COMMANDER PEARY'S NEW START.

IN SEARCH OF THE NORTH POLE.

Starting from New York on July 1 Commander Robert E. Peary has departed on another expedition to the Far North and although in the main he will follow the same program as before, he expects to reach the pole. The route will be modified somewhat, the course being more west of north than before. In speaking of his plans, Mr. Peary said. "I shall use the same ship, the Roosevelt; shall leave New York July 1st; shall follow the same route north; via Sydney, C. B., Straits of Belle Isle, Davis Strait, Baffin Bay, and Smith Sound; shall use the same methods, equipments and

supplies; shall have a minimum party of white men, supplemented with Eskimos; shall take on the Eskimos and dogs in the Whale Sound region as before, and shall endeavor to force my ship to the sand or similar winter quarters on the north side of Grant Land as in the winter of 1905-1906. Mrs. Peary, the little son and young daughter accompany the commander and like him, have no fear of the icy North.—American Family Journal.

Robert E. Peary is a brother-in-law to our friend and countryman Henry DeBiltch, he has made several trips to the far North, and from the above clipping he is on his journey again.

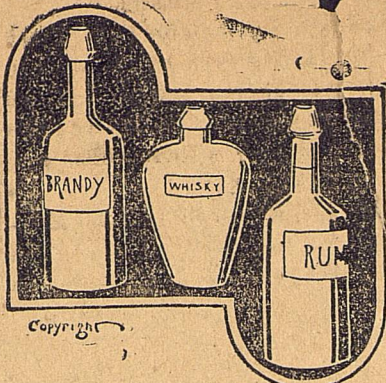
