On the other hand, the change may have thought.
"There was a misconception out there that if you did not apply or a driver's license before Jan. , you could not get one until you were 18," said Department of Pub ic Safety spokesman Tom Vinger. A teen-ager can still get a hard ship driver's license as young as

If you are an adult, chances ar you are happy with the new graduated license program, provided for by Senate Bill 577. Supports say the law will translate into saved lives.

In 1999, the most recent year for which the DPS has full data, 250 teen-agers from 15 to 18 years old were killed in traffic crashes in the state. In addition, 31,385 teen-agers were injured on Texas oadways that year.

## Comptroller Rylander delivers sales tax rebates

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander last week delivered
$\$ 207.8$ million in monthly sales $\$ 207.8$ million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,114 Texas cit-
ies and 121 counties, a 0.5 percent ies and 121 counties, a 0.5 percent
increase compared to the $\$ 206.6$ million paid in January 2001 January's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in November and reported to the Comptroller in December. The state's share of sales tax collected during this period was $\$ 1.1$ billion, up 0.2 percent compared to a year Comptroller Rylander sent Jan wary sales tax rebates of $\$ 190.9$ million to Texas cities, up 0.3 perent compared to January 2001 Texas counties received January sales tax rebates of $\$ 16.8$ million up 3.2 percent compared to one p 3.2 pe ear ago.

In the allocation, the City of Eldorado received $\$ 5,890.47$, down 7.56 percent from the Janu\$6,372.23.
Schleicher County's sales tax rebate this month totalled 5,605.08, down 20.82 percent from January, 2001's total of 7,079.37.
The Schleicher County Health Service tax rebate for January
was $\$ 5,608.31$, down 2.32 percent from January, 2001's total of $\$ 5,741.87$.
Year-to-date totals for all three entities are the same as their onthly totals.
The Comptroller's next sales ax allocation is scheduled for Friday, February 15, 2002 and will be reported the following week in the Eldorado Success.

QUESTION: What are the long-range implications of rais-

values when they reach adulthood. Parents told us that 85 per-

What this means, in effect, is argue and fight and argue and fight and complain but the majority will turn around when they reach young adulthood and do what their parents most desired. That should be reassuring. Furthermore, if we could at 35 instead of 24 years of age, even fewer would still be in rebellion against parental values. Second, raising a strong-willed child (or a house full of them) can be a lonely job for parents. You can begin to feel like yours is the only struggles. Don't believe it. In another study of 3,000 parents', found that 85 percent of families had at least one strong-willed child. This is parenthood. This is
human nature
Third, I urge you as parents of strong-willed children not to feel "cheated" or depressed by the assignment of raising such indithe butt af not an exception oke. All human beings arrive with a generous assortment of flaws, including the compliant child. Yes, it is more difficult to raise an independent little fellow or gal, but you can do it! You can, through prayer and supplication before the Lord, bring him or her to that period of harmony in earfort worthwhile. I also believe that you can increase the odds of transmitting your values to these individuals by following some Scripture.
So hang in there! Nothing of value in life comes easy anyway. Hold tightly to Solomon's encouraging words, "Train up a when he is old, he will not depart from it" (Proverbs 22:6; KJV)
QUESTION: My husband is a good man, but he gets angry at the kids and says things that he later regrets. Help me convince him to be careful about these off-the-cuff comments.
DR. DOBSON: Psychologist and authorAbraham Maslow once ments to make up for each critical comment we give to our children." I believe he is right. All normal human beings respond negatively criticism and rejection. Con versely, some of us crave affirma
fon so much that we'll do al most anything to get it. Children are especially vul-
nerable to those who use affirmation to manipulate them. As someone said, "Whoever gives your kids praise and attention has power over them." That
could be a drug dealer, a gang member, or anyone who could harm them. People with evi intentions know how to use praise to get what they want
from lonely kids. This is, in fact, the technique routinely used by pedophiles to abuse their victims sexually

All human beings have deep psychological needs for love, don't meet those longings in your children, I can assure you someone else will.
