VERMONT LOCALS

BEN HER Advances the Idea of an Exhibit with Tom Green County. Discuss Rail Roads and Taxation.

To late for last week.

As Tom Green County has fully decided to have a fair this fall, why not Schleicher join in and secure "floor space" and have an exhibit there this fall by commencing now. I think we could get up a credible show, provided, however, that our big hearted sister County would agree for us to come in. I am sure it would give us a big advertisement to let people know just what we can do. Hon. C. B. Metcalf's article in last issue of the Standard in regard to the sudden stop in Rail Road work in Texas, will be read by the thousands of the Standard readers with much interest, as the conclusions arrived at, was after a searching investigation and facts that are above criticism, it should put people to thinking as all people certainly know that there must be a cause for rail roads work to stop in Texas, while rail road work is progressing in all most every state in the Union except Texas. Men who control large sums of money will not invest in any interprise that does not promise a reasonable income. Now the drastic and far reaching laws, that was passed by the last Legislature was little short of confiscation of their money, we here in West Texas have been made to feel the results of such laws more keenly than the people of the East as we practically have no rail roads.

The delay in the Orient has cost us many thousand dollars. Mr. Stillwell has been able to keep his work going on in Old Mexico but was unable to get sufficient funds to finish his great work in Texas, he is now in Europe trying to induce capitalists to invest in his great interprise which under

ordinary circumstances he could have got ever dollar here at home. We have some circulars from B. F. Yorum (who is chairman of the Frisco R. R. System and probably the greatest rail road man living) stating the same facts that was brought out by Mr. Metcalf corporations and the money power is as essential to our welfare as salt is to our health, but many people have become poisoned toward great interprises and have been led to believe that they were robber concerns organized for the purpose of plundering the peoples pocket, we do not want to be understood as advocating the principle that the farmers, stockmen and merchants and all men of moderate means should shoulder the taxes that rightfully belongs to the big concerns, but as small tax levied and collected would be worth more than a big tax and a stand off. Did you ever think what courage it takes for men with great sums of money locked up in some strong vault to take it out and invest in some rail road scheme that runs through some undeveloped country and with the very best conditions possible would require years for him to get one dollar from his investment. Under the old laws of Texas rail roads was granted something like twenty five years exemption from taxation and given seventeen sections of land for ever mile of rail road built. Now that law was possible all right in its day, but that time has past and gone and probably for that law people have been led to believe that rail roads should be taxed out of existance.

THE COMMISSIONERS COURT PROCEEDINGS.

The court met Monday with all members of the court present except W. D. Ake, commissioner of precinct No. 3, and F. O. Bates Jr, County Clerk. Rek McCormick was acting clerk pro tem.

The court ordered that J. Keeney be allowed \$35 for moving his fence on the Eldorado, and Garvin road.

The court ordered that an election to be held on the 12th day of September A. D. 1908 in precinct No. 4, to determine whether or not Hogs, Sheep or Goats should be permitted to run at large.

The order was made upon a petition presented by T. G. Chaney on 19 others.

Upon petition of S. C. Martin and 8 others, asking that a 3rd class road be opened up from Eldorado to the Adams school house, the petition was granted and T. W. Johnson, A. G. Murphy, H. M. Mills, Enus Hill and S. C. Martin was appointed as a Jury of View and to make a report at the November term of court.

Ordered—That G. E. Cobb be appointed Presiding Judge and S. W. Holland named as associate Judge, to hold all election in precinct No. 4, for the coming two years, and that Author Oliver be appointed as Presiding Judge and W. H. Williams associate Judge, to hold all elections for Precinct No. 6, for the coming two years.

Ordered—That Will Luedecke be appointed as road overseer to fill out the unexpired term of Tom Holland who is now a non residence.

The court ordered two new voting precincts one in precinct No. 1, and the other in precinct No. 4 which is published this week.

All quarterly reports were approved. F. C. Bates county clerk was present the second day of court.

Ry., Co., running west on dividing line, between commissioners precinct No. 1 and 4 to to the Crockett county line, thence South on said county line to the south west corner of said Schleicher county, thence east along the south line of said Schleicher county, thence east to the east line of section No. 55, thence north along the east lines of sections Nos. 55, 56, 57, 58, 59, 60 and 61 in block D, thence north on the east lines of sections Nos. 4, 3, 11, 12, 13, and 14 in block "A" to the place of beginning

Section Submitting Amendment to Constitution.

Joint Resolution amending Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, increasing the amount of tax that may be voted on school districts and providing for a majority vote of the property tax paying voters of such district to vote such tax.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 3. One fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of \$1 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed twenty cents on the \$100 valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts within all or any of the counties of this State by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be collected within such school districts for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings (herein provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year 50 cents on the \$100 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election, or at a special election called by the Governor and the sum of four thousand (\$4,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any money not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publication of such proclamation. At such election the qualified electors voting and favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "For amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State, relating to public free schools." and those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State, relating to public free schools."

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Relating to Commissioners' Precincts.

Joint Resolution to amend Section 18, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for subsequent redistricting of a county into commissioners' precincts, defining the manner thereof; for submitting same to the electors of the State, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 18, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Each organized county in the State, now or hereafter existing, shall be divided from time to time, for the convenience of the people, into justice precincts, not less than four and not more than twelve. The present county courts shall make the first division. Subsequent divisions shall be made by the commissioners' court provided for by this Constitution. In each such precinct there shall be elected, at each biennial election, one justice of the peace and one constable, each of whom shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified; provided, that in any precinct in which there may be a city of eight thousand or more inhabitants, there shall be elected two justices of the peace. Each county shall in like manner and in the first instance, be divided into four commissioners' precincts, in each of which there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof one county commissioner, who shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. Subsequent divisions of a county into commissioners' precincts shall be made as is now or hereafter may be provided by law. The county commissioners so chosen, with the county judge as presiding officer, shall compose the county commissioners' court, which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction over all county business as is conferred by this Constitution and the law of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed.

Sec. 2. That the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of defraying the necessary expense of submitting the above proposed amendment to the people of the State, at the next general or special election, in the manner required by law, by the Governor of the State.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing the Compensation of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor.

Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Sections 5 and 17 of said Article 4 so as to fix the compensation of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8000) dollars per annum in addition to the use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, and the compensation of the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars per annum.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to provide that the Governor of the State shall receive as compensation for his services, an annual salary of eight thousand (\$8000) dollars and with the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, said Section 5 as amended, to read as follows:

Section 5. He shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars, and no more and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

That Section 17 be so amended as to read as follows:

Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve or be removed from office or be unable to serve or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall in like manner administer the government until he shall be succeeded by a governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall receive an annual salary of twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars per year, and no more. During the time he administers the government as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would receive had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, during the time he administers the government, receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received, had he been employed in the duties of his office.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this resolution to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas, as an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be voted upon on the day of the next general election of the State of Texas, which will be held on the day fixed by law therefor. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars per annum." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "Against the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars per annum." And the sum of one thousand (\$1000) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation and election.

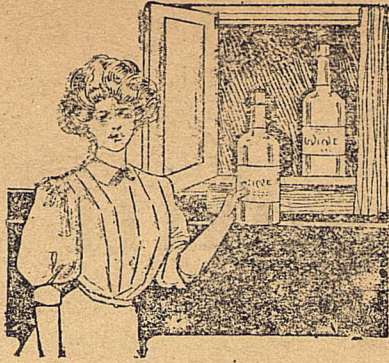
