with the county judge as presiding officer, shall compose the county commissioners' court, which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction over all county business as is conferred by this Constitution and the law of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed.
